### WILLIAM WELDEN CALLED BY DEATH

Prominent Resident and Pioneer Business Man Summoned Friday Evening.

Active in Business in lowe Falls Nearly Half Century. Had Varied Interests in Several States. Widely Known in Masonic Circles. Served in State Legislature.

William Welden passed away at his home in this city Friday evening at 7:15. He had been in failing health due to Bright's Disease the past three months. Monday morning he felt strong enough to write business letters to certain parties. He took a relapse later in the day and continued to fail rapidly till the end came. The funeral was held in the Congregational church Sunday. afternoon at two o'clock and burial took place in Union cemetery. Rev. C. W. Bast conducted short services at the house and also at the church. The Knights Templar had full charge of ritual work in the church and at the grave. The funeral was largely attended, quite a number being here from different towns over the county. There was a profusion of flowers and many expressions of sympathy.

William Welden was born in Highland, Wisconsin, December 8th. 1845. and lived from early infancy to manheod at Mifflin in that state. As has been the lot of many successful business men of the western states, his early years were not blessed with the advantages of wealth or station, and while still a boy he became de his store. ## OWA REGISTRATION FOOTS UP 217,572

OVERNMENT ESTIMATE WAS 4,690 TAESS.

Des Moines, June 11.—The total egistration in Iowa Tuesday, June 5, inder the selective draft law as offidally compiled late Saturday was 17,572. The government estimate or the state was 212,882.

Ringgold county, Taylor, Fremont and Wayne, which reported Saturday, ran a little under the government's stimate. The total registration for the state, however, exceeded the government attimate the state. ernment estimate by 4,690.

The total claiming exemption was 118,618, or a little more than 54 per cent. The total number of aliens including Germans registered was 13,-647, of which 1,862 were registered as allen enemies.

The largest increases in the total number of registrations over the esnumber of registrations over the os-timated registration by the govern-ment was in the cities and industrial centers. It is apparent to the state officials that the per cent of the popu-lation of the factory cities which is subject to draft is larger than in the smaller communities, or rather the young men form a much larger per cent of the ropulation in the live cities of the state than is true in the smaller communities. If the governsmaller communities. If the governsmaller communities. If the government applied the same per cent in estimating the number of registrations in the rural districts and smaller communities and in the larger cities as well, it underestimated the cities and in some instances overestimated the smaller communities.

The state officials were able to telegraph the official returns for Iowa egraph the efficient returns for lowa to the government late Saturday evening. The duplicate registration cards made up by each registration precinct in the state are beginning to reach the governor's office. These will be carefully filed away. Thru this system both the state and the county has an exact record of those registering. registering.

## in Red Cross Work WM. WELDEN OF IOWA FALLS DEAD

WAS PROMINENT IN STATE MA-SONIC CIRCLES.

Active in Business Enterprises and Interested in Politics.

lowa Falls, Ia., June 11 .--Welden was buried here yesterday afternoon, with Templar honors. Mr. Welden, who was a ploneer mer-chant of this city and a man well known over the state as a legislator and in Knights Templar circles, died at his home here Friday even-The funeral was held at the Congregational church, the sermon being delivered by the pastor, Rev. C. William Bast, followed by the funeral service of the Templars.

Native of Wisconsin. Mr. Welden was born in Wisconsin in 1845 and at the age of 18 engaged in teaching. His father was an officer in the army and returned home to recruit a company when Mr. Welden and an older brother enlisted, serving as a member of a company of Wisconsin infantry until the close of the war. With his father he came to lowa Falls in 1868 and engaged in the mercantile business. In 1874, Mr. Welden lost everything he had in a fire that lost everything he had in a fire that swept away the business part of the town. With renewed effort he started again and continued in business until a few months ago when he retired owing to poor health. He was postmaster here for several years. In 1885, he was made a Mason and later took the chapter degrees at Elidora and was knighted in St. Elmo commandery, No. 48, Knights Templar of this city. Later he was chosen eminent commander of the local commandery and served in that position for several years. In 1904, he was elected eminent grand commander of the Knights Templar of Iowa and had been a prominent member of the grand commandery for a number of years.

Active in Many Lines.

