HON, S. B. DOWNING DEAD.

Hon. Samuel B. Downing died at bis home near Drakesville, Tuesday, Oct. 27th at 2. p. m.

Mr. Downing was one the early settlers of Davis county, coming here in 1840, and locating in Roscoe township, where he grew to manhood and received his education. He served two years in the Mexican war and was captain in the late civil war, receiving his commission from the hands of Gov. Kirkwood. He represented the county in the state legislative and was candidate for governor some years ago. Ho was one of the early advocates of the abolition of slavery, and voted for John C. Fremont, in 1856, when only 5 votes in his township were cast for him. In 1860 he was ordained a minister in the Christian church, and for a number of years devoted himself exclusively to the church.

Mr Downing was born February 4, 1825, in Venango county, Pennsylvania, and was married in 1849 to Miss Telitha Stark, a native of Kentucky, and a relative of Daniel Boone.

To this union were born 11 children. four boys, John W., A. A., W. L. and S.G. Downing. The girls are Indiana, Tempie, Anna, Ida, Joanna, Roanna, and Mary. Roanna died some 20 years ago.

Mr. Downing was a man well known over the entire county. He was loved and respected by all.

The mother preceded the father to the spirit world but 9 days ago. Deepest sympathy is extended to the children in this hour of their double affliction. May God comfort them in this great sorrow with the blessed hope of meeting the dear departed ones in the beautiful home above.
