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

### BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE OFFICERS

DAN W. TURNER.—Governor. Born in Corning, Adams county, Iowa, March 17, 1877. Educated in Corning public schools and Corning Academy. Served in Spanish-American war, May 30th, 1898 to November 2nd, 1899, Philippine expedition. Ten years in Iowa national guard. Member state senate in thirtieth, thirty-first and thirty-second general assemblies. Farmer and merchant. Married,

three children. Elected gowernor, November, 1930. Republican.

ARCH W. McFarlane.—Lientenant Governor, was born in Waterloo, Iowa, April 14, 1885, educated in the public schools, and was graduated from high school in 1904. Was married April 6, 1908, to Miss Elsie V. Hawkins. He is now engaged in the wholesale fuel business, with headquarters at Waterloo. Is a member of Christ Episcopal church, being a vestryman of that church. Is a member of the various branches of the Masonic order, including El-Kahir shrine, Knights of Pythias, Elks, Loyal Order of Moose, and is a supreme officer of the United Commercial Travelers. Elected a member of the Iowa house of representatives in 1914, re-elected in 1916-18 and 1920. Was speaker pro tem of the thirty-eighth special and thirty-ninth general assemblies. Elected to the senate in 1926 as a member of the forty-second general assembly. Was nominated for lieutenant governor by the state central committee in 1928, elected lieutenant governor in the November election of that year and re-elected in November, 1930. In politics he is a republican.

G. C. GREENWALT. - Secretary of State, was born at Hastings, Mills county, Iowa, March 23, 1889. His father, L. L. Greenwalt, was born in Fremont county, Iowa; his mother, Lula Wood Greenwalt, is a native of Kansas. He attended the public schools of Hastings, graduating from the high school in 1907. He entered Simpson College, Indianola, graduating from the department of business in 1911. He taught and coached athletic teams in the Creston high school and in 1913 was appointed instructor in North high school, Des Moines, where he remained until May, 1917, when he entered service in the World War. In August, 1917, he was commissioned second lieutenant infantry and was assigned to the 88th Division, at Camp Dodge, Iowa. In July, 1918, he was promoted to first lieutenant and went to France with his division. He was returned to United States and honorably discharged in August, 1919. When the Iowa national guard was reorganized after the war, he was commissioned captain and assigned to command Company A 168th infantry. In May, 1923, he was promoted to major and since that date has commanded the first battalion 168th infantry. After leaving the service in 1919 he again took up school work at East high school, Des Moines. In 1922 he was appointed to an administrative position with the United States Veterans Bureau, which he held until 1930. He was married in August, 1917, to Margherita Cook, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Cook, formerly of Hampton. They have three sons. He is a member of the Methodist Episcopal church, the American Legion, and the Masonic order. A republican in politics.

J. W. Long.—Auditor of State, was born on a farm in Ringgold county, Iowa, June 26, 1873. He received his early education in the rural schools, attended Simpson college, Indianola, Iowa, and Western Normal college, Shenandoah, Iowa, graduating from the latter in 1896. He taught in rural schools two years; served as superintendent of city schools for five years; and was elected county superintendent of Decatur county, Iowa, in 1906; re-elected in 1908 and again in 1910. Moved to Ames, Story county, Iowa, in 1916, and became a traveling salesman for county officials' supplies, until elected auditor of state November 2, 1926. He was married June 22, 1898, to Emma M. # TURNER, IOWA Nixon Gives **GOVERNOR IN** THE '30s, DIES

### Courageous Leader In Depression

By George Mills

Dan Turner, courageous governor of Iowa during the turbulent depression years of 1931-1933, died Tuesday afternoon at Rosary Hospital in Corning. He was 92.

The venerable Iowa elder statesman, who lived in Corning all his life, entered the hospital

### A "Fighter"

# No Hint of A Response

Leased Wire to The Register WASHINGTON, D.C. - President Nixon faced a severe international challenge Tuesday with North Korea's claim that it shot down a U.S. Navy electronics plane that allegedly penetrated its air space.