Active in Many Lines, served several year He served several years as a member of the lower house of the member of the lower house of the lows legislature. He was identified with the late E. S. Ellsworth in building the Short Line from here to Des Moines. He served in many positions in local affairs of the city with credit to himself and to the satisfaction of his constituents. He had been identified with the First National hank since its overant to nad been leaghtles with the First National bank since its organization and had for many years been its vice president. Few men in this country were better known than "Billy" Welden, as he was familiarly called. His long activity in mercantile circles as well as his prominence in politics gave him a wide acquaintance that extended over central and northern lowa. His wife died in the sixties. He is survived by two children, John Levi Welden, who was identified with him for many years in the mercantile trade, under the firm name of Welden & Son, and by a daughter, Mrs. Minnie R. **Henry Wehrman Family** 

An Act of Congress, April 24th, 1820, entitled, "An act making further provisions for the sale of public lands" was an act that provided the opportunity of buying lands for private use instead of having to homestead them. Henry Wehrman walked to Fort Des Moines, Iowa to buy 80 acres of land on April 14, 1855, for the sum of \$1.25 an acre. On October 1, 1855, he was given the patent signed by Franklin Pierce, for the ground, then in township 87. This place is now known to be Pleasant Township, located at Roughwoods Hill.

Upon the death of Lena, (Henry's wife) in 1922, Willis, the oldest son, bought his brother and sister's share of the estate. From that time on, this ground has been handed down from generation to generation. From Willis, to his daughter, Mrs. Pearl (Henry) Holthuis, and to her daughter, Mrs. Frances (Harold) Williams, who still holds the original

patent. The house that is there now, was thought to be the first frame built house in the county. The sawed lumber was brought by team and wagon from Davenport, Iowa. The basement walls are still the original stone, the hand hewn walnut beams still support the house and the walnut stairs and banister still remain in the house. However, through the years, much remodeling has been done to preserve the house and outside buildings.

In July 1874, Henry and Lena bought 80 acres east of them with farm land adjoining the original farm from Jesse and Caroline Newcomer for a sum of \$1100. Here Willis Wehrmans' family resided for many years. Included in this family were Neil (who never married), Mary, (Mrs. Walt Campbell), and Pearl, (Mrs. Henry Holthuis). In 1918, a cyclone completely demolished the farm and all the build-

s had to be completely rebuilt. Following the ath of Willis in 1929, Neil lived there until his leath in 1955. The farm was then sold to Paul

The Wehrmans were active in helping build the Roughwoods Church and Cemetery. The ground was donated by Mac Satchell. Here the Wehrmans went to church and also attended the Roughwoods school that they helped build.

Even though work on the farm was hard during the day, Neil, Mary, and Pearl were all known for their musical talent which they displayed in the evenings. The three of them played different instruments and were known for the music they played for special occasions and barn dances locally and in the surrounding communities.

Children of Mary (Wehrman) Campbell are: Daughter, Mrs. Dorothy (Everett) Gehrke, Grandson, Walter Howard. Son, Dale Campbell, Granddaughter, Ann, Grandson, Drew. Great Grand-daughter, Katie Campbell.

Children of Pearl (Wehrman) Holthuis are: Daughter, Mrs. Frances (Harold) Williams, Grandson, Dana Ramundt. Great-Grandson, Benjamin Ramundt.

#### Henry Weichman Sr.

Henry Weichman, Sr. and his wife, Maria were my grandparents and my father was their younger son, Frederick, who came to the Hubbard area in 1891. Grandfather bought the land on the west edge of what is now Hubbard for \$4.00 per acre from the Government. Those who bought prairie land and built on it were given 15 acres of timber. It was required that it remain in timber and not be cleared. It was used for building and fence posts

My grandparents and my father came to the S.A. in 1860 on a sailing ship. They were on board ht weeks. They were given bread and coffee, ovided by the ship cook. They brought with them cured smoked meats, sausage, dried fruit and cheese. Woten was corried in eachs and they were cheese. Water was carried in casks and they were not allowed to drink it unless boiled. Some ships did not enforce this rule and typhoid broke out.

Grandfather brought cuttings of fruit trees which

arrived in Wisconsin. He also started an orchard on the land in Hardin County. I remember the cherry, plum and apple trees. The apples were a variety I've not seen or eaten since.

An older son, Henry, and older sisters came earlier and settled in Wisconsin where the parents and my father went on their arrival. Land was bought between what is now Boscobel and Fennimore. Buildings were put up of native oak. The large barn and house are still in use.

