Funeral services for the late
Hon. John L. Good will be held
on Sunday afternoon at First
Presbyterian church here. Dr.
M. V. Higbee, the pastor, will
have charge. Interment will be
made at Union cemetery near
the old Good homestead west of
the river.

Hon. John L. Good, former mem-
ber of the state legislature and of
the Boone county board of super-
visors, veteran of the Civil war and
long time resident of the county,
died at noon today at the home of
his son, C. Grant Good, near Ogden.

The end came at 12:15 o'clock af-
ter a long illness and his death was
ascribed to the infirmities of his ad-
vanced age. Mr. Good was 83 years
old on April 9, last.

He had formerly lived in this city
but for the past 14 months had re-
sided at the home of his son near
Ogden where he received the best
of care but despite all that was
done for him, his strength gradually
ebbed.

He is survived by two sons and
two daughters. In addition to Grant
Good, they are: D. A. Good of Og-
den, Mrs. Annie Dockey of Pilot
Mound and Mrs. Minnie Wolfe of
Fort Dodge.

Through the period of his boy-
hood and youth, John L. Good at-
tended the public schools and re-
mained at home until after the out-
break of the Civil war, when his
patriotic spirit prompted his enlist-
ment and he became a private of
Company I, 177th Pennsylvania In-
fantry, with which he served for
nine months in the Army of the
Potomac. His command was sta-
tioned at Deep Creek, Virginia, at
the time of the Confederate inva-
sion of Pennsylvania in 1863 and
was sent by rail to Frederick, Mary-
land, whence they marched to the
battlefield of Gettysburg, arriving
there on the evening of July 3rd.

He Re-enlists

During the night the rebel forces
retreated and on the morning of the
4th, Mr. Good's command was sent
on a forced march to Harpers Ferry
to cut off the retreat. On the 5th
of August, 1863, they were discharg-
ed at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, as
the term of nine months for which
they had enlisted had expired. Mr.
Good then re-enlisted, becoming cor-
poral of Company H, 210th Penn-
sylvania Infantry, which was also
a part of the Army of the Potomac.
He participated in a number of
skirmishes and the battle of Deep
Creek, Dabney Mills, Hatchies Run
and Gravel Run, and during the lat-
ter engagement was wounded by a
gunshot through the thigh on the
31st day of March, 1865. Being thus
disabled, he was sent to the hospi-
tal, where he remained until dis-
charged from service on the 30th
day of May, 1865, at the United
States General Hospital at Chester,
Pennsylvania. His grandfather, Le-
onard Reedy, served in the War of
1812.

Good was united in marriage to Miss
Cassiah Schreffler, a native of Dau-
phin county, Pennsylvania, who
died January 4, 1910, at the age of
61 years. Nine children were born
of that marriage: Annie M., the wife
of Henry Dockey, of Pilot Mound;
Hattie A., deceased; Daniel and
Grant, who are residents of Ogden;
Minnie E., the wife of Henry Wolf of
Fort Dodge; Mary E., deceased;
Katie D., the deceased wife of Orlan-
do Zunkle; a son who died in in-
fancy, and Lucile Mae, deceased.

In his political views Mr. Good was
a republican, and for six years he
served as a member of the board of
county supervisors. For two terms he
represented this district in the state
legislature, where he gave close con-
sideration to the vital question which
came up for settlement. He belong-
ed to the Grand Army of the Repub-
lic, the Knights of Pythias and the
Independent Order of Odd Fellows,
and his religious faith was manifest-
ed in his membership in the Presby-
terian church.

The children and other relatives
will have the sympathy of a wide
circle of friends in this part of the
state in their loss.

LIGHTNING STRUCK TWO PLACES HERE

JACOBSEN RESIDENCE WAS HIT THURSDAY.

STORM BROUGHT 1.14 INCHES OF RAIN.

Some Slight Damage at Jacobsen Home—Tree at 12th and Boone Streets Was Also Hit—Over the State.

CASEY, IA, JUNE 5—STRUCK BY LIGHTNING, ANSEL HERRIOTT, 42, WAS KILLED ON A FARM HERE.

The storm which brought 1.14 inches of rainfall to this vicinity Thursday afternoon and evening was accompanied by considerable lightning and two houses in the city were struck in addition to those previously reported.

Some slight damage was done at the B. A. Jacobsen place, 428 So. Boone street. The lights were put out when the house was hit by lightning and a radio tube was blown out. A tree at the J. H. Richards place, 1128 Boone street, was also struck.

No serious damage resulted from the storm.

Creston, Ia., June 5—Telephone and electric light service was disrupted here late yesterday when 2.89 inches of rain fell in 30 minutes.

The rain was accompanied by a high wind that blew down branches and trees, tearing down wires all over the city. Long distance toll lines to Omaha and Des Moines were reported down and Associated press leased wires into Creston were out of commission until 8 p. m. this morning.

Several houses west of the city were slightly damaged by wind. Small streams west of Creston were overflowing and some bridges were washed out. Some crops were damaged.
