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

Section one of the act says, "The following portions of the primary road system, except such parts thereof as may heretofore have been paved, shall be surfaced with pave-ments."

The act then enumerates the roads to be paved. Primary three is to be paved from Nebraska City east to its junction with primary 61 west of Ft. Madison. The act also says it shall go through Bedford, Mount Ayr and Leon, so that we can know that we are on the paving to that extent. It also says that primary

lature nor anyone else can drop out any primary road or substitute any road for those named in the act for paving. However, provision is made that when 80 per cent of the named roads are paved the commission can pave other parts of the system as the traffic demands will justify.

For the paving of these additional roads the commission cannot use funds derived from the bond issue, but must get the funds from the current revenues of the primary road fund, from the funds derived from motor or gas license or federal aid. The commission cannot delay the paving of the roads designated for United States and Canada. many road system are rightfully anxious to know when they are to have consideration and what the state bond issue will do for them. In that respect the commission has said, "There are some additional roads that really ought to be in the primary road system and provide for important lines of traffic in a comprehensive way. At the present time and under the present financial system, the commission is not in a position to take these roads into the primary system. If the state bond issue is adopted, then these additional roads could be taken into the primary system and could be improved with a part of these surplus funds. If the state bond issue is not adopted and we continue under the county bond issue plan, then it will take sixteen years to complete the present primary roads, and no substantial additions could be made to the primary road system before that time." It is further stated as to progress without a state bond issue, "Without the state bond issue it will take until May 1, 1932, to complete the refund to property owners for the assessments on pri-mary road paving. With the state bond issue this refund can be com-pleted by May 1, 1929."

The issue is not whether or not we shall issue bonds for building roads but whether we shall issue county bonds or state bonds, and whether we will save the interest rate between the two mthods, and whether we will complete the work under a state issue by 1934 or under county bond issues by 1944. The work will be done and the only issue is the method and the time when it shall be completed.

HON. PERCY L. PRENTIS

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare resolutions in commemoration of the life, character and services of the Hon. Percy L. Prentis, beg leave to submit the following report:

Percy L. Prentis, United States district director of immigration, stationed at Detroit, Michigan, died June 22, 1928, following an illness of more than a year.

Dr. Prentis had been in the service of the government continuously since 1901, having been stationed at several border posts both in the United States and Canada. Born on a farm near Rich Valley, Indiana, in 1870, he migrated with his parents in a covered wagon to Delphos, Ringgold county, Iowa, when he was a lad ten years old. The family settled on a prairie farm near Delphos, and cultivated the frontier homeland until 1884, when both parents died.

Dr. Prentis, with his young sister and brother, spent the rest of their childhood in Bedford, Ohio, in the home of their mother's youngest sister, Mrs. Mary L. Davenport.

He was graduated from Bedford high school in 1887, and from the Euclid Avenue Business and Shorthand College in 1888. Five years later he was graduated from the Cleveland Homeopathic Medical College, and entered the practice of medicine at Delphos.

The following year he was married to Anna Pfeffer, in Cleveland, and returned to Delphos, where he continued in the practice of medicine until 1901, at which time he accepted an appointment in the immigration service. He was first stationed at Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan.

In 1902 Dr. Prentis was transferred to Winnipeg, Man., as a medical examiner. His work proved that a large percentage of applicants refused admission at eastern United States ports were reshipping from Europe and entering the country by way of Canada. As a result of his endeavors, the Dominion government took drastic steps to stop the traffic.


HON. SYLVESTER CALVIN REES
