SPLENDID CITIZEN REMOVED BY DEATH

HON. J. W. KRIEGER SUCCUMBS TO
PNEUMONIA AND CEREBRAL
HEMORRHAGE FRIDAY EVENING.
FUNERAL HELD THIS MORNING.

The death of Hon. J. W. Krieger occurred at his home in this city. Friday evening, Jan. 21, 1921 at 8:30 o'clock. His funeral will be held from St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church at 9 o'clock this morning and will be conducted by the pastor, Rev. B. H. Forkenbrock. The Knights of Columbus will attend the funeral in a body. Interment will be made in St. Mary's cemetery.

Mr. Krieger has been in poor health for nearly a year. In the month of November he submitted to an operation and was recovering nicely but was still in a weakened physical condition. On Jan. 13th he went to St. Paul for re-examination and while en route took a cold. He returned home Saturday evening Jan. 15th and soon after his return double pneumonia developed. His death was further hastened by cerebral hemorrhage and he became delirious Wednesday morning at about 10 o'clock and never regained consciousness. The angel of death came to relieve him of his earthly pain and care.

The deceased is survived by his wife, three sons, Gerhard Krieger of Santa Monica, Calif. who arrived home yesterday, Joseph W. Krieger at home, Richard W. Krieger of McGregor, Minn., who has been home during the last days of his father's life and one daughter, Miss Alice Krieger of Waterloo who was also at her father's bedside at the time of his death. Two children preceded their father to the grave. They are Mary T. Krieger who died at the age of 17 years and Theodore Krieger who died at the age of thirteen years. Mr. Krieger is also survived by two brothers, John and Theodore Krieger and one sister, Mrs. John Denner, all of this city.

Krieger passed over this community a feeling of sadness and regret came to everyone who knew him and on every side could be heard the expression that here was a truly fine man and an exemplary citizen and in his death the family and all this section has suffered a deep loss. INCOME TAX MAN HERE TOMORROW

WILL BE AT COURT HOUSE
MORROW, JAN. 27TH UNTIL

PORTS FOR FARMERS

The Income Tax man will Chickasaw County Court House tomorrow morning, Thursday 27th until Saturday night. Those who will have difficulty making out their reports should use of this man. His service free to you.

Thousands of farmers who come for 1920 equaled or exceeded exemptions of \$1,000 for single sons and \$2,000 for married will be required to file on or March 15, 1921, income tax for the year 1920.

As an aid to farmers the B. Internal Revenue has prepared special form, 1040F, for recording of live stock, produce, and a schedule of income and expenses. This should be attached to the tax individual return on Form 1040A. Full instructions for out the forms are contained

Under gross income a farmer is required to include all proceeds from the sale of farm products or produced on a farm or purchased for resale. When he exchanges produce for groceries, clothing, other merchandises he must include his income the value of the received and exchanged. Proceeds from the sale of farm land rent received for the use thereof also be included.

In determining his net income which the tax is assessed, the farmer may deduct all necessary expenses incurred in the operation of his farm during the year. These include of cultivation, harvesting, and marketing of his crops, the cost of seed and fertilizer used, amount spent for repair to farm buildings other than the dwelling, and to fences and machinery. The cost of farm tools up in the course of the year, paid to employees other than domestic servants, and rent paid for farm and buildings (other than dwelling) are deductible items.

Farmers who keep no records only records of cash receipts and disbursements should make their return on the basis of actual receipts and disbursements. Farmers who keep complete accounts should make their return on the basis of their books, beginning and end of the year.

Mr. J. W. Krieger was born July 30, 1855 in Davenport, Iowa, a son of Gerhard and Mary Anna (Brus) Krieger. When the deceased was ten years of age, the family moved to a farm near Davenport and did truck gardening. In 1875 the family came to Chickasaw County and settled in Dayton Twp. on the farm known as the old Krieger homestead and until recently owned by Theodore Krieger. J. W. Krieger spent his time until twenty-one years of age under the parental roof. He then worked as a farm hand and after a year rented a farm which he cultivated two years before his marriage.

On April 28, 1880 he was married to Miss Mary T. Pappenheim and they settled on one of his father's farms which latter became his own. They were the parents of six children four of whom survive. In 1909 the family retired to New Hampton which remained his home until death.

Mr. Krieger was one of those sturdy and honest men and honorable class of men who win and hold the confidence of all who come to know them. This town and community and county has delighted to honor him. He was given recognition as township trustee of New Hampton township, as assessor of Dayton Township, as a member of the board of supervisors of the county for six years and as a member of the twenty-seventh assembly of the Iowa State Legislature, and for three terms a member of the City Council. For many years, up until this month he was secretary of the New Hampton Farmers' Creamery Association. He was also Vice President of the Chickasaw County Mutual Fire Insurance Company. In all his official career and of public trust there has never been a shadow of evil or wrong. He has been loyal to every trust. He was a staunch member of the Roman Catholic church and of St. Mary's parish. He was a member of the New Hampton Council No. 1697 Knights of Columbus, and of the Catholic Order of Forerunners.

Mr. Krieger was a devoted husband and a kind and indulgent father, a tender brother and to his friends the soul of fellowship. Though he is gone his record has been made and will remain with us as a lasting treasure. His life was gentle, but like the still waters it was deep.
