For the past two or three weeks his immediate family and his many friends have awaited resignedly the departure which came Monday night of this week. Senator Doran has lived in these quarters for many years and has been prominently identified with the civic and political life of the Co. and the state. He was repeatedly re-elected state senator from his district. By careful management and foresight he amassed a large fortune and was reputed to be the heaviest landholder in this section of the country. Of an unimpeachable character, a disposition which brought him many friends which he held, and an intellect sure to bring recognition among his fellow man, his loss and passing will be noted with more than ordinary import. SEN. J. R. DORAN FUNERAL HELD WEDNESDAY

Prominent Land Owner And Politician Died Monday

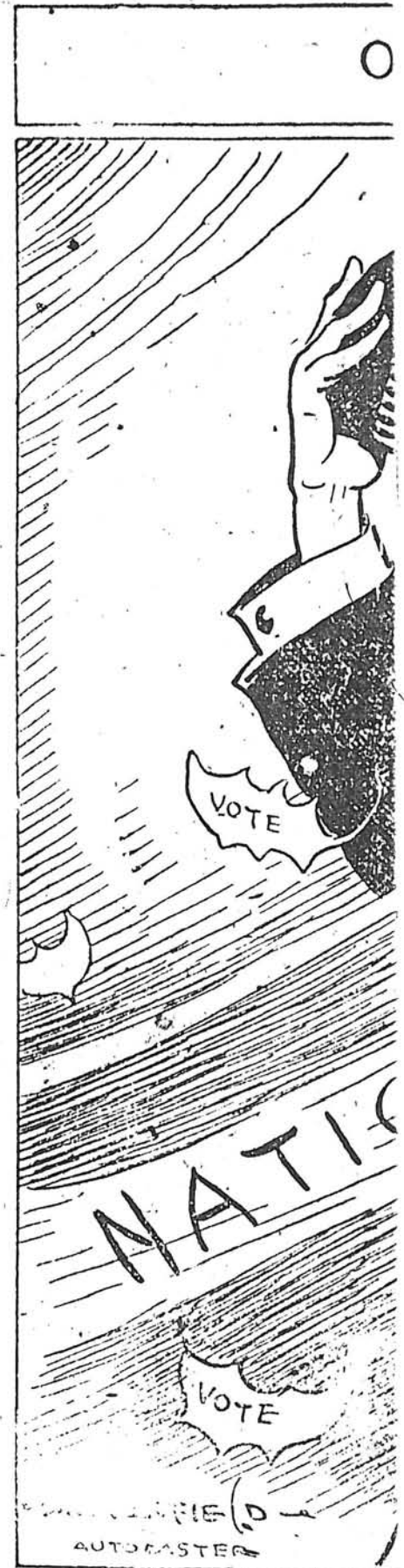
Hon. Justin R. Doran, known to have been the largest individual land owner in Boone county passed away Monday afternoon at his home south of Beaver. Death was caused from heart trouble which he has been suffering from for the past three weeks. Mr. Doran passed away just at 5:30 in the presence of all his surviving children with the exception of Lucien, who resides near Luther. Lucien was on his way to his parents home having been summoned when it was known the end was near.

Mr. Doran is survived by his wife, eight sons and three daughters. The family have the sympathy of a wide circle of friends, not only in Beaver township, this county and city, but over the state in the death of their husband and father.

The funeral services were held at the home near Beaver, Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Interment was made in the Beaver cemetery.

Known for his sturdy pioneer virtues, the Beaver patriarch won his way to a high place in the esteem of his neighbors and friends in this county. He came to Boone county about 50 years ago and settled near his present home at Beaver. His thrift and business acumen resulted in the accumulation of extensive property holdings. In Boone county alone his farm land holdings were

him the largest land owner in the county and one of the wealthiest in

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Judicious management, incessant labor, and modern and up-to-date methods were the means by which Mr. Doran attained his prosperity, said a biographer several years ago.

In political affairs Mr. Doran was a faithful member of the republican party and his service to his party and community was rewarded with election twice as a member of the house of representatives of the Iowa General Assembly and once as a member of the state senate from the Boone-Story district. His work in the state legislature was a consistent stand in favor of economy and common sense in the conduct of the state government.

Mr. Doran had been in failing health for the last year but he continued to keep up his activity about the farm and his supervision of his other interests until he was confined to his bed three weeks ago with heart trouble. He was 74 years of age.—B. N-R.

OBITUARY

Justin R. Doran was born in Niagara county, N. Y., August 8, 1850, and died at his home here on the 13th day of October, 1924. Age 74 years, 2 months and 5 days.

He was one of eight children. His parents Patrick and Catherine (Keeley) Doran, both natives of County Carlow, Ireland, immigrated to the U. S. landing at N. Y. February 1st 1849 and went by packet boat by way of the Erie Canal to Reynolds Basin, Niagara county, where the deceased was born. Later the family moved to Ottawa, Ill., where the father engaged in farming.

While the family was residing in La Salle, county, Ill., the mother passed away on August 25, 1855. Mr. Doran was then but five years of age. On November 25, 1865 the father passed away leaving Mr. Doran an orphan at the age of 15 years being then thrown upon his own resources he earned his own living while attending the country school by doing chores. In 1872 he and one of his brothers purchased a corn shelling outfit and operated the same in Benton county, Iowa. Later he worked in an elevator at Blairstown and because of lack of funds was required to sleep in the elevator at nights.

In 1874 he with his brothers moved to Boone county, Iowa, and settled