The loss of the reconnaissance plane with 31 persons aboard raised fears of another Pueblo-type incident. Senator Strom Thurmond (Rep., S.C.) called the unarmed EC-121 a "flying Pueblo."

Mr. Nixon discussed the problem at a series of meetings with his top advisers and with congressional leaders and plans to take it up at a previously scheduled meeting today of the National Security Council.

### No Hint

There was no hint of how or whether the White House would respond to the North Koreans, who seized the intelligence ship Pueblo in January, 1968, in an area 200 miles from where search operations were launched for the EC-121 crew.

Late Tuesday American officials were reviewing possible options ranging all the way from diplomatic protest to a retaliatory attack on some North Korean military air field.



During his one term as governor occurred the so-called "cow war" in eastern Iowa.

### Called Out Guard

That "war" consisted of an uprising of farmers who objected to mandatory testing of cattle for tuberculosis. Mr. Turner had to call out the Na--tional Guard, which converged on Tipton to guard veterinarians charged with the task of cattletesting.

Also while he was governor, the worst agricultural depression of modern times deepened, as did the widespread business and industrial depression.


Governor Turner made two trips to Washington, where he warned President Hoover that something had to be done to halt the downward trend which engulfed banks by the hundreds, resulted in tens of thousands of Iowans losing their farms through foreclosure, brought corn down to 12 cents a bushel and saw unemployment grow to disastrous proportions.

Mr. Hoover, however, did not believe the situation was quite as bad as painted by the plainspeaking Iowa governor.

The election of 1932 followed and both Mr. Hoover and Mr. Turner went down to defeat in a Democratic landslide.



Mr. Turner was a Corning merchant originally and an Adams County farmer with large holdings.

He was born Mar. 17, 1877, on a farm near Corning. In addition to farm chores, he clerked as a boy in a general store opened by his father in 1868.

### Liberal Tendencies

The elder Turner was a Civil War veteran and a rockbound Republican, and was troubled at times by his son's apparently liberal tendencies.

"Don't stray too far from the bugle, boy," the father warned. In those days, most war veterans believed you had to be a Republican to be a loyal American.

The late governor's full name was Daniel Webster Turner, but he never was known as anything but Dan W. Turner.

Shortly after his graduation from the old Corning Academy in 1898, he enlisted in the Army for service in the Spanish-American war. He served in the Philippines.

His fighting qualities included expertness with his fists. He won the boxing championship of his division, although he suffered a broken nose that remained a facial characteristic the rest of his life.

He joined the Iowa National Guard when he came home and rose to the rank of major before resigning 10 years later.

Mr. Turner was elected state senator from the old Adams-Taylor district in 1903. He was 26 years old, the youngest Iowan ever elected to the Senate up to that time.



While he was a senator, the Progressives forced the adoption of the direct primary for nominating major party candidates for office. The practice of railroads corrupting politicians and others with free passes also came to an end.

He was one of the finest public speakers of his time and he keynoted Republican state conventions three times.

During World War I he served as a Y.M.C.A. secretary in France. In World War II he worked with the War Production Board in Washington.

Agriculture was in deep trouble in 1928. Prices were low and many banks already had been forced to close beginning with the collapse that took place in rural areas beginning in 1920.


### Left Convention

By 1928 Mr. Turner, the late Henry A. Wallace and other irked Midwestern farm leaders went to the Republican National Convention in Kansas City, Mo., to demand support for agricultural relief.

Mr. Wallace left that convention and became a Democrat. He later was U.S. secretary of agriculture and vice-president under Franklin Roosevelt.

Mr. Turner was one of four speakers at the Kansas City convention who demanded greater Republican recognition and support for the farmer. He nelped draft a minority report setting out such a goal. The convention nominated Mr. Hoover. Mr. Turner decided to stay with the party.

