del-Minburn Long Life of A. C. Hotchkiss Is Over; Judge Funeral Services This Afternoon Hib As

Prominent Adel Man and Com-munity Leader for Many Years Died at Age of 91

Albert C. Hotchkiss, one of Adel's most highly esteemed cit-Hotchkiss, one of izens, a leader in community and state affairs for half a century or more and one of the honored citizens of central Iowa, passed away at his home Sunday night, March 4th, after a long illness. The end came shortly before

midnight when the physical body worn out because of his advanced age, ceased to function. It was a peaceful close of an unusually long life of usefulness.

The life story of Mr. Hotchkiss is the story of Adel and vicinity for marly seventy years because in those years he has been prominentbecause ly identified with the life of the community. He was born in Binghamton, New York, on November 21, 1842. His boyhood was spent there, on a farm and in employment as a clerk until the outbreak of the Civil war. He was not yet 20 years old when he offered his services to the government and became a member of Co. H, 168th New York Volunteers, under Capt. Wood. He was with that command until the expiration of the term of his enlistment. The continuation of the war led him to again join the army and he became a member of Co. M. First New York Volunteer Cavalry, with which he served until the close of

For a time he was engaged in farming northwest of Adel, but after a few years his interest in governmental affairs brought him to the attention of the leaders of the republican party. He was elected clerk of the courts and served in that capacity for six years, moving to Adel at the time of his election. When his term of office expired he became assoc-1 iated with the Dallas County News as editor, a position he held continuously until 1925 when he sold his now located at interests to the present editor.

He served as postmaster under President Harrison and again under President Theodore Roosevelt. He represented this senatorial district in the state senate during the 26th and 27th general assemblies and for many years was one of the most prominent republican speakers of the state, taking part in all of the campaigns and being considered one

of the party's greatest leaders.

Mrs Hotchkiss passed away many years ago and since then his daughters, Misses Nelle and Jessie Hotchkiss, have made a home for him. devoting their lives to his care and comfort. He is also survived by one son, Louis J. Hotchkiss of Chicago.

Mr. Hotchkiss was prominent in G. A. R. circles and his death leaves only three surviving Civil war veterans in the community. He was always a leader in anything that per-tained to the betterment of Adel and was an honorary member of the Rotary club.

The community today mourns the passing of one of its most loved and respected men.
