Committees have been appointed to cover every detail of the 1932 St. Ambrose college homecoming celebration Friday, Nov. 4. The program has also been arranged for the two days preceding the homecoming game between Iowa Wesleyan and St. Ambrose.

About 100 cars are expected to take part in the parade thru the down town streets to the stadium where the tilt will start at 2 o'clock.

The homecoming banquet will be served at 6 o'clock in the college refectory. It is expected that one of the largest crowds of returning alumni in the history of the school will be present. Invitations have been sent to every alumnus and a public invitation to take part in the festivities will be read in every parish of the Davenport diocese on Sunday, Oct. 30.

The preceding evening the annual mammoth pep meeting will be held on the campus and the public is invited to attend. The band will give a half hour concert starting at 7:30. Following this the bonfire will be lighted.

The grounds will be decorated and large lights will play over the crowd. A public address system will be installed with loud speakers scattered about the campus so that the addresses given by the speakers may be heard by all. The speakers have not been selected.

Thomas Coughlin, president of the alumni association, is general chairman of the affair, while Ben Reidy and Martin McCarthy will have charge of the pep meeting at which the Rev. Leo Sterck will act as master of ceremonies.

The banquet will be in charge of Bob Feeney, and William Gallagher and Walter Reese have been appointed by Mr. Coughlin to handle the parade and various decorations.

The student council of the college and academy departments will manage the class floats and decorations. Ten members of the college department have been appointed as official welcome and

F. G. BALLUFF DIES AT 60 IN PHILADELPHIA

Former Davenport Assem- blyman Once Clerk for C. A. Ficke.

Frank G. Balluff, 60, former Iowa state representative and a member of the first Davenport police and fire commission, died Wednesday in Philadelphia, where he was a member of the insurance firm of Balluff and Snider.

Mr. Balluff, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John C. Balluff, was born in Davenport April 2, 1872. He attended Davenport schools and for many years was a clerk in the office of the late Attorney C. A. Ficke. He married Miss Mattie Rostock here in 1892, her death following in 1926.

The deceased was a representative in the 32nd Iowa general assembly and a member of the Davenport lodge of Elks and Knights of Columbus. Surviving are five brothers, August A. and John B. Balluff of Davenport, Joseph Balluff of Chicago, Albert A. Balluff of California, and Henry E. Balluff of Philadelphia; and two sisters, Mrs. Mary Hoffman of Davenport and Mrs. Lucy Kimmett of Springfield, Mo.

Funeral services will be held Friday morning in Philadelphia.
