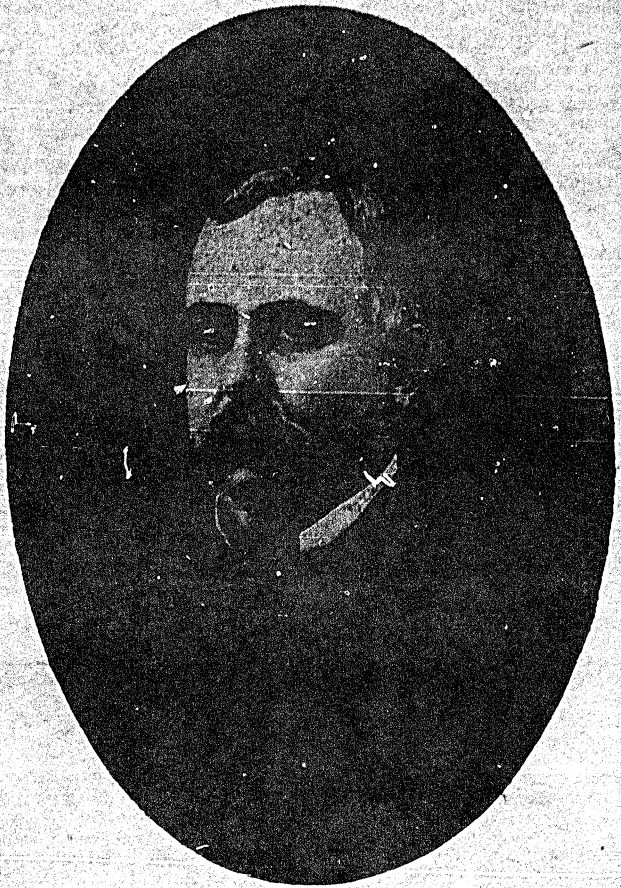

HON. T. P. WALDEN DEAD,



He Breathed His Last at the Home of Dr. Bullis at 7:00 p. m. Tuesday, Sept. 16th.

Hon. T. P. Walden, after an illness really beginning several months ago, breathed his last at the home of his physician, Dr. W. L. Bullis, on Tuesday evening. All that medical skill could do to break up the disease which had fastened on him had been done, but to no avail. His time had come. His summons had been received and his spirit departed to appear before the great white throne of the Father of all to give an account of his stewardship.

He was born June 13, 1846, in Adams county, Ohio, and moved to Lee county, Iowa, when a small boy, where he grew to manhood.

He was deputy auditor of Wayne county under Col. Jones and was a candidate for the same office on the republican ticket afterwards but was defeated with the rest of his ticket.

In the spring of 1873 he came to Allerton as cashier of the First National Bank and remained in the same position until he sold out the Bank of Allerton which had succeeded the First National, July 1, 1898. Mr. Walden was very successful in his business, accumulating a competence.

He occupied various public positions of a local character--treasurer of the town and school district for a number of years, member of the town council and of the school board--in all of which he acquitted himself with credit. He will be especially remembered by residents of this school district as during his service on the school board of which territorial and State Legislators Collection

he was president this district erected its magnificent school building.

In 1901 he was nominated and elected by the republicans of Wayne county as their representative in the state legislature. In that body he became recognized as one of the working members. He had the distinction of being named chairman of the committee on building and loans, and a member of eight other committees, some of them the most important in the house, among them ways and means, banking, railroads and commerce, schools and text books, etc. He took rank at once in that body as a safe, conservative member and his advice was sought by all.

He procured the passage of a special bill legalizing the issuance of bonds to complete the payment of our school house and for that he will be held long in the high esteem of our people.

On the adjournment of the legislature he returned to Allerton and save for a few trips out of town his remaining days were spent at the Sherman House where he had made his home for years.

He leaves two brothers, A. Walden of Corydon who was present at the time of his death, and James of Chicago, and one sister, Mrs. Fisher, who we believe makes her home with her brother at Corydon. These brothers and a sister are dead. His father we believe died and was buried in Ohio, his mother and two brothers and sister are buried at Centerville, Iowa.

