## GLARING LIGHTS MUST GO.

### Motor Vehicle Law to be Enforced in County Every County of Iowa

The Iowa law against glaring headlights on automobiles is to be strictly enforced in every county in Iowa. His decision was recently reached at the attorney general's office where it was conclusively shown that many of the most frightful accidents result in loss of life were entirely due to the use of glaring headlights used in violation of the state law.

The law governing the use of headlights on automobiles provides that the light shall not be thrown higher than 22 inches at a distance of 75 feet from the car. F. P. ### Road Will Run Due South From Adel To DE-Soto

The state highway commission has decided that the next project to be attempted in Dallas county will be the building of a new road to straighten primary No. 25 where it leaves Adel.

This is the road that leads to Winterset. It leaves Main street at the corner of the East Hotel and goes straight south for three blocks, turns east three blocks, and then rambles around the outskirts of town. It is a very crooked road. The new plans call for a road beginning at the corner of the National Bank building and running straight south until it almost reaches the township line. The road will then angle slightly to the township line and will go straight to De Soto.—Dallas County Record.

Robert A. Greene, for many years engaged in the general mercantile business at Peru and member of the Iowa General Assembly from this county for two terms, died at his home 1407 22nd street Des Moines, last Friday morning. Mr. Greene, who was 60 years of age, died from an attack of heart trouble while at the breakfast table. He was prominent in the affairs of the Des Moines Consistory and in the Shrine and attended the Shriner's stone laying the day prior to his death. His family consists of the wife, one son and one daughter.

Those who will journey to Dallas are Commissioner B. M. Richardson, Commerce Counsel J. H. Henderson, and W. F. Parsons, chief rate clerk.

During the hearing at Dallas, representatives of the southwestern states will ask the commission to segregate their states into a separate area as distinguished from the northwestern states.

Iowa's representatives, together with those of other states of this section, will fight this attempt to secede. In 1920, they will point out, when the northwest was solvent and capable of bearing a heavy freight burden, and the southwest was in straitened circumstances, and attempt to create separate areas was denied by the federal commission.

Now, with these conditions reversed, the northwestern representatives will urge that there is sufficient cause to deny the southwest's attempted secession on the same grounds that served to retain the sections in one area five years ago.

This point will be the principal object of the appearance of the Iowa representatives at the Dallas hearing. They will not introduce further testimony against the application for the 5 per cent rate increase, for the present.

The commission, however, is compiling a great mass of statistics to be used in opposition to the increase when a further hearing is held in Kansas City in January.

## ROBERT GREENE DIES SUDDENLY AT HOME HERE

Former State Legislator Was 60 Years Old.

Stricken while at the breakfast table yesterday morning, Robert A. Greene, prominent Shriner and former member of the state legislature, died from heart disease before medical aid could reach him.

He was 60 years old and had been in good health. He participated in the Shrine cornerstone laying and the festivities at the Coliseum Thursday. Mr. Greene lived at 1407 Twenty-second street.

Mr. Greene had long been prominent in lodge activities in the state and in addition to holding offices in the Shrine and Masonic lodge, was past senior counselor of the United Commercial Travelers and a director of the Iowa State Traveling Men's association.

He served as a member of the state legislature in 1902, 1904 and 1905.

Surviving him are his wife, a daughter, Sefer Greene; a son, Robert A. Greene, jr.; a brother, William W. Greene of Cedar Rapids, Ia., and two sisters, Mrs. Sarah Kimball of Cedar Rapids and Mrs. Mary McCrary of Hastings, Neb.

Funeral services will be held Monday afternoon from Dunn's funeral parlor at 3:30 and burial will be in Glendale, Masonic cemetery.
