COUNTY MOURNS McCLURKIN DEATH

Many Friends Shocked By Sad News

PROMINENT MAN IN PROGRESS.

The citizens of Louisa county were shocked and grieved yesterday when word was sent over the county announcing the death of Ed. L. McClurkin, prominent figure in the progress of Morning Sun and the entire county during the past thirty years, which occurred that morning.

No death in recent years has been the cause of such general regret over the entire county, as occasioned by the death of Mr. McClurkin. He was an upright man in every respect and the confidence in which he was held has been evidenced many times and in many ways.

He was a native of Morning Sun, having been born there August 20, 1854, and had lived there all the 68 fruitful years of his life. When a young man he became engaged in business at Morning Sun, and his rise to prominence and success was steady and sure. He was a staunch republican in politics, fair-minded and consistent. His sterling character and dependable principles gained for him the confidence of the people of the county, and as the result he was given several terms in the house of the

Iowa assembly as representative from this county. He was a good business man and at the time of his death he had accumulated considerable real estate and was president and owner of the Exchange Bank of Morning Sun.

His last illness was of short duration, covering a period of less than a week. A bad cold, developed into pneumonia, and he was called to his last rest, before many of his friends in other parts of the county knew that he was ill.

Surviving is his wife, who was Miss Cassie Beck, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Beck, and three sons, Clifford, Oak and Justus, and one daughter, Mrs. June Belsler, all of the Morning Sun community.

Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the United Presbyterian church in Morning Sun.

START DRIVE FOR ARMENIAN RELIEF

Iowa Asked For Corn For the Starving

ELEVATORS TO HANDLE IT FREE

To the friends of the suffering: Iowa is again called on for help for the poor starving Armenians. You have doubtless read the accounts of the suffering and the need in this, the cradle of the christian religion, and what you have read is not exaggerated, may it hardly could be exaggerated.

We, the United States Armenian Relief, have 110,000 orphans in 28 orphanages, and 36 hospitals, and in connection to this there are over 3,000,000 refugees driven out from their homes, in the late uprising of the Turks, that resulted in the burning of Smyrna. Without homes, almost without clothing, and compelled to live on what they can find in a country already devastated by war, and famine, their condition is pitiable. It is estimated that \$13,000,000 will be needed from the States to even keep these people alive till they can in some way help themselves.

We, the undersigned executive committee have been asked to take charge of the work and if possible raise the apportionment for Louisa county. This we cannot do unless we have the hearty co-operation of every person in the county. If we have that, only a small amount from each will be sufficient. Indeed 17c per day, \$5 per month, will clothe, feed and school one of our orphans for a month.

Corn, the one thing that Iowa has the most of is what is asked for. If you do not have the corn to give, give to buy corn with.

The Wapello farmers' elevator has offered to handle all corn brought in for this purpose free of charge and we presume that all the elevators in the county will do the same.

From here the corn will be shipped to the Oat Meal Mills at Cedar Rapids, where it will be made into the various corn products, free of charge, then shipped, free of charge to the seaboard, and loaded into vessels and transported to the nearest point of delivery, also free of charge. We are not asked for clothing. We are asked for corn. Other states that do not have a corn surplus will be asked for clothing.

Now, it may be that you have already done something for this need. If you have either taken up corn or money, please notify Mr. S. H. Archibald of Wapello, who is the treasurer for the county, of the fact, so that Louisa county may have the credit for the same. What thou doest do quickly.

Ducks and geese are making their appearance in considerable numbers and the shooting implements are being put in order.—Wapello Republican, February 11, 1916. That was a patriotic year and we suppose the hordes of wildfowl were greeted with an extra large force of heavy artillery. Suppose this item may bring the sparkle back to the eye of some of the old-time hunters as they recollect what fine spring shooting they once had. Let's hope it doesn't get any of the younger fellows excited about the spring shooting this year!