At the time of his death he was a member of the school board and took

great interest in school matters. That body out of respect for his services met and passed suitable resolutions which see elsewhere.

Mr. Walden never married and his property will probably revert to his brothers and sister. The funeral services will be held at the residence of Dr. W. L. Bullis at 10 a. m. tomorrow, and the remains will be taken to Centerville for interment.

Action of School Board.

The members of the school board of the independent school district of Allerton on Sept. 17th, adopted the following and requested its publication in the NEWS:

Recognizing the loss we have sustained in the death of Hon. T. P. Walden, we desire to express as a body associated with him in the business connected with our schools, our high appreciation of his sound business judgment, his courtesy and good feeling in advancing his views, and the earnestness with which he desired to act for the best interest of the schools.

Of large and successful experience in business affairs his counsel was excellent in the many questions coming before our body for action. Our new school building was his pride, and justly so, and that it should be properly equipped his earnest desire.

Therefore resolved, that in the death of Hon. T. P. Walden our board has suffered a loss that cannot be estimated, the public schools a wise financial advisor and the community an honored and influential citizen.

By the Town Council.

We the members of the town council of Allerton, who fully recognize that in the sudden and unexpected death of our honored townsman, Hon. T. P. Walden, that our town has lost a valued and efficient ex-member of our council, an exemplary citizen with wholesome ambitions, trustworthy and reliable, endowed with a power of winning friends and holding them, a man of cultured business ability, an able and wise counsellor, an honored and respected legislator--in short a typical American. Therefore,

Resolved by the town council of Allerton that in the loss of our beloved citizen and counsellor a drooping cloud of sorrow and sadness has encircled each member of the council, knowing that a true friend has been withdrawn from our midst, whose vacant chair cannot soon be filled. We therefore as a body, together with the citizens of Allerton, extend our tenderest expressions of sympathy to the bereaved relatives and immediate friends.

TYLER P. WALDEN, Cashier of the First National Bank, Allerton, Iowa, is a brother of Allen Walden, of Corydon. They are the sons of Joseph M. Walden, who, in 1851, bought property in Lee County, Iowa, with the intention of locating. In the spring of 1852 he visited the county for the purpose of transacting some business pertaining to his interest there, and was taken suddenly sick and died. The family at that time were residing in Adams County, Ohio. In the fall of 1852 the mother with her family came to Iowa and located in Lee County. The eldest son, Allen, having moved there in the spring of 1851. Her family consisted of ten children, five sons and five daughters, of whom four sons and one daughter are living. She now lives with her son in Corydon, aged eighty-four years. Allen Walden was born in Fayette County, Indiana, and was but three years of age when his parents moved to Adams County, Ohio, where he grew to manhood. In the spring of 1851 he located on a farm in Lee County, Iowa, and in the spring of 1862 went overland to California, where he remained until 1868. In 1869 he located in Corydon, where he has since lived. Tyler P. Walden was born in Adams County, Ohio, in 1846, and was but six years of age when his mother removed to Iowa. When eighteen years old he went to Keokuk, and during the years 1864 and 1865 was employed as clerk in a mercantile house. He then went

to Corydon, where he served as deputy auditor several years and in June, 1869, engaged in the lumber business with his brother Allen. In 1874 he was largely instrumental in organizing and secured the most of the stock for the First National Bank of Allerton, and has been its cashier ever since that time. The success of the enterprise has been mainly due to his skill and excellent business capacity. On the organization of the bank the officers were: William Bradley, President; John Wright, Vice-President, and T. P. Walden, Cashier. The only change in the officers has been vice-president, R. S. Lowry having taken the place of John Wright.