In 1930 he ran for the Republican nomination for governor. He won the nomination

Mr. Turner came back in 1934 to win a bitter battle for the Republican nomination for governor over Robert Colffesh of Des Moines, Clarence Knutson of Clear Lake and Wallace Leo Short of Sioux City.

Mr. Turner campaigned against the sales tax that year. But the Democratic tide was still strong and Mr. Herring was re-elected by 74,000 votes.

Mr. Turner never ran for office again, although southwestern Iowa Republicans always felt that he could have been elected to Congress from the Seventh Congressional district had he wanted to become a candidate. Some Republicans who did not see eye-to-eye with him were just as glad that he did not run.

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



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

#### DANIEL WEBSTER TURNER

Daniel Webster Turner (1877-1969) was born in Corning, and spent most of his life here. After graduating from the Corning Academy, he worked with his father in the General Store and continued there for many years.

In 1900 he married Alice Sample Hayworth. There were three children; Marjorie who married Don Witt. She worked as a Psychologist in the New York City schools for lifteen years before she returned to Corning; Edward Bates who married Rowena Hawley. He died in 1946 of a combination of diseases contracted while serving in China in the Army; and Thomas Sample who married Isabel Lambly. He taught Music and Harmony at the University of Iowa, Iowa City until he retired recently.

Dan was a peace loving man, but he took part in three wars. He was a combat person in the Spanish American war; he was in France with the YMCA; and he served as a "dollar a year man" in Washington, D.C. where he supervised the Prison production of rope.

He distinguished himself by serving a term as Goveror of the State of lowa in 1932-34. Among other things, he will be remembered as having the courage to see that our laws were enforced. When farmers in eastern lowa protested at having their cattle tested for Tuberculosis, Dan called out the National Guard to see that the tests were made and the sick cattle destroyed.

His tenure as Governor of lowa was cut short by the dramatic democratic landslide and launch of the New Deal by Franklin D. Roosevelt (plus enemies created by the Cow War).

He and most of his brothers were a part of the local "hose team" — originally pulling the hose cart to fires, but later mostly a form of racing.

I remember him as a story-teller for the family children, particularly his continued stories of a fictional "Billy Brazee".

He was a civic minded person and backed many local projects.

He was instrumental in helping the farmers organize the NFO. He never went to college, but he was a great student and admirer of Abraham Lincoln, and well educated in governmental affairs. He was an excellent public speaker, and gave many a Memorial Day Address.

In his later years he lived by himself until his daughter retired and returned to Corning. He was an active supporter of the Presbyterian Church. He took daily walks to maintain his health. Submitted by Almira Turner

#### **FRANCIS AUSTIN TURNER**

Francis Austin Turner, born March 24, 1900, was the son of Austin Beecher and Ella Shuler Turner Jr. He had an older brother, Theodore, who died when he was two years old. Francis attended Corning schools and Kiskiminitas Spring School in Pennsylvania. He graduated from Grinnell College in 1921 and was the youngest student to graduate up to that time. He returned home to join the business operated by his father and Dan Turner.

In 1924 he was married to LaNor Holmes (born January 11, 1901) of Keota, lowa. They met while attending Grinnell. LaNor graduated Phi Beta Kappa and taught school one year in Wapello before her marriage. To this union a daughter, Sarah Jane and a son, Austin Beecher, were born. The family lived most of their married life in the home they built at 1202 Grove Avenue. In their latter years the couple lived in the carriage house at Happy Hollow Country Club (Edgewood). LaNor designed the plans for the extensive remodeling of the house into their unique home.

Besides devotion to their daughter, son, grandchildren and friends, theirs was a life of service and concern for their community and state. While active in farm management and in management of one of southwest lowa's oldest department stores, Francis took great interest in his community. He was a member of the original board of trustees of the Corning Municipal Utilities and served 20 years. He was on the City Council from 1928 to 1932 and spent 18 consecutive years on the Corning School Board. He initiated the formation and was president of the Adams County Weather Modification Association during a period of drought in this area. He was Adams County Savings Bond Chairman for 20 years until his death, During this time the country won several state awards. He was an active member of the Presbyterian church, Rotary International and the American Legion. He served in 1957 and 1959 as senator from Adams and Taylor counties in the Iowa State Senate.

