MYERS. At the home of his son-in-law, J. F. May, in Milford, Iowa, Saturday, January 24, 1903, of Bright's disease, Hon. W. H. H. Myers, aged 63 years and 1 month.

It has been known for some time that dissolution was but a matter of time. The deceased had suffered for years with the dreadful disease and undergone torments that few but intimate friends knew anything of. About Christmas he was taken worse and was taken to Sioux Falls, South Dakota, for treatment by a specialist, but it soon became apparent that but little could be done for him. On January 8th, after being there for two weeks, he was brought back to his home at Arnold's Park, but wishing to place himself under the immediate care of Dr. Fuller, he was brought to J. F. May's home here, where he remained until death relieved him of his suffering. All that love, money or medical skill could accomplish was given him, but to no avail. He was a man possessed of wonderful will power and energy and this fact alone kept him up for days, refusing to acknowledge defeat at the hand of the conqueror, Death.

William Henry Harrison Myers
was born in Clinton county, Indiana,
on December 24, 1839, and died at
Milford, Iowa, on Saturday, Janu-
ary 24, 1903. In 1851 he moved
with his parents to Fayette county,
Iowa, where he attended school.
When the civil war broke out he was
a student at the Upper Iowa Univer-
sity, at Fayette, but deeming his
country's call of greater importance
than learning he gave up his books
to shoulder a musket and marched
away to fight for the flag of his fath-
ers. He enlisted as 1st sergeant in
Co. H, 38th Iowa Volunteer Infantry
on August 12, 1862, and served his
country well until his discharge at
Houston, Texas, August 15, 1865.
He was married to Miss Mary E.
Shannon at Toulon, Illinois, on May
15, 1866, and located in Polk county,
Iowa. He continued to reside in
Iowa the remainder of his life, with
the exception of three years spent
in Kansas and five years in Nebras-
ka. In 1895 he located in Milford,
buying the grain and coal business
of Hall Bros., taking in as partner
his son, K. S. Myers. They sold out
in 1901 to J. E. Knudson & Son and
engaged in the grain, lumber and
coal business at Arnold's Park. In
1898 he was elected a member of the
legislature to fill the vacancy caused
by the resignation of M. K. Whelan,
of Estherville. He was elected to
succeed himself in 1899 and served
as a member of the Twenty-Eighth
General Assembly, serving his dis-
trict well. He leaves a widow, four
daughters and one son to mourn him.
He was at one time a teacher of Oak-
dale school, in Polk county, and was
a director of the school when Sena-
tor Wm. E. Mason, of Illinois, was
the teacher.

Funeral services were held in the
Methodist church on Tuesday after-
noon at 2 o'clock, under the auspices
of Gloaming Lodge, No., 482, A. F.
& A. M. Rev. R. H. Reidy preached
an eloquent sermon and the body
was laid to rest in Okoboji cemetery.

His natural geniality and cordiality have won for him many friends and are of valuable assistance in his practice.

HON. WILLIAM HENRY HARRISON MYERS.

Hon. William Henry Harrison Myers, an honored veteran of the Civil war, a member of the state legislature and an active and enterprising business man of Dickinson county, died in Milford at the age of sixty-three years and one month. He was born in Clinton county, Indiana, on the 24th of December, 1839, and after spending the first twelve years of his life in his native state accompanied his parents to Fayette county, Iowa, in 1851. There he attended the public schools and later became a student in the Upper Iowa University at Fayette, where he was pursuing his studies at the time of the outbreak of the Civil war. He watched with interest the progress of events, saw that hostilities would probably be prolonged for an extended period and, feeling that his first duty was to his country, he put aside his text-books and joined the army, enlisting as a member of Company H, Thirty-eighth Iowa Volunteer Infantry, on the 12th of August, 1862. He was made sergeant of his company and served with that command until honorably discharged at Houston, Texas, on the 15th of August, 1865. He participated in various important engagements and always loyally defended the Union until its preservation was an assured fact.

