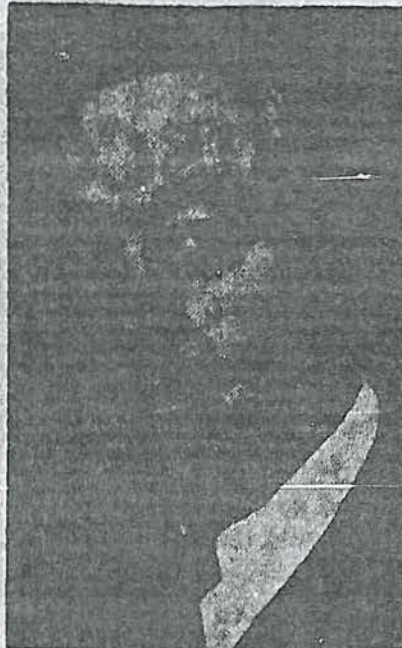

PROMINENT IN CHURCH ACTIVITIES

Services For Longtime
Civic Leader Will
Be Tomorrow
Afternoon

Lee Nagle, prominent church leader, lumberman and banker, died at 2:15 o'clock this morning at his home, 917 East College street, following a brief illness. He was 72.

A member of the Methodist church, he took an active part in its programs and activities throughout his lifetime. He superintended the church Sunday school and was chairman of a number of its committees for many years. He headed the board of trustees and was chairman of the official board at the time of his death.

Mr. Nagle represented Johnson county in the state legislature from 1927 to 1929 and was a member of the house of representatives from Van Buren county in 1902.

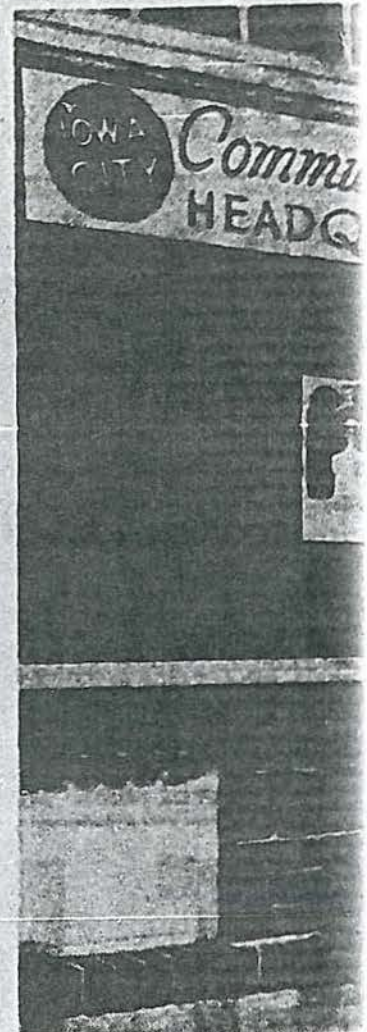
He strongly advocated good government and energetically participated in such activities. He served for several years as treasurer of the Johnson county republican central committee and held that position at the time of his death.

He headed the committee which organized the First Capital State bank and after it was re-named the First Capital National bank became its president, a position which he held until January 1, 1942. He was chairman of the board until his death.

Women Of Moose Report Results Of Survey In Iowa City

A need for child care was found in homes of 44 children in Iowa City, the Women of the Moose reported to the Co-ordinated Council following a neighborhood to neighborhood survey which the organization made.

The survey was made by the Women of the Moose at the request of the Co-ordinated Council to determine whether or not a need for child care in the homes of working mothers existed in Iowa City.

A total of 20 of the children were found to be of above-school age.

According to Mrs. Walter E. Riley, senior regent of the organization, further research into child care organizations and methods of establishing nurseries will be conducted by the organization. In addition, the council has requested the Women of the Moose to make periodic surveys of the city as the war continues and in the event of an increased need for child care facilities.

Chairman of the committees which conducted the survey were Mrs. Clara Hoffman, child care and training; Mrs. Helen Bontrager, social service; and Mrs. Milo Novy, homemaking.

Lee Nagle was born in Milton, June 14, 1870, the son of Volney and Elsie Creath Nagle. He graduated from the Milton high school in 1890. November 24, 1892, he was married to Elizabeth Bell at Milton.

He entered the lumber business with his father in the Nagle Lumber Co. at Milton and was with the company from 1890, after his graduation from high school, until 1897. He aided in the organization and was a cashier of the Farmers and Merchants bank at Milton until 1902, when he moved to Red Oak.

At Red Oak he operated the Nagle Lumber Co. with his father until 1905, after which he was sales manager of the Replogie company there until 1922.

For nine years he was a member of the Red Oak school board and during the World war served as fuel administrator for Montgomery county.

He began ownership and operation of the Nagle Lumber Co. at Iowa City in 1922, in which business he has been associated with his two sons. He took over the Oxford company in 1930 and in 1931 was owner and operator of the Nagle-Eaton Lumber Co. at Cedar Rapids.

Surviving are his widow; two daughters, Mrs. Leila York of Grinnell and Mrs. Gwen Olander of Wichita, Kan.; two sons, George and Leland of Iowa City; two brothers, four sisters and nine grandchildren. One son, Rollin P., preceded him in death in 1903.

Services will be held at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at the Methodist church, with Dr. L. L. Dunnington officiating. Burial will be in Oakland cemetery. The body will be at the McGovern funeral home until the time of the service.

Both the First Capital National bank and Iowa State Bank and Trust Co., will close at 2 p.m. tomorrow for the funeral.

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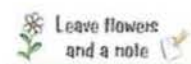
