The father, born in Hamilton County, Ohio, of Scotch and English descent, followed the vocation of farming, and is now living a retired life at Virden, Ill., at the age of seventy-eight. The mother was born and reared in Kentucky, though descended from an old Virginian family, and her death occurred July 3, 1880.

Our subject removed with his parents to Greene County, Ill., when thirteen years of age, and there grew to manhood on his father's farm, receiving such education as the district schools afforded. 
