## HON. J. F. G. COLD DEAD

### Well Known Berlin Farmer and Former Member Legislature.

### DIED WEDNESDAY, FEW DAYS' ILLNESS

#### Was Victim of Kidney Trouble—One of the Early Settlers of Lincoln.

Hon. John F. G. Cold, one of Lincoln township's foremost citizens, died Wednesday morning. He had been in poor health several years, a victim of kidney trouble, but had been confined to the bed only since Friday and was not generally thought to be in a precarious condition. Mr. Cold settled in Tama county in 1869, and has all the years since been one of the leading farmers of his township. He possessed a full section of Lincoln's rich soil, than which there is none better in Iowa. Mr. Cold was of German birth and parentage. His beautiful home, with a grove of maple trees, has long been the admiration of people who passed. He was married on May 14, 1867, to Miss Mary A. Pillott, of Nottingham, England, who survives with five children: Will, living on a farm a mile away; Frank, carrying on the home farm, and three daughters, at home. One brother, Chris, lives on another farm near Berlin. Mrs. George Swan, of Reinbeck, is a sister. Mr. Cold secured a postoffice in Lincoln in early days, which was named Coldville, and he was postmaster eight years. He served his country in the Civil war, until June, 1865. He has been a life long Republican and for years was the party leader of his township. He filled every township office and was elected to represent Tama county in the Twenty-eighth general assembly. As a citizen and neighbor he possessed the confidence of his acquaintances. They recognized him as a true man. His death will be mourned in many homes. The funeral will be held today and will be in charge of the old soldiers. The service will be held at the house at 1 p. m. Mr. Cold was born in Berlin, Iowa, near Grundy Center.
