# SEN. J. R. DORAN FUNERAL HELD WEDNESDAY Prominent Land Owner And Politician Died Monday


Hon. Justin R. Doran, known to have been the largest individual land owner in Boone county passed away Monday afternoon at his home south of Beaver. Death was caused from heart trouble which he has been suffering from for the past three weeks. Mr. Doran passed away just at 5:30 in the presence of all his surviving children with the exception of Lucien, who resides near Luther. Lucien was on his way to his parents home having been summoned when it was known the end was near.

Mr. Doran is survived by his wife, eight sons and three daughters The family have the sympathy of a wide circle of friends, not only in Beaver township, this county and city, but over the state in the death of their husband and father.

The funeral services were held at the home near Beaver, Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Interment was made in the Beaver cemetery.

Known for his sturdy pioneer virtures, the Beaver patriach won his way to a high place in the esteem of his neighbors and friends in this county He came to Boone county about 50 years ago and settled near his present home at Beaver. His thrift and business acumen resulted in the accumulation of extensive property holdings. In Boone county alone his farm land holdings were

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

#### OBITUARY.

Justin R. Doran was , born in Niagara county, N. Y., August 8, 1850, and died at his home here on the 13th day of October, 1924. Age 74 years, 2 months and 5 days.

He was one of eight children. His parents Patrick and Catherine (Keeley) Doran, both natives of County Carlow, Ireland, immigrated to the U. S. landing at N. Y. February 1st 1849 and went by packet boat by way of the Eric Canal to Reynolds Basin, Niagara county, where the deceased was born. Later the family moved to Ottawa, Ill., where the father engaged in farming.

While the family was residing in La Salle, county, Ill., the mother passed away on August 25, 1855. Mr. Doran was then but five years of age On November 25, 1865 the father passed away leaving Mr. Doran an orphan at the age of 15 years being then thrown upon his own resources he carned his own living while attending the country school by doing chores.