This is now the "dull season" for the sportsman. It once was, that at this time the old "stove warmers" would begin to unwind their legs and prepare to crawl out of their cozy nest in order to greet the ducks and geese in their northward flight. But time has changed things. Nothing to hunt now but rabbits and that's getting old. So, there's nothing left but to get ready for the fishing season. Although that opens May 15, bass should not be caught until almost a month later, and a few expect to wait, if they can stand the pressure. Consider—that's four long months away. It sure is a dull season! A few of the boys have started as "amateur fly tyers"—that is tying artificial flies and lures in anticipation of the fishing season. That helps pass away the time. Others are getting rods, reels and lines in shape. This is a good time to repair your rod. Putting new enamel on your steel rod or re-varnishing your bamboo is not a hard job if you know how. It will prevent the steel rod from rusting, and the bamboo rod from disintegrating. Doc Hoag is equipped with material and ability to do the work to perfection and at a nominal figure. Old Columbus City was about a fourth of a mile east of the present town.

NOTES.

Hillsboro and LaFayette are now the north part of Columbus Junction. Old Clifton was once an important shipping point two miles west of Columbus Junction. The establishment of this place killed the town and only one or two families live on the site of the old town.

There were two Port Louisas; West Port Louisa in 1848, out next to the bluff; the other on the banks of the river in 1854. Nearly all the ground on which the newer town stood is now occupied by the Mississippi river, only one house standing, we are told.

Erick was absorbed by Erick Junction a mile west. Sterling is a part of the present village of Toolesboro, which lies under the bluff.

Harrison was across the river and a mile and a half above Wapello. No town there for nearly fifty years.

Burriss City was above the mouth of the Iowa, almost opposite to New Boston, Illinois. It was a boom town and might have become a place of importance if the Air Line Railroad had been built. As it was, it broke Nate Burriss and the Ellsworths, who founded it, entirely up and badly crippled the whole surrounding country. Pittsburgh was a half mile this side (north) of Bard not far from Pittsburgh Point, where the railroad cut is.

Bard was never a village; merely a railway station. Was first established east of Long Creek, but a few years later was taken to its present location. Was a postoffice for some years but discontinued soon after the establishment of rural mail routes.

Old Wapello was located on the site of the present town. It was directly south of the present town.

EDWARD LOGAN McCLURKIN.

One of the pioneer families of Louisa county and Morning Sun is represented in the banking circles of this town in the person of Edward Logan McClurkin, whose birth occurred on the 20th of August, 1857. He is the son of the late Henry and Nancy J. (Logan) McClurkin, the father a native of Ohio and the mother of Indiana. The father, who was a stock buyer and shipper located in Morning Sun in 1855, where for several years he was engaged in the mercantile business, and during which time he also acted as postmaster. Seven children were born unto Mr. and Mrs. McClurkin: Margaret, the wife of M. Ochiltree, of this city; Kate, who married R. M. Pomeroy, of Shelby, Iowa; E. L., our subject; William H., of Morning Sun; Martin L. and Norah, both of whom are deceased; and one who died in infancy.

The preliminary education of Edward Logan McClurkin was acquired in the public schools of his native city, the course of which he completed in 1876, being one of the first graduates from the high school. Subsequently he attended the State University at Iowa City for a year and a half. Returning home he assisted his father in the store and postoffice, where he remained until 1886. He then joined his brother-in-law, William Beck, in establishing the Exchange Bank, of which institution he is now the cashier.

Mr. McClurkin was united in marriage on the 10th of November, 1881, to Miss Cassie A. Beck, a daughter of Conrad and Sophia Beck, natives of Germany but for many years residents of Des Moines county, where the father engaged in agricultural pursuits. Unto Mr. and Mrs. McClurkin have been born the following children: Oak B., a resident of Morning Sun; Elizabeth Jane, the wife of F. C. Selzer, of Detroit, Michigan; Clifford H., who is attending college at Monmouth, Illinois; and Justus Logan, who is at home.

Mr. and Mrs. McClurkin hold membership in the United Presbyterian church, and his political support he grants to the candidates of the republican party. He has always been quite prominently identified with the political activities of the community and has several times served as mayor, while he has three times represented his district in the state legislature. A public-spirited, progressive citizen and capable business man Mr. McClurkin stands high in the esteem of the general community, where he has spent practically the entire period of his life and where the comrades of his youth are the friends of his manhood.

EWALD M. WERNER.

A large portion of the citizens of Iowa are either of German birth or descent, and among those who were born in the fatherland is numbered Ewald M. Werner. His birth occurred on the 9th of September, 1864, his parents being Adam and Eva (Rank) Werner, also natives of that country. They never left their native land, the mother there passing away in 1871. The father still sur-

elected sheriff of Howard county. He was elected representative from Howard county, in 1896, serving in the Twenty-sixth General Assembly, and also in the Twenty-sixth extra session, with credit to himself and to the county which he represented.

