

Mr. and Mrs. Maxwell united with the United Presbyterian church of Mount Ayr upon their arrival at this place forty-eight years ago and during this time have always been steadfast workers in this congregation. Mr. Maxwell has been the teacher of the Bible class in the Sabbath school for forty-two years. There are three of the original members of the class still living.

Seven children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Maxwell, three of whom have preceded him in death. His wife, their four children, Ernest, Frank, Mary and Alice, five grandchildren, and other relatives survive him. Life-long friends in this community and the church of which he was a loval and devoted member testify to the sense of their great loss since he has entered into his rest.

### George S. Allyn.

The death of George S. Allyn marks the passing of one of the oldest Citizens of Ringgold county and one who from early manhood was identified with the progress of the community. He was a recognized leader in the religious, education-al and business life of the community and his deepest concern was in spiritual and educational progress. A leader in the Methodist Episcopal church, he served in many positions of responsibility including many years of service as superin-tendent of the Sunday school. For more than fifty years he served as a member of the Mount Ayr school board, most of the time as president of the board, and the service was characterized by efficiency and conscientious devotion duty. He to also served as a member of the Board of Iowa State Education and was identified at various times in official capacity with other educational institutions. He served two terms as state senator from the fifth district composed of the counties of Union, Decatur and Ringgold and represented Ringgold county as state representative. No man in Ringgold county was ever called upon to serve in more positions of trust than was Mr. Allyn and no servant of the public ever performed

Morris, organized the Mount Ayr Bank, where they carried on a general banking busi-ness until May 1, 1886, when Mr. Morris retired and was succeeded by J. H. Allyn. This is the leading in-stitution of its kind in Mount Ayr. Mr. Allyn has held the position of cashier since its organization. Mr. Allyn belongs to the lodge and chapter of the Masonic fraternity, and is a member of Mount Ayr lodge No. 169, I. O. O. F. He is also a Good Templar, and has served as worthy chief templar of this lodge. He is a member of the Methodist Episcopal church, of which he is steward and trustee."

For more than fifty years Mr. Allyn was identified with the business interests of Mount Ayr, being engaged first in the real estate business and later as part owner and cashier of the Mount Ayr Bank. His business relations with the public were always pleasant and he was ever kind and generous in dealing with patrons. Since his retirement from the bank about thirteen years ago he has lived in pleasant retirement. Until the close of his life interest in the community continued, and even during his critical illness, which covered a period of several months, he expressed concern re-garding the churches and public schools.

Mr. Allyn is survived by Mrs. Allyn and their five children-Earle K., Clint D., Clair G., Miss Madge and Miss Georgia, all of Mount Ayr. The following biography of Mr. Allyn is copied from the history of Ringgold county, published in 1887: "George S. Allyn, cashier of the Mount Ayr Bank, was born in De-Witt county, Illinois, in the town of Clinton, March 9, 1847. His parents, Rev. Henry and Emily E. (Forman) Allyn, were natives of Hart-ford, Conn., and Kentucky respect-ively. They were married in Illinois, and to them were born two sons and three daughters, George S. being the eldest child. His father was a minister in the Methodist Episcopal chu. ch for many years. George S. Allyn spent his boyhood days in the various places to which his father was called to preach, and in his youth obtained a fair education.
