Preparing For Opening Of New College

Mr. Johnson, a graduate of the University of Iowa, and at present preparing a year's special work in school music at Carleton College, Northfield, Minn., was hired as principal of the school board last night as music supervisor in independent public schools. He is the place of H. P. Jones, who was principal at Rochester, Minn. Mr. Johnson is employed for 12 months, at a salary of \$1,200 per year, and will have charge of all the schools. He is a member of the University of Iowa men's association for three years, serving as president last year. At present he is in the Little Symphony at Carleton.

Mr. J. Springer, of Charles City, has been selected kindergarten teacher for a monthly salary of \$110. Bryson, of Vinton, will teach the first grades, and Gladys H. of Odebolt will teach 5th grades in the Lincoln building. Helen Cook, high school teacher, was released from her position in Waterloo high school at an annual salary of \$1,200.

The board voted to start the new college next fall, and to send out in that direction. The board has master's degrees in education. Five subjects will be offered as follows: English, mathematics (college algebra, trigonometry and analytical geometry), physics and chemistry. The board has a choice of four of the above. Each will be a four-year course, making a total of 16 credits. This year's work will be for graduates to enter the second in any standard college. It is necessary however for those who do not take the two-year course for at least one year and one summer to get the necessary work in the other subjects for this course.

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H. R. KEAGY DIED YESTERDAY OF HEART TROUBLE PASSED AWAY AT 6:30 A. M.

Had Not Been Feeling Well of Late, But Had Been at His Store and About Town Up to Day Before His Death.

The sudden death of H. R. Keagy, 67, from heart trouble, at 6:30 Tuesday morning, May 8, 1928, came as a shock and surprise to his many friends throughout the county. Mr. Keagy had not been well the past winter, suffering frequently from slight attacks which had been more severe the past three or four weeks, but he had been about his work and carried on his business as usual. He had spent Monday, the day preceding his death, at the store as usual, but had been sick during the night. The funeral services will be held tomorrow (Thursday) afternoon at 2:30, from the home. The Rev. Roy Leslie Smith, of Waterloo, will officiate, assisted by the Rev. J. W. Reed. Interment will be in Mt. Hope cemetery.

Henry Reed Keagy was born on March 21, 1861, at Epworth, Iowa, the next to the youngest child in a family of six born to Phillip and Mary Jane Keagy. He grew to manhood at Epworth, and there, November 9, 1893, he was united in marriage with Miss Katie May McIntosh. To this union five children were born: Margaret May, deceased; Phillip Donald and Kathryn May (Mrs. I. E. Sams), of Waterloo; Miss Dorothy, a teacher in the Clarion schools, and Edson Reed at home. There also survive five grandchildren, two brothers, C. W. Keagy of Manchester, and W. M. Keagy, of Waterloo; two sisters, Mrs. Sarah E. Husted, of Oak Park, Ill., and Mrs. Anna Christ, of Spokane, Wash., and numerous other relatives. Another brother, Edson, is deceased.

Mr. Keagy operated a general store at Epworth for a number of years before coming to Independence in 1907, and going into the glove and mitten business with J. A. Wells. Sixteen years ago he opened the People's Supply, which he was operating at the time of his death in the Mans building on East Main street. Beginning in 1902, Mr. Keagy served a term in the General Assembly, the only republican ever elected to the state legislature.

Mr. Keagy was a member of the Independence city council for a number of terms, and at the time of his death was the chairman of the republican county central committee. He took a keen interest in the work of the Methodist church, of which he was a member, serving as secretary of the official board and a member of the board of trustees. He lived a life of usefulness and activity.

REV. CALDWELL OVER 40 YEARS AT LITTLETON PREACHER AND PHYSICIAN

Several Young Men Who Later Became Famous Served the Pulpit at Pleasant Grove Church in Their Student Days.

We are giving below a list of the ministers who have served the Littleton Presbyterian church. The list is quite lengthy as would be expected for a church of so many years, and of no larger membership. While some of the men whose names are given served this church alone most of them gave only part time service. Some of them were in the student age of their ministry and served during their school day vacations. A surprising number of the men are still in the land of the living. The following have passed on to their reward: J. S. Fullerton, Thos. Carver, J. D. Caldwell, W. B. Phelps, F. Y. Nichols, J. T. Wylie, G. E. Pooler, E. G. Beyer.

The first named was the organizer of the church. He came to Iowa in 1846 as a young man. He received his ordination after coming to the state and spent the most of his life in and near Marion, Iowa. While serving the Linn Grove church near that city he did not a little itinerant work. Thus it was that he came to the Littleton community and found a few people of the Presbyterian persuasion. These he organized into a church and shepherded them till he found a suitable supply in the person of Thos. Carver. Carver was followed by John D. Caldwell, who is the outstanding man of the Littleton community so far as Presbyterian ministers are concerned. His coming was in the year 1855. He was ordained by the Presbytery of Dubuque in the year 1857, and until July, 1901, the year of his death, for the most part his home was at Littleton. In addition to being a minister he practiced medicine. He was a typical pioneer minister who loved the work of itinerancy. He served, in addition to Littleton, other stations, such as Barclay, Waverly, Bremer Valley, Fairbank, Jessup, Pleasant Prairie, Wilson's Grove, Haxton, and Otterville. The chief field of labor of the other departed brethren was: W. B. Phelps, Independence; F. Y. Nichols, Oswein; J. T. Wylie, Pine Creek; G. E. Pooler, Jessup, and E. G. Beyer, Haxton.

Dan Russell, F. C. McLean, C. F. Frerking were student supplies. W. B. Montgomery was an emergency supply as was also C. H. Driver, J. F. Hinkhouse's connection with the church has been that of a Presbyterian pastor at large.
