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able to attend. As may be imagined, the half century that had passed had witnessed many changes, and the reunion brought back many memories of the far distant, happy past, when life was filled with hope, and youthful enthusiasm saw no obstacles in the path of success.

Under the preceptorship of Dr. A. McGinley, our subject conducted his theological studies. He was ordained to the ministry by the Carlisle Presbytery in 1839, and delivered his first discourse in that city during the following year. He accepted the pastorate of the Presbyterian Church at Savannah, Ohio, and remained at that place for three years, removing from there to Mansfield, Ohio. In 1844 he came to Iowa, and had charge of the church at Iowa City until 1860. In the meantime, in 1854, he served as Chaplain of the Iowa Senate. From Iowa City he went to Palmyra, Mo., thence to Princeton, Iowa, from there to Washington, Iowa, next to Aledo, Ill., after which he accepted the pastorate of the church at West Liberty, Iowa, and from that place came to Colfax in 1878. In addition to holding the pastorate here, he has had charge of the churches at Dexter and Earlham, and has frequently supplied the pulpits of churches in other towns.

While serving as a minister, Doctor Shearer has secured the erection of church edifices in various places, among which may be mentioned the following: A commodious structure at Chesterville, Ohio; an elegant edifice at Iowa City, which was built at a cost of \$30,000; a building at Washington, Iowa, which cost about \$7,000; a church at Aledo, Ill., costing \$7,000; a \$6,000 structure at West Liberty; and the present edifice at Colfax, which was built in 1881, at a cost of \$6,000. He has married three hundred and sixteen couples, and has delivered many funeral sermons.

As a minister of the Gospel, Doctor Shearer has combined with logical reasoning powers a fair share of pulpit eloquence and impressiveness. He was, in his prime, an earnest and scholarly expounder of the truths of the Bible and of the doctrines of the denomination to which he belongs. A man of positive convictions, he never hesitates to attack that which he looks upon as an evil, however strongly it may be entrenched in popular

favor, or in whatever guise it is foisted upon the public attention. His earnest efforts in Christian work have been followed with excellent results. He is regarded with unbounded confidence by all who know him, and is one of the most highly esteemed citizens of Colfax. Now in the twilight of his useful, honorable life, he can look back upon the past with no regret for lost opportunities; he can also look forward to the future with a Christian's hope.

The first marriage of Doctor Shearer was solemnized by Rev. Dr. McGinley, October 10, 1837. The bride was Miss Martha McVitty, a native of Pennsylvania. This estimable lady died in 1864, after having become the mother of nine children. Four of the family are now living, viz.: Elizabeth, wife of J. Black, of Aledo, Ill.; Dr. M. M., a graduate of the Keokuk (Iowa) Medical College, and a practicing physician in California; James S., a merchant at Washington, Iowa; and Kate, who is the wife of Alex Woods, and lives in Aledo, Ill. Four of the children died in infancy. Harriet N. died at the age of fourteen years. Dr. M. M. Shearer was a surgeon in the Union army during the late war and accompanied General Sherman to the sea; he was for ten years a surgeon in the regular army.

In 1866 Doctor Shearer married Mrs. Sarah M. Clutter, the widow of Capt. George W. Clutter, who won his title by service in the Mexican War. Mrs. Shearer is a daughter of Joseph and Sarah (Rambo) Junkin, natives of Pennsylvania. Of her first marriage two children were born: Dr. J. S. B., a resident of Georgia, and George W., who lives in Lincoln, Neb. Doctor Shearer and his wife have the high regard of old and young, rich and poor. Their lives have been well and worthily spent, and they have a host of warm personal friends.