In the year after his return from the war Mr. Myers was married, the lady of his choice being Miss Mary E. Shannon, of Toulon, Illinois, whom he wedded on the 15th of May, 1866. They settled in Polk county, Iowa, and were thereafter residents of this state until called to their final rest save for a period of three years which they spent in Kansas and five years in Nebraska. In 1895 they took up their abode in Milford and Mr. Myers purchased the grain and coal business of Hall Brothers, admitting his son, K. S. Myers, to a partnership. They sold out in 1901 to J. E. Knudson & Son and removed to Arnolds Park, where they conducted a grain, lumber and coal business, winning a liberal patronage there. In early manhood Mr. Myers was a teacher and Senator William E. Mason of Illinois was one of the school directors. He always led a busy, active life and was regarded as one thoroughly reliable in all commercial transactions.

Mr. and Mrs. Myers became the parents of five children: Inez, the wife of S. E. Renius, of Sioux Falls; Kate, the wife of C. H. Bauer, of Larchmont, Iowa; K. S., who is engaged in the coal business in Milford; Maude, the wife of J. F. May, of Milford; Mabel, the wife of L. F. Drowel, of Willow Lake, South Dakota. These survive the father, who passed away in 1903.

Mr. Myers was ever regarded as a man of the highest integrity and honor and he had the moral courage to support his honest convictions even at the cost of popularity.

He made his personality felt in the community in which he lived and his influence was ever on the side of right and progress. He was a prominent member of the Masonic fraternity, belonging to Gloaming Lodge, No. 482, A. F. & A. M. He also held membership in the Grand Army of the Republic. He was very generous to those who needed assistance, giving freely to charitable and benevolent objects and also supporting freely the churches of his town. His cooperation could ever be counted upon to further any movement for the welfare of his town and county and his labors were fraught with good results. In 1898 he was chosen a member of the state legislature to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of M. K. Whelan, of Estherville, and the following year was elected to succeed himself, serving in the twenty-eighth general assembly and ably advancing the interests of his constituents.

WILLIAM A. BARRETT.

William A. Barrett is manager of the National Business Training School of Sioux City, where he was born on the 17th of August, 1874. John and Annie (Killkinney) Barrett, his parents, were natives of Ireland. It was in the year 1861 that the father crossed the Atlantic to the United States, settling first in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, where he remained until 1872, when he arrived in Sioux City. In early life he was a sailor, but afterward followed railroading in Iowa and devoted his last years to farming, his death occurring in 1884.

Reared in Plymouth county, Iowa, William A. Barrett became a pupil in the public schools there and when he had finished the public-school course he entered the Northwestern Business University of Sioux City, pursuing his studies in that institution through 1891. He afterward matriculated in the Metropolitan Business College and was graduated with the class of 1894. He continued in the school as instructor in shorthand, bookkeeping and normal work for seven years and later taught for a time in Brown's Business College of Sioux City. In April, 1902, he organized the National Business Training School, Inc., of which he became president and manager, and in that position still continues. Previous experience well qualified him for the task which he undertook. He had made a thorough study of the demands of the business world for competent employes, was acquainted with the methods of instruction along commercial lines and believed that he could devise a plan whereby the latter would more nearly meet the former. Accordingly, the National Business Training School was established, with H. E. Reister as an equal partner. From the beginning the school has constantly grown until it now utilizes the entire second and third floors of the Bennett Bank Building. At the end of the first day's enrollment the school numbered three pupils and at the end of the first month the number had increased to forty-six. The first year marked an attendance of three hundred and thirty pupils and thus the work has gone on year by year, the school growing annually. An account of this institution has been written as follows:

"The object of the school is to thoroughly prepare young people for life's work, to give them practical and not theoretical training, students receiving the same treatment while attending school that they would were they to enter the employ of a business firm. All unnecessary theory and copy work has been taken out of the course and practical business principles put in their place. The class methods of
