Was a Successful Business Man, Mem-

Hon. Alexander W. Buchanan, one of
the most prominent, useful and highly
honored citizens of Ottumwa, died this
morning at 4 o'clock at his home, cor-
ner of Park avenue and Castle street,
after an illness of several weeks from
cancer of the stomach and liver. The
funeral services will be conducted
from the residence Tuesday morning
at 10 o'clock.

Mr. Buchanan was 56 years of age
and of the thirty-four years he had
been a resident of the county, he had
for the past twenty-five years been con-
tinuously engaged in business in this
city.

He was successful in business, a
leader in the councils of his party,
prominent in church work and was in
the forefront of every worthy move-
ment to build up this community. He
was a member of the city council from
1891 to 1895, and the voters of Wapel-
lo county have three times elected
him to the legislature, in 1899, 1901

Alexander W. Buchanan enjoyed the
confidence and respect of his fellow
men to a very unusual degree. Quiet
and modest in character, his uncom-
promising integrity of purpose and his
superb judgment upon all questions of
a public nature were so clearly mani-
fest that he became a leader among
men in whom, not only those who
were intimately associated with him,
but the entire public reposed the ut-
most confidence. The death of this
truly grand and good man is an ir-
reparable loss to this community
where he has lived all his adult years
and where he is universally honored
and respected, and by those who knew
him intimately regarded with a sin-
cere affection. As a member of the
state legislature, his counsel and ad-
vice were sought upon every import-
ant measure and his untimely death is
a distinct loss to the commonwealth
of Iowa.

Sketch of His Life.

Alexander W. Buchanan was the son
of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Buchanan,
and was born in Rahway, New Jersey,
Feb. 4, 1818. His father was of
Scottish descent and followed the oc-
cupation of a farmer until the civil
war when he enlisted in the union army
and lost his life a few years later in the
battle of Kenesaw Mountain.

his early life in Illinois where his par-
ents moved in 1850, locating near
Princeville in Peoria county. He took
an academic course at Princeville and
persued it until within a short time of
the graduating period.

Active Public Life.

Mr. Buchanan was an earnest sup-
porter of the principles advocated by
the republican party. From 1891 to
1895 he represented the fourth ward
in the city council. In 1899 he was
elected representative from Wapello
county to the state legislature, was
re-elected in 1901 and again in 1903.
He made an enviable record while a
member of the state legislature, was
the author of several important bills
and was on a number of the leading
committees. His straightforwardness
in dealing with all men and the care-
ful attention he gave to all public mat-
ters won for him the confidence and
esteem of all who knew him.

Mr. Buchanan was also an active
member of the First Presbyterian
church of this city and for the past
fifteen years was chairman of the
board of trustees of that organization.
He took an active interest in the af-
fairs of the church. Fraternally Mr.
Buchanan was a member of the Sons
of Veterans and has several times rep-
resented that organization.

Death Causes Surprise.

Mr. Buchanan had been ill for about
five weeks and for the past week his
condition has been very critical. Only
a few of his intimate friends knew that
he was seriously ill and the announce-
ment of his death this morning was
heard with surprise and deepest re-
gret. He is survived by his wife, three
sisters, Mrs. E. P. Scott of Hedrick,
Mrs. E. M. Bowlin, of Highland Cen-
ter, Mrs. H. A. Thompson of Highland

PAY THEIR TRIBUTE

SENATOR HARPER AND DR. F. F. STOLTZ COMMEND CHARACTER OF A. W. BUCHANAN.

Funeral Services Tomorrow Morning at Family Residence at 10 O'clock—Interment in Ottumwa Cemetery—City Council to Attend.

The funeral services over the remains of the late Hon. A. W. Buchanan, who passed away at 4 o'clock Saturday morning will be held at the family residence, corner of Park avenue and Castle streets tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. The services will be conducted by Dr. F. F. Stoltz, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, of which Mr. Buchanan was for many years a member and officer. The sons of Veterans, of which organization Mr. Buchanan was a member, will attend in a body.

Mayor Pickler and the city council, in which Mr. Buchanan was for several terms a valuable and respected member, will also be present. The interment will take place in the Ottumwa cemetery.

Loss to Church Circles.

That in the death of Mr. Buchanan the forces that work for the moral and spiritual betterment of Ottumwa have lost a strong and consistent worker is the testimony of Dr. F. F. Stoltz, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of which Mr. Buchanan was for many years one of the most prominent members. For the past three years Dr. Stoltz, as pastor of this church has been closely and intimately associated with Mr. Buchanan. Dr. Stoltz' tribute is as follows:

"In the death of A. W. Buchanan, the Christian forces of Ottumwa have sustained an unusual loss. It can truly be said of him that nothing for the religious betterment of the people was foreign to his interest and moral support. His adherence to the cause of religion was not characterized by marked profession, but by depth of conviction and consistency of conduct with the word of testimony given when it was thought necessary. This was the temper of the man, his quiet, mighty way of honoring God.

"Among the churches of the city, the First Presbyterian church has the deepest sorrow. Mr. Buchanan was, for many years, until his death, a member of this church. He was interested in all its work and served it in special lines with marked efficiency and success. For some fifteen years he was the president of the board of trustees and with his fellow members had charge of the finances of the church with the exception of the beneficent fund. As pastor of the church I dare to say that I have never been acquainted with any organization whose financial affairs have been better managed. They are well cared for that the pastor has no occasion to know much about them.

"In the services of yesterday it was evident that a sorrowful experience had come to the church. This was especially manifest among the older members. We shall greatly miss this faithful man. Mr. Buchanan was always a man of great character.

"He had his place among those most loved and honored. He was our friend and neighbor. His death is a great loss to the church and to the community.