My grandparents moved to Hardin County and broke prairie ground. My father cut trees and hauled the lap to a saw mill at Iowa Falls. He left before daylight with a load of logs, and back the next night with a load of lumber. All the buildings were of oak and all burned after Father sold them.

Grandfather gave land to the railroad for rightof-way. They went through the middle of the cropland so there were six railroad gates to open and close. These gates must be kept closed at all times.

My father helped build the first Evangelical Church, also organized the creamery in Hubbard. Previously Mother had churned and packed butter in wooden tubs which were shipped to Chicago via railroad. After the creamery was built fresh milk had to be taken in early. It was separated at the creamery. Later farmers had small separators and just delivered cream, took buttermilk (free) home to feed hogs.

I went to school part of first year in the old wood school. There was a large grove behind the school.

After my grandparents' death, my father sold the

land because it was cut by by railroad and bought land in Dickenson County in March of 1902.

There are many descendants of Weichman grandparents around Hubbard. Uncle Will Kuhlman gave the land for the cemetery northeast of Hubbard where my grandparents are buried. My sister, Dora, and I are the only ones left of our family. by Christine (Weichman) Arnold

#### Levi Welden

In the early 1800's, John Welden married Mary Taylor in upper New York state near Lake Champlain. Records of the Weldens in early days have been found but no real connection to this family. The 1790 census showed a William Welden family in New York City and a Francis Welden in New Palztown — both names used in Levi's family.

John and Mary had Edmond, Levi, Sidney, John, Annie, Nellie and Sally. Levi was born Aug. 6, 1817. He and his brother Edmond, moved westward and Levi married Julia Payne at Grand Ireton, Ill. on Nov. 6, 1830. Julia was born Jan. 28, 1821, probably in Vermont as her mother Angelina Claussen came from there

Levi didn't stay long in one place — he guided wagon trains, made 2 trips to California gold rush, but found no fortune. Too old to enlist in the Civil War, he recruited 2 companies and went along as did sons Francis and William.

In 1865 he loaded his wife, brother Edmund and children William, Francis, Mary, Ella Dora, Samuel Halbert, and Isabelle and started for Colorado. At Ackley, Iowa, one horse died, they hitched up the cow, but the other horse died at Iowa Falls — and that is why you find a lot of Weldens in this town.

Francis was killed while helping his father build an engine house in Charles City. His only son's wife


Mary married Bill Kasch and moved west, Ella and Isabelle married the McDowell brothers and their children moved elsewhere.

William, who lived until manhood with his grandmother Angelina, became a very successful lowa Falls merchant, postmaster and member of state legislature. He had John and Minnie. John married Lou Olmstead and had Faith of Dows, Neil, whose son John and family live here as do Katherine and John, Jr. Minnie married Edward Sanders.

Samuel Halbert married Mary Ann (Molly) Ely daughter of James and Sarah Downey Ely. They had Alice, William, Frank, Ernest, Fred, Isador, Lewis and Doris. Doris, who married Lindley Sawver lives in Chicago.

Levi built many railroad depots and buildings and bridges throughout Iowa and even in Texas and Colorado. A number of his grandsons have been engineers and Welden Brothers through several generations have continued to build bridges.

Levi died May 28, 1887 and his wife preceded him in death on Nov. 18, 1882. Mrs. Arthur Westbury

Samuel Halbert, 'Hab' Welden was born March 27, 1857 in Muscoda, Wis. In 1880 he married Mary Ann 'Molly' Ely, daughter of James and Sarah Downey Ely. The Elys had come to Iowa Falls a few years before from Utica, New York where they had lived along the Erie Canal. Sarah and her mother and sisters and brothers came from Londonderry, Ireland in a sailing ship that took two months when adverse winds blew them back. James was the seventh son of an English brewer.

Hab helped in brother Billie's store and ran the Northwestern Bottling works for many years. His daughters Alice and Isador died as young women; Doris lives in Chicago with her husband Lindley

Sawyer.

William Welden married Elizabeth Wilkinson and their children were Richard, Robert, Rosemary (Whitely) and Janet (Blum).

Frank married Aura Roberts and children are Dorothy (Westbury) and Sheila, (Hagman). After Aura's death he married Bessie Culbertson who survives him.

Ernest married Helen Parmalee, children are Molly (Alcorn), David and Ann (Barker)

Fred a Navy career man, married Edith Langworthy of Dubuque.