Mr. Lowry was an enthusiastic Mason, the oldest member of Cresco lodge, being one of two whose fiftieth anniversary as Masons was celebrated by the Cresco lodge a few months prior to his death. He was also a member of Shiloh chapter, Royal Arch Masons. He was a member of the Episcopal church, and the funeral services were conducted by Rev. Wellington McVettie, in connection with the Masonic funeral services on August 25, 1925.

Mr. Lowry's life and public services were of high character and he will be remembered as an ideal citizen, neighbor and friend.

HON. EDWARD L. McCLURKIN

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life and services of the Hon. Edward L. McClurkin, former member of the House of Representatives from Louisa county, Iowa, beg leave to report the following memorial:

Honorable Edward L. McClurkin, who represented Louisa county in the Twenty-ninth, Thirtieth and Thirty-first General Assemblies, was born in Morning Sun, Iowa, on August 20th, 1857, and died at his home in that city on the morning of February 7th, 1923.

Mr. McClurkin attended and graduated with the first class from the Morning Sun high school, in 1876. He was one of the most devoted friends and supporters of the local schools and at the time of his death he was a member of the board of directors of the consolidated school. November 10th, 1881, he was united in marriage to Anna Catherine Beck, who, together with three sons, Oak, Cliff and Justus, and one daughter, June, live to mourn the loss of a devoted husband and father.

Mr. McClurkin took more than ordinary interest in everything that concerned the welfare of the community at large. In local affairs he served as councilman and mayor of the town; in politics, he was an ardent Republican. He was one of the founders of the Farmers Exchange Bank, and at the time of his death was the sole owner. His business life

was devoted to the affairs of his bank and his extensive farm interests. He was a devout member of the United Presbyterian church of Morning Sun, with which church he united a great many years ago under the pastorate of the late Henry Wallace.

Whereas, The life and character of the deceased, and his long exemplary service calls for such as to place his memory among those highly respected and esteemed in the state of Iowa,

Therefore, Be it Resolved, That the House of Representatives of the state of Iowa, takes this occasion to express its appreciation of the character and service of the deceased and at the same time to extend sympathy to the family.

HON. JOSEPH MATTES

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life and public service of the Honorable Joseph Mattes, a former member of the General Assmby, who died at his home in Odebolt, Iowa, on April 17, 1925, begs leave to submit the following:

Joseph Mattes was born at Comanche, Clinton county, Iowa, October 1, 1855. His parents later moved to Lyons, where in his early youth he attended the public schools, and afterwards the high school at Clinton.

In 1879 he went to Sac county, where he started a small hardware store at Odebolt, which, under his careful management, developed into a flourishing and successful business, and which he continued to manage until 1915, when, in order to devote his time to banking, he turned the hardware business over to his son George. He was connected with the First National Bank at Odebolt for many years and later the Kiron State Bank, and was president of both of these banks when he died.

He was married in May, 1879, at Lyons, to Miss Catherine E. Shelley. Four children were born to this union, three of whom are living. Mrs. Mattes passed away in March, 1912.

He was a staunch Republican and served Sac county in the House of Representatives during the Twenty-ninth, Thirtieth and Thirty-first General Assemblies, followed by election to the Senate to represent the Forty-eighth Senatorial District, consisting of Carroll, Greene and Sac counties, in the Thirty-second, regular and extra, the Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth sessions, a continuous legislative service of fourteen years. He was twice chairman of the appropriation committee in the House and was accorded the same honor during the last two sessions in the Senate. He was greatly in favor of the capitol extension plan which came up in 1913, and did all he could to further it.

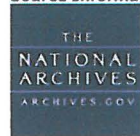

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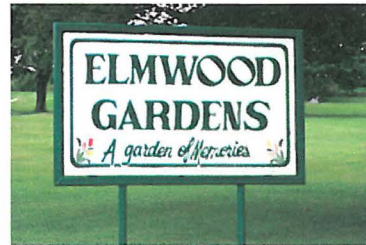

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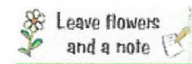
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
