Hon. Henry J. Griswold
Is Called By Death

Henry J. Griswold was born November 13, 1858, at Janesville, Wis., and died at his home in Des Moines Sept. 7, 1929, at the age of 70 years, 9 months and 24 days.

When he was five years of age his parents moved to Iowa and settled on a farm in Buchanan county, near Winthrop, Iowa, where Mr. Griswold's boyhood and youth was spent.

At the age of seventeen Mr. Griswold began to teach school, which profession he followed for a period of three years.

Owing to ill health, which demanded an outdoor life, Mr. Griswold abandoned his teaching profession and took up a claim in South Dakota where he lived for two years. At the end of this time he returned to Iowa and on January 24, 1884, was united in marriage with Miss Maria J. Risk, of Winthrop, Iowa. To this union two children were born, Grace E. Griswold, now Mrs. Leslie G. Berry, of Charlotte, N. C., and Dale A. Griswold, of Des Moines, Iowa, both of whom survive their father.

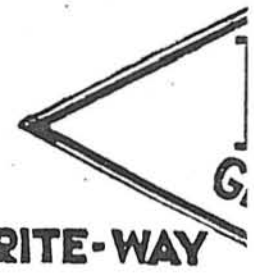
In 1893 Mr. Griswold was unanimously nominated to the office of representative for Buchanan county on the republican ticket and served in the state legislature. In 1895 he was elected to a second term without opposition.

Subsequent to his term as representative for Buchanan county, Mr. Griswold served two terms in the Iowa State Senate, representing Buchanan and Delaware counties.

Besides his widow, his daughter and son, Mr. Griswold is survived by two brothers, Arthur Griswold and Will Griswold, and two sisters, Mrs. Harry Higman and Mrs. Will Miller, all residents of Winthrop, Iowa, and four grandchildren, Pauline, Helen, Leslie Junior, and Floyd Berry, all of Charlotte, N. C.

The remains were brought here from Des Moines Monday morning and taken to the H. Higman home. Funeral services were held in the Congregational church at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. Geo. Fowler, as- sisted by W. P. DeRoame, Waterloo. The floral offerings of pieces, sprays and bouquets were very elaborate and profuse, a mute evidence of the love and esteem in which the deceased was held.