AMUEL B. POWERS, is a leading farmer and stock-raiser of Rock Creek Township, Jasper County, his fine farm of two hundred acres being situated on section 29. Though he was born in Steuben County, N. Y., in 1851, he is practically a native of Iowa, for he has

spent nearly his entire life in this state. Mr. Powers is the eldest in a family of six children born of the union of John and Laura A. (Baldwin) Powers, natives of Steuben County, N. Y., and Milford County, Conn., respectively. Their marriage was celebrated in New York State, and in 1856 they emigrated to Bureau County, Ill., where they made their home until 1863. In that year they removed to this county, and after one year's residence in Grinnell, settled in Rock Creek Township. Mr. Powers, Sr., was a public-spirited man, and from the time of his location in the county, became identified with her better interests. He was a stanch Republican and an avowed enemy to slavery, and after his removal to this vicinity he held one township office or another continuously. His family comprised six children: Samuel B.; Maria, wife of J. G. Brown, a farmer in Poweshiek County; Charles T. and John J., both residents of this township; and Cyrus and Amos, twins, who died in infancy.

The paternal grandfather of our subject, John Powers, was a native of the Empire State, and was born in the Mohawk Valley. His father was an old Revolutionary soldier, and during that stormy period of the Colonial history every other member of his family was killed by the Indians. During the War of 1812 he was in the military service and was mail carrier for the troops.

Samuel B. Powers, of whom this is a brief sketch, received good educational privileges in the Iowa common schools and later in the Iowa College. In the fall of 1873 he was united in marriage with Miss Louisa E. Parmalee and since that event their home has been in Rock Creek Township, with the exception of four years, when they were located in Shelby County. They have a family of five children: John R., Cyrus H., Frank A., Harry M. and Ermine, all of whom are bright and intelligent boys, still under the parental roof, and engaged in assisting their father in his farm work. Mr. Powers is especially a raiser of fine wool sheep and does considerable local buying and selling of live stock. He is a very successful farmer and one of the representative men of the county.

Our subject is an unwavering Republican and has held every local office within the gift of the

people of the township. As an evidence of the trust and confidence reposed in him he was elected in 1889 to serve as a Representative of Jasper County in the Twenty-third General Assembly, which he attended during the winter of 1889-90. A man of more than usual intelligence, good judgment and quick perceptions, his opinions are greatly respected and valued in the community where he resides. The Powers family have been members of the Episcopal Church for several generations, and to this denomination our subject and wife now belong. Socially, he is a member of the Masonic fraternity, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows and the Ancient Order of United Workmen.



**HENRY C. DE WOLF.** A man's life-work is the measure of his success, and he is truly the most successful man who, turning his powers into the channel of an honorable purpose, accomplishes the object of his endeavor. He who weds himself to a great principle lays the foundation of a successful life. In the study of every man's life we find some mainspring of action, something he lives for. In Henry C. De Wolf it seems to have been an ambition to make the best use of his native and acquired powers and to develop in himself a true manhood. A native of Vernon, Ohio, born November 11, 1843, he is the son of Henry C. and Lucy Hobert, both of whom were natives of Vernon, Ohio.

T. R. De Wolf, the grandfather, was born in the Nutmeg State, and his father, Joseph De Wolf, was a Frenchman. The family first settled at Vernon, Ohio, in 1805, and the grandfather, T. R. De Wolf, was a soldier in the War of 1812. He was an educated man, far in advance of his time, and served two terms in the Legislature, being a leader among the people of his section. He was a prominent member of the Christian Church, and died at Vernon in 1862. He had several brothers, three of them prominent physicians. His brother Joseph was one of the most noted physicians of his time. The father of our subject had one brother, A. B.

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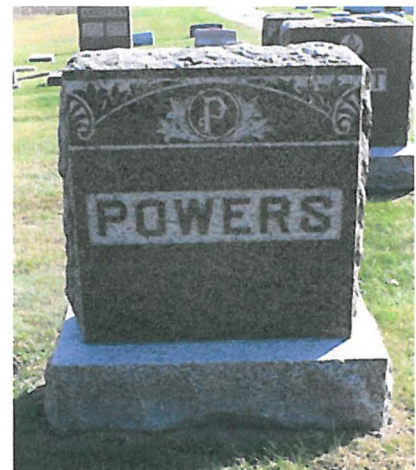
