DEATH CLAIMS EARLY SETTLER OF BELMOND TWP.

STEPHEN N. HINMAN PASSES

Has Been Leader In All Avenues
Of Community Life

Stephen Nelson Hinman was born on December 20th, 1839, in Orleans County, Vermont, and departed this life on July 9th, 1919. He was the son of Timothy and Betsy Nelson Hinman, both of whom were natives of Vermont. He received his education at the common schools and Derby Seminary, Vermont. Mr. Hinman was left an orphan by the death of his father, and lived with an uncle until he reached his legal majority. Inheriting the patriotic zeal of his distinguished grandfathers, he became a warrior, enlisting as a private in the First Connecticut Cavalry, in October 1861. He was discharged at the close of the war, in August 1865, having seen service which had won him the rank of lieutenant and aide de camp. His was an enviable record, for he took part in between eighty and ninety battles and skirmishes, these including the famous second battle of Bull Run. After this honorable discharge from the army Mr. Hinman came to Belmont in the month of November 1865. He came to this county at such an early date that the nearest Railway Station was Iowa Falls, and from there he was compelled to walk the remainder of the distance. The marriage of Stephen N. Hinman and Ellen C. Cheney took place in 1864, and to this union five children were born, Mrs. Milton Root, Mrs. George P. Hardwick, Arthur C. Hinman, Mrs. W. H. Butterfield, and Mrs. W. D. Schleiffarth. Mrs. Ellen C. Hinman passed away in 1879, and four years later Mr. Hinman married Mrs. Margaret F. Goode, who passed away February 20th, 1919. Mr. Hinman was actively in politics and in public affairs in general. He was elected to represent his district in the 25th and 26th General Assemblies. He was for sometime vice president of the Belmont Telephone Company, and Secretary of the Belmont Lumber Company. The strength of the Belmont Congregational Church has been greatly enriched by the support given by Mr. Hinman. Not only was he a Charter Member, but for over fifty years he held the office of

"For thou art greatly beloved". After drawing some lessons from the life of the prophet, Rev. Horton spoke very tenderly of his acquaintance with Mr. Hinman. Rev. And so a good man goes. The editor of The Herald-Press while never very intimately associated with Mr. Hinman has known him well for many years and his was a nature and disposition to command the respect and esteem of even the most casual acquaintance. Always he had friends for he showed himself always a friendly man. Some twenty years ago when the present editor of The Herald-Press first came to Belmont, Mr. Hinman was among the very first to extend the hand of friendship and of business fellowship. He was a man of enterprise and public spirit and a successful farmer and withal a man of such strength of character that his impress is indelibly stamped on the community and his influence will be felt for many years to come. It was well said of him while he was yet in life, "He is the same honorable gentleman, whose worth well merits the high regard which is uniformly given him." Mr. Hinman was efficient and faithful in service in any public capacity that fortune placed him, a brave soldier and a big hearted man, his death causes profound sorrow in the community where he lived and wherever he was known. He lived up to his opportunities and carried forward the torch of human enlightenment. He stood as the poet has said:

"For the truth that lacks assistance,
For the wrong that needs resistance,
For the future in the distance
And the good that we can do."