LaNor was a learned sturdent all of her life which led to her interest in educartional and self-improvement projects. She was am officer of the Corning Public Library Board of Timustees for many years. Working in the lowa Federation of Women's Clubs she was chairman of the Pain American Committee at the time the student exchange program began. She served as State Chairman of the Scholarship and Loan Committee of thee Federation. She was a member of the board of thee lowa Children's Home Society in Des Moines, was active in the Corning Red Cross Blood Bank, was a member and president of P.E.O. Chapter C.V, the Corning Culture Club, and was active in Corning Departmental Clubs.

Francis lived for a little ower three years following a heart attack at a University of lowa football game. He died in Corning January 12, 1962.

LaNor lived to participate in the 100th Anniversary celebration for A.B. Turner and Son in October, 1968. She wrote the history of the store for the anniversary pamphlet, which served for future store histories. She died in Corning December 18, 1968. Submitted by Jo Ann G. Turner

### DANIEL W. TURNER

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Governor Darsiel W. Turner, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Daniel Webster Turner was born March 17, 1877, on a farm near Corning. Adams County, Iowa. He died April 15, 1969, at Corning, Iowa, 92 years old.

Shortly after graduation from the old Corning Academy in 1898, he enlisted in the Army for service in the Spanish-American war. He served in the Philippine 3.

He joined the lowe National Guard when he came home from the war and a to the rank of major before resigning ten years later.

In 1903 he was elected State Schator from the old Adams-Taylor County district. He was 26 years old, the youngest Iowan ever elected to the Senate up to that time.

He served six years in the Senate as a member of the Progressives who engaged in constant warfare with "Standpatters" for control of the Republican Party. When he was a Senator, the Progressives forced the adoption of the direct primary for nominating major party candidates for office.

He was one of the finest public speakers of his time and he keynoted Republican state conventions three times.

During World War I he served as a Y.M.C.A. secretary in France. In World War II he worked with the War Production Board in Washington.

In 1930 he won the Republican nomination for Governor and was elected.

Mrs. Turner died in 1961. A son, Ned, died at 39 while serving with the armed forces in China during World War II. Surviving are a son, Prof. Thomas Turner of the University of Iowa at Iowa City; a daughter, Mrs. Marjorie Witt of Mount Kisco, New York, and six grandchildren.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Sixty-third General Assembly of Iowa: That in the passing of Governor Daniel W. Turner, the State of Iowa has lost a valued and honored citizen and by this resolution attests its sincere sympathy to the family.

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\* \* \* Q.: What started the decline of live television drama?

A.: I think clearly it was "I Love Lucy". "I Love Lucy" was an excellent show with its generic type. It belonged in any program schedule; there was nothing against it. But the evil of "I Love Lucy" was that it started the trek to the West Coast. That meant that control of the program was taken away from the creative people and put back into the control of agencies. From this time on, television just started to go down hill.

Q.: Why did you deplore the move of TV to Hellywood?

A.: I think every astute observer recognized the profound danger to all responsible programming in a wholesale surrender of theater stan-

What made the golden age of television was the people who had come from the theater and who attacked the dramatic part of programming on the basis of theater standards, theater quality.

Of course the moment it went to Hollywood that disappeared; it became slick and it became safe, and the content became of very little importance. And this of course is the ad man's delight. This is exactly what he wants: Noncontroversial. It wasn't trying to be literate or articulate. It was simply telling a cliche story enormously skillfully.

Q.: What about a program like "Playhouse 90", which carried on in Hollywood for a while with stage methods?

A.: I think the difficulty with "Playhouse 90" is that it was almost impossible to maintain a standard of hour and a half original dramas as frequently in a year as this. I think this is one of the things that very few people seem to recognize about the problem of producing dramatic programs on television.
