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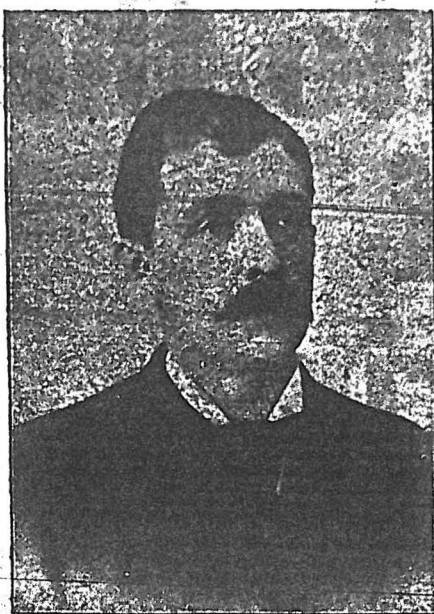

Emile M. Hertert

Emile M. Hertert died Sunday evening, July 22nd, 1923, at 8:40 p. m., at his home in Harlan Iowa. Emile Mathias Hertert was born at Eich, near Luxemburg, Europe, August 7th, 1854. His father, Mathias Hertert, was a tanner by trade, and November 28th, 1851, married Catherine Probst. Both were natives of the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg. Emile's early schooling was received at Welmerskirch, near his birthplace, and in 1866 he entered the college of Beauregard, near Thionville, Alsace. He finished his education at the agricultural college at Ettelbruck, Luxemburg, in 1870.

He came to America in 1872, and located at Luxemburg, Dubuque county, Iowa. He remained in Dubuque and Clayton counties until 1878 when he removed to Shelby county where he has since resided.

For a number of years he engaged in farming, and in 1884 he was appointed Deputy Auditor, under John W. Harrod, who was then Auditor. In 1887 he resigned that position and with his brother Lucien R. Hertert purchased the Land, Loan and Abstract business of A. J. ... in Harlan which he conducted actively up to January 1st, 1921, when his

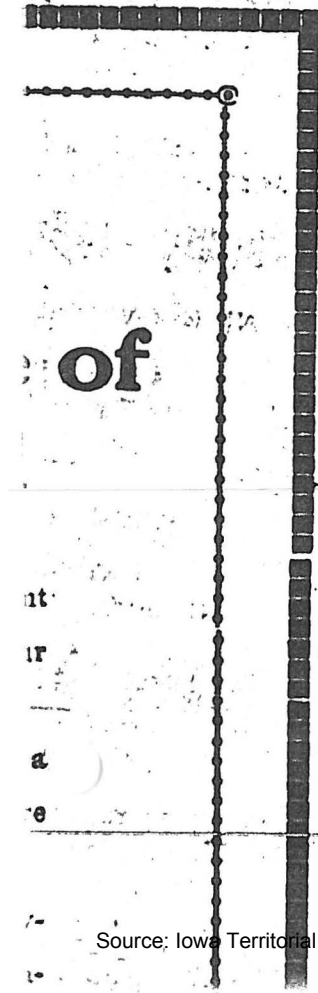

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In 1887 Mr. Hertert Sr., became associated with his brother, Lucien R. Hertert and they established a Land, Loan and Abstract business at Pierce, Nebraska, in connection with the business at Harlan, Iowa; both businesses being conducted under the firm name of Hertert Brothers, which partnership continued until about 1906 when Lucien R. Hertert retired from connection with the Harlan, Iowa, business.

Since he became a voter Mr. Hertert has been affiliated with the Democratic party. However in local affairs he was a firm believer in ability rather than party affiliations. In November, 1897, he was elected County Treasurer of Shelby county and served two terms, and in November, 1901, was elected Representative of Shelby county in the 29th General Assembly at Des Moines. He declined a second term. He was also a member of the school board in Harlan and a member of the city council, in each for a period of 8 years.

In 1915 he was one of the organizers of the Cedar County State Bank, located at Hartington, Nebraska, of which he was elected President and Director and remained so up to the time of his death. The bank has become one of the leading State Banks of Northeast Nebraska. At the time of his death he was also Vice President and Director of the Farmers & Merchants Savings Bank of Harlan, Iowa. He was also an active member of the Harlan Field Club, practically since its organization.