B. B. LEWIS was born in Licking County, Ohio, June 30, 1828, a son of Seth and Sally (Castle) Lewis, the father born May 2, 1785, in Massachusetts, and the mother a native of New York State, born March 22, 1789. They were among the first settlers of Licking County, remaining there till our subject was seven years of age when they removed to Vermillion County, Indiana, subsequently removing to Tazewell County, Illinois. The father died March 24, 1846, and the mother, January 30, 1868. They were the parents of eleven children—George, Annette, Angeline, Martin, Sylvester, Mary Ann, Sally, Seth, Billings B., Elijah and Clementine. Billings B., our subject, was married October 4, 1855, to Emeline Ewing, a daughter of Robert Ewing, who was born August 25, 1789, in Fauquier County, Virginia. Mr. and Mrs. Lewis have nine children living—Howard E., Lissie, Chester, George D., Almar, Lyman G., Fred J., Robert S. and Everett J. A son, Simon B., is deceased. In 1857 Mr. Lewis went to McLean County, Illinois, making his home there for thirteen years. In the fall of

of the Iowa Pioneer Law Makers Association, and was always in attendance upon its biennial meetings. He took a deep interest in the State historical department, and gave it words of the heartiest approval and encouragement from the first. Says Congressman Walter I. Smith, "He was an ideal lawyer, a conscientious citizen, and a man of unusually clean life and character."

The venerable and revered Father Philip Laurent was born near Dijon, France, Feb. 23, 1828; he died at his old home across the sea, Dec. 3, 1902. Father Laurent was educated for the Catholic priesthood in his native place, in the old city of Autun, at Plombieres, at Troyes and at Paris. He became acquainted with Matthias Loras the first Bishop of Dubuque, whose cordial and repeated invitations to come to the new State of Iowa the young student accepted. He was ordained in Dubuque in 1851, and sent to Muscatine where he took charge of the old St. Matthias congregation. It was with this people mainly that he spent his days, though he taught awhile in the Catholic Seminary a few miles west of Dubuque, and performed missionary work in several other localities in Iowa. He was with his congregation fifty years, during which time "he erected a beautiful church edifice, school houses, and homes for pastor and sisters." These are his monuments. Father Laurent was equally beloved and respected by Catholics and Protestants, and educators and professional people were his warm friends. Seldom, if ever, has the press of Muscatine paid such high tributes to one called hence. After a life of the highest usefulness in a foreign land, the good priest while visiting at his old home was called to his final rest. It was understood that he desired to return and end his days at Muscatine. As one of the earliest and foremost of the missionary priests who came to this region, he will occupy a prominent place in the history of the Catholic Church of Iowa.

JOHN FITCH KINNEY was born in New Haven, N. Y., April 2, 1816; he died at San Diego, California, Aug. 16, 1902. After receiving his school and college education he studied law, settling at Marysville, Ohio, where he was admitted to the bar in 1837. He practiced his profession at Mt. Vernon, Ohio, from 1839 to 1844, when he removed to Lee county, Iowa. He became secretary of the council of the seventh and eighth territorial legislatures, and also district attorney. On the admission of the State he was appointed associate judge of the supreme court dating from June 12, 1847, and reappointed Jan. 26, 1848. On the 8th of the following December he was elected to the same position by the general assembly for six years. In 1853 President Pierce appointed him chief justice of the supreme court of Utah. After serving until 1857 he removed to Nebraska, where he practiced law until 1860, when President Buchanan reappointed him chief justice of Utah, in which place he served until 1863, when he was elected delegate from that territory to the thirty-eighth congress without opposition. He served until 1865, and then removed to San Diego, Cal., where he spent the remainder of his days, though he held some appointments under the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. While in Iowa he earned proud distinction as an independent, learned and able jurist.

TYLER P. WALDEN was born in Adams county, Ohio, June 13, 1846; he died in Allerton, Wayne county, Iowa, Sept. 16, 1902. He came to Lee county, Iowa, when a child, with his family. In the sixties he removed to Wayne county, where he afterwards lived. He served as deputy county auditor for several years. In 1874 he organized and became cashier of the first bank ever established in Allerton. He was elected a member of the 29th general assembly, and was recognized as a useful member of that body.

REMARKS BY MR. M'CULLOCH.

MR. SPEAKER—It is not my intention to take the time of this House in a long eulogy of the late T. P. Walden, yet I think it is but fitting that I, living in the county he represented in General Assembly two years ago, should give my contribution to his worth as a citizen of the county and State.
