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FUNERAL SERVICES FOR C. G. GREENWOOD

Prominent Silver City Banker and
Lumberman and Former Repre-
sentative Died at Home in
Silver City Sunday Night

Funeral services were held Wednes-
day in Silver City for C. G. Green-
wood, 93, retired prominent business
man of that city, who died Sunday at
9 p. m. of infirmities due to ad-
vanced age.

The services were held at 2 o'clock
at the Baptist church. Burial was in
the Silver City cemetery.

Mr. Greenwood was born in Maine
but spent most of his life in Silver
City. He founded and was president
of the Greenwood Lumber Company
which runs a chain of yards in south-
western Iowa. He was formerly
president of the Silver City State bank
and represented this county in the
state legislature some years ago.

His wife died ten years ago. Sur-
viving him are five children, C. D.
Greenwood of Emerson, Iowa; Mrs.
G. A. Spelbring, Mrs. Morris Kehos
and Mrs. Grace Hawley, all of Silver
City and Mrs. Cora Conger of Gales-
burg, Ill.

BEGIN PAVING ON TABOR ROAD

The first load of sand to be used on
the pavement of the nine-mile road
north of Tabor on No. 4 arrived Mon-
day and was unloaded at the Hurl-
butt crossing two and one-half miles
northeast of Tabor. The side track
of the Tabor and Northern railroad
has been lengthened to 700 feet and
an area will be rented from W. W.
Glynn for the unloading and storage
of materials.

This crossing is a mile east of No.
4 at a point two miles north of Tabor
and will save the contractors consid-
erable in the expense of hauling ma-
terials for five and one-half miles of
and Northern by this arrangement
will profit by getting to haul ma-
terials for five and one-half miles of
the road. The water pipes are laid
most of the distance and the pouring
of cement will begin the first of the
week when the road will be closed to
all traffic for sixty days.
