LOUIS M. JAEGER

WELL KNOWN BURLINGTON CITIZEN DIED SUDDENLY.

End is Shock to Friends—Ex-Member State Legislature and Prominent in Labor Affairs.

Ex-Representative Louis M. Jaeger, passed away suddenly at his home, No. 1206 Osborn street, Sunday evening, at 7:30 o'clock. The death of Mr. Jaeger was a great shock to his friends, as he worked Saturday and they had no intimation of his approaching end.

Last fall Mr. Jaeger had an attack of pleurisy and it affected his health during the winter, causing him a long sojourn in the hospital. Recently, however, his condition became more hopeful and he worked Saturday as usual. Yesterday evening he was out in the yard at his home and was suddenly seized with a hemorrhage and passed away before medical assistance could be summoned. It is supposed he ruptured an internal artery, causing almost instantaneous death.

Mr. Jaeger was born in this city September 23, 1858. He was educated in the local schools and learned the cigar-making trade. He remained in that business up to the time of his death. At one time he ran a shop in this city in partnership with Joe Dehner. Since then he worked for the Al Wilkin Cigar Co. and for the past seven or eight years has been one of the valued employes of the Dehner Cigar Company.

He had always been prominent in labor circles and for many years was treasurer of the local cigarmakers' union. He served a term as vice president of the Iowa State Federation of Labor and was honored by that body upon several occasions; two years ago being sent to San Francisco as delegate to the American Federation of Labor congress from the state of Iowa.

Always a firm democrat, he was elected three times by the people to the lower house of the general assembly, being succeeded by Henry Ritter. As a legislator, Mr. Jaeger's many admirable qualities asserted themselves and he looked after the interests of Des Moines county in the most honest and praiseworthy manner. During the six years that he served the people his integrity was never questioned and he could always be found championing the cause of right. His record was one that his friends can well afford to be proud of. He was not given to loud and vainglorious announcement of his achievements, but was of a quiet, amiable disposition and his conservative counsel was always given the most respectful attention. He made friends readily and kept them and his clean upright life was a model.

In addition to his membership in the cigarmakers' union, Mr. Jaeger belonged to the Red Men, and was a past grand master of Excelsior lodge A. O. U. W. In every organization in which he held membership he was highly regarded and signally honored.

He is survived by his widow and two children, a son and daughter, the lat-

ter living in Cedar Rapids. He also leaves an aged father, M. Jaeger, who made his home with his son and one brother, Arthur C. Jaeger, of Mt. Pleasant.

Arrangements for the funeral have not been completed.

OPENED PARLIAMENT.

King Alfonso in Speech To-Day Makes Happy Reference to Son's Birth.

Madrid, May 13.—King Alfonso and the queen mother, Maria Christina, opened the Spanish parliament to-day. The king read his message from the throne, promising reforms in the administration, comprising decentralization. He referred in happy terms to the birth of the heir of apparent and announced he had received the approval of the sovereigns of Great Britain, Germany, Austria and Portugal on conferment of their names on the new born prince.

IS CAPTAIN NO!

FRANK S. LONG HAS RECEIVED DESERVED PROMOTION.

Former Burlington Newspaper Man receives Good Appointment in Coast Artillery.

Frank S. Long, formerly of this city and commander of the Sixth battery light artillery during the Spanish American war, has received a promotion to a captaincy in the coast artillery. Capt. Long's promotion from January 27 and carries with it salary of about \$2,100 per year. The outcome of the recent act of congress in separating the field coast artillery, and increasing forces in this branch of the service, Capt. Long's many Burlington friends will be glad to learn of his appointment. He is a natural born soldier and there is little doubt but that he will eventually go higher in the service. For several years past he has been stationed at Ft. Andrews in Texas harbor and will no doubt continue to make that post his headquarters.

Capt. Long was born in Conn. May 19, 1869, just as the schooner great civil war were dying away entered West Point June 16, 1887 remained there until June 30, 1892 the early '90s he came to this city and secured employment in the Burlington route freight office. He even abandoned this position for a while to be the reporter staff of the Herald and in 1898 organized a battery of artillery to assist in exterminating Spanish. The feat was performed successfully without the assistance of Capt. Long's gallant boys and a two months' sojourn in Des Moines battery returned to Burlington August 17, 1899, Long was again sent into the service of Uncle Sam time as a captain in the 30th vol infantry. He saw two years' service in the Philippines in the capacity and was mustered out on August 1, 1901. On August 1 of the same year he was given the position of first lieutenant in the artillery corps at a time while was stationed in the presence to his present post.

The coast artillery is the best branch of the service and the one better paid in this branch. Long is now working on an invention and has completed a model that satisfactorily in every respect will locate a ship within a certain radius on the darkest night any kind of a fog. He feels quite enthusiastic about it and it has favorably commented upon by prominent army men. He hopes to receive government assistance in perfecting the invention, which will not make him a rich man and entirely dependent of his salary.
