- At age 9 in 1839, he moved with his family to the Territory of
Iowa, settling in Dubuque.
- After college he returned to Dubuque and began to study law
in the office of Davis and Russell.

in Company A, 3rd Iowa Infantry, later attained rank of 1st Lieutenant.
In Sept 1864 he was appointed Captain in the 4th U.S. Volunteers.
He took an interest in the National Guard and for 2 years was
Captain of Company A (Dubuque Rifles) of the 4th Regiment. He later was
elected Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment serving for 3 years.
- In 1870 he engaged in railroad building constructing several miles
of the Dubuque and Bellevue Road.
- In 1873 he went to Kansas as assistant attorney for the Missouri, Kansas
and Texas railroad. He also had charge of the Texas, Kansas
and Indian Territory business of the company for 2 years.
- In 1875 he formed a law partnership with Arthur McCann which
 lasted until 1881.
- His wife died 10 Apr 1909.

COL. P. W. CRAWFORD IN HIS LAST SLEEP

**DIED AT WALNUT STREET HOME
AT NOON FRIDAY, DECEMBER 9.**

CLOSE OF AN ACTIVE CAREER

**Resident of Dubuque Since 1839—
Served With Distinction Through
the Civil War.**

Col. P. W. Crawford died at his home, 154 Walnut street, at noon Friday.

His last illness dated back but about ten days, when he first called a physician, though he had been in failing health for some time. The immediate cause of his death was pneumonia.

At his bed side at the time of his death were Mrs. Arthur McArthur and Mrs. I. C. Chamberlain of this city and Mrs. J. G. Tomlinson of Seattle, Wash. Another daughter, Mrs. H. E. Erwin of New Britain, Conn., and two sons, Fred C., of Mason City, and Horace G. of Charles City were not present, though they will probably attend the funeral, the date of which has not yet been announced and will probably not be announced till the absent children can be heard from.

CHILDREN WERE CALLED.

Col. Crawford's condition became so grave a week or so ago that his children were notified and Mrs. Tomlinson came from Seattle and the two sons from their Iowa homes. When the father seemed to be gaining strength a day or two ago, the sons returned to their homes, but were not able to return in time to be at his bedside in his last moments.

BORN IN VERMONT.**

Phineas W. Crawford was born in Putney, Windham county, Vermont, in 1830 and was the descendant of a line of patriots who assisted in the founding of the colonies and later in

freeing them from the tyranny of English rulers. His first schooling was in the primitive schools of Vermont. In 1839, when he was but nine years old, his family moved to the territory of Iowa and settled in Dubuque. His father was an attorney and formed a partnership with Hon. Timothy Davis under the firm name of Davis & Crawford. This became one of the leading law concerns of the west and continued in existence till the death of Mr. Crawford in 1846.

EDUCATED IN DUBUQUE.

P. W. Crawford prepared for college in the public schools of Dubuque and entered Illinois college at Jacksonville, from which he graduated in 1849 with the degree of A. B. Returning to Dubuque, he began the study of law in the law office of Davis & Bissell and was admitted to the bar in 1851, since which time he has been continuously and successfully engaged in the practice of law. He was an earnest scholar, a man of deep research and at the bar was a logical and convincing speaker.

MARRIED IN 1852.

In December, 1852, he was married to the daughter of George W. Connell, who was one of the early settlers of Dubuque.

In 1854 Mr. Crawford was elected city recorder and was afterward three times re-elected. He was a member of the old Washington Guard for a number of years before the civil war.

ENLISTED IN ARMY.

In 1861 he responded to the call for troops issued by President Abraham Lincoln and entered the service as second lieutenant of company A, Third Iowa Infantry, under command of Captain R. G. Herron and Colonel N. G. Williams, of Dubuque. The regiment was first sent to Missouri, where it did service in February, 1862, when it went to Tennessee.

In the meantime Mr. Crawford had been made first lieutenant. At the battle of Shiloh he was wounded but refused to leave the battle field. He took part in the famous advance on Corinth, in the battles of Blue Mills and Monroe, Mo., Shiloh, Hatchet Bridge, the siege of Vicksburg and many other actions of less importance. In the spring of 1864 he took part in the Red River campaign under General Banks and on the 19th of June, his term of three years having expired, he was honorably discharged.

In the September following he was appointed a captain in the Fourth United States volunteers, commanded

AT EXECUTION OF ASSASSINS.

In the September following he was
appointed a captain in the Fourth
United States volunteers, commanded
by General Hancock, the regiment be-
ing generally known as the "Hancock
corps." While in this command he
served for a time in the Shenandoah
valley. He commanded the guard at
the United States naval arsenal in
Washington at the execution of Mrs.
Surratt and others for complicity in
the assassination of President Lincoln.
During the winter of 1865-6, he com-
manded the garrison at Tod Barracks,
Columbus, O., and in May, 1866, was
mustered out and returned to his home
in Dubuque.

IN NATIONAL GUARD.

Since the close of the war Mr. Craw-
ford has taken a keen interest in the
national guard of the state and for two
years was captain of Company A (Du-
buque Rifles) of the Fourth regiment
and was subsequently elected lieuten-
ant colonel of the regiment, in which
capacity he served for three years.

HELD PUBLIC OFFICE.

The year after he returned from his
service in the United States army he
was appointed deputy United States
marshal for the northern district of
Iowa, serving three years. In 1870 he
engaged in railroad building and con-
structed several miles of the Dubuque
and Bellevue road. In 1873 he went to
Kansas as assistant attorney for the
Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad and
had charge of the Texas, Kansas and
Indian Territory business of the com-
pany for two years. In 1875 he form-
ed a law partnership with Arthur Mc-
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when it was dissolved by mutual con-
sent. In 1881 he was elected alder-
man of the Fourth ward, serving six
years. Again in 1890 he was chosen
to that office and was re-elected in 1892
and in 1894. He has been a republi-
can most of his years and served as
county chairman, and at different times
attended state and other conventions
of the party.

The last office held by Col. Craw-
ford was that of state senator from
Dubuque county.
