Stock Association Opposes Meat Controls

FRANCISCO, Jan. 11.—(U)—Barnett of Lone, Calif., real president of the American stock association, today emphasized resolutions passed by delegates at the 5th annual convention of the association, condemning controls on meats. The group adopted resolutions to be in effect at the close of a three-session. Fort Worth, Texas, was held as the site of the 1932 convention. An alternative to controls, such as meat rationing, the delegates called for increased production. They also endorsed legislation favoring the use of public lands for grazing.

Chas. Kennedy, Montrose, Dies

Charles A. Kennedy of Montrose, former Iowa representative in congress, died in his home at 10:20 o'clock Wednesday night after an illness of the last 18 months.

He served in the Iowa legislature from 1903 until 1908 and then was elected as first district representative to the congress of the United States, serving from 1908 until 1920. At the time of his retirement from the house he served as chairman of the rivers and harbors committee. For the last 30 years he has been in retirement at his home at Montrose.

The son of the late William and Maria Williams Kennedy, he was born in Montrose March 24, 1860, and received his education in the schools there.

He and his brother, John P. Kennedy, acquired the nursery of H. M. Crouse in 1885 and continued in that work until 1906. As a young man he held various town and township offices and at one time was mayor of Montrose.

He was a member of St. Barnabas Episcopal church in Montrose, Joppa Lodge 136 A. F. and A. M., and Martha chapter No. 5, Order of Eastern Star.

Surviving are a brother, George W. Kennedy of Montrose, and three sisters, Mrs. Frank Kerr and Miss Lily Kennedy, both of Montrose, and Mrs. F. D. Butzer of Los Angeles, as well as nieces, nephews and other relatives. Preceding him in death were a sister, Mrs. Eva Chapman, and three brothers, Timothy, John and William.

The funeral will be held in the Schmidt Memorial Home Friday at 2:30 p. m. with the Rev. Charles Hawtrey of Fort Madison officiating. Burial will be in the Montrose cemetery.

More Than 100,000 Visit Mark Twain's Home During Year

Many records were established in 1930 and among them was that of attendance at the Mark Twain Home and Museum in Hannibal which attracted more than 100,551 visitors.

Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Howell, custodians, say that that many signed their names and gave their addresses in registry during the year.

It has been estimated by John A. Winkler, chairman of the Mark Twain municipal board, that some 30 per cent of those calling failed to register. All 48 states were represented on the register as well as Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Panama Canal Zone. In addition there were 33 foreign countries—almost every one in fact except Russia.

The 100,000th registrant was from Copenhagen, Denmark.

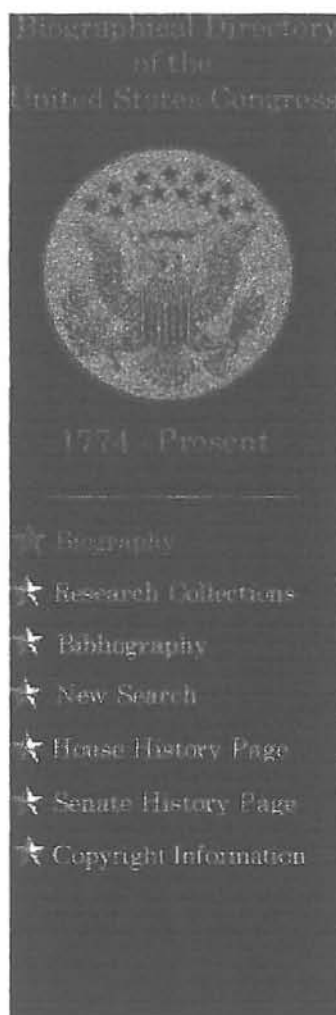

KENNEDY, Charles Augustus, 1869-1951

KENNEDY, Charles Augustus, a Representative from Iowa; born in Montrose, Lee County, Iowa, March 24, 1869; completed preparatory studies; interested in horticultural pursuits and later engaged in business as a nurseryman; mayor of Montrose 1890-1895; member of the State house of representatives 1903-1905; elected as a Republican to the Sixtieth and to the six succeeding Congresses (March 4, 1907-March 3, 1921); chairman, Committee on Mileage (Sixtieth and Sixty-first Congresses), Committee on Rivers and Harbors (Sixty-sixth Congress); was not a candidate for renomination in 1920; engaged in banking until his retirement; died in Montrose, Iowa, January 10, 1951; interment in Montrose Cemetery.
