TAX BILL TO GOVERNOR

Both Houses Concur on Amendments

STATE HOUSE, Des Moines, Ia., April 15.—The Iowa house today voted to make an investigation of charges against Miss May Francis in her conduct of the state department of public instruction.

An effort was made to have the investigation referred to a special committee of nine members, but this was lost and the matter went to the judiciary committee.

STATE HOUSE, Des Moines, Ia., April 15.—The senate Monday finally concurred in the house amendments to the marriage bill to require that both parties seeking a marriage license must make affidavit that they are free from venereal diseases and that five days must elapse after making application for a marriage license before it can be granted. A judge of the district court may authorize the granting of a license without waiting the full five days if necessary. The affidavits may be made before any officer qualified to take oaths.

The Iowa house Monday turned down the resolution introduced by Representative Long of Jefferson to amend the constitution to prohibit the legislature from granting any annuities, pensions or a bonus of any nature without first being voted by the people. This resolution was aimed at teachers' pensions and similar enactments.

Miss May Francis, state superintendent of public instruction, submitted a request to the house Monday that her department be investigated. She said:

"In view of the resolution introduced in the house based upon alleged insinuations and charges in the newspapers I hereby request and demand an investigation of my department by this session of the general assembly.

"I make this request and demand in this way and at this time in the interests of good government and to advance the welfare of the schools of the state and I hereby tender the fullest cooperation of this department."

A. S. HAZELTON IS DEAD, AGED 67

FORMER SENATOR AND POSTMASTER HAD BEEN ILL FOUR WEEKS.

FUNERAL HELD THURSDAY

The Services to Be From Residence Of Brother—Survived By Two Sons Living In The East.

Arthur S. Hazelton, aged 67 years, attorney and resident of Council Bluffs for forty years, died of complications at the Jennie Edmundson Memorial hospital at 9:40 o'clock Monday night, after an illness of four weeks.

Mr. Hazelton was born at Plymouth, N. H., November 7, 1855. He was educated at Kimball Union academy, Meriden, N. H., and Dartmouth college, graduating with the class of 1881, in law.

Mr. Hazelton moved to Keokuk, Ia., in 1887, where he married Emma Higham. Two sons, Paul H. Hazelton of Brooklyn, N. Y., and Charles S. Hazelton of Boston, survive. He also leaves one sister, Miss Martha Hazelton, of Concord, N. H., and two brothers, H. W. Hazelton of this city and Charles Hazelton of Montague City, Mass.

Mr. Hazelton served as city solicitor here from 1892 until 1897. He was in the state senate for one term and served as postmaster of Council Bluffs for twelve years, from July, 1902 until April, 1914.

He was a member of the local lodge of Elks, No. 531, and of the Macabees. He also was a Blue Lodge Mason.

The body was removed to Cutler's funeral home and on Thursday morning will be taken to the home of his brother, H. W. Hazelton, 534 Oakland avenue, where funeral services will be held Thursday morning at 10:30 o'clock. Rev. J. R. Perkins of the First Congregational church officiating. Burial will be in Fairview cemetery.

ENGLAND IS OPTIMISTIC

Premier Macdonald, Speaking for the Gov't Eulogizes Experts' Promises Support.

BERLIN, April 15.—The German cabinet today decided to accept the experts' report as a basis for negotiations and to inform the reparation commission to this effect. This is in line with the attitude taken by the conferees in yesterday's meeting between the central government and the premiers of the federated states.

The government has instructed Dr. Fischer of the German war burdens commission in Paris, to notify the reparation commission that Germany is prepared to resume negotiations on the basis of the experts' report. It makes no suggestion with respect to the manner in which the parleys are to be resumed, but it is assumed these will be initiated through oral discussions shortly after the Easter holidays.

LONDON, April 15.—The discount rate of the new gold discount bank in Germany has been fixed at 10 per cent, says an agency dispatch from Berlin.

LONDON, April 15.—The first official expression of opinion of the reparation experts' report from Prime Minister MacDonald came in the house of commons today when he announced that the government had learned with greatest satisfaction of the unanimous signing of the experts' findings.

"The experts' report constitute, in our opinion," said the premier, "an unbiased and carefully thought out endeavor to aid the governments concerned in their task of reaching a settlement of this vital and long-standing problem."

After the prime minister had made his announcement on the experts' report, Stanley Baldwin, his conservative predecessor, declared the premier would have the united support of the British people in his attitude. This declaration was received with cheers.

"His majesty's government" added the prime minister, "attaches so much importance to the agreed recommendations which can be brought into immediate operation that they are prepared for their part to support the scheme in its entirety, provided all the other parties concerned are willing to take the same course and on April 10, they communicated
