ESTIMATE TAX RETURNS WILL INCREASE 10%

Supply of White Blanks Now Available for New Filers.

Improved economic conditions will mean an increase of approximately 10 per cent in the number of Iowa income tax returns to be filed by Scott county citizens, it was estimated today as a supply of blanks for persons who are to file their first returns was made available at the Davenport Bank & Trust Co. and in the office of the income tax field men on the first floor of the courthouse.

Persons who did not file returns last year may call for these blanks, which are white, as distinguished from the gray blanks which will be mailed to persons who filed returns in 1935 on 1934 incomes.

Income tax men emphasized that the state requires former filers to use the gray blanks and that returns filed by them on the white blanks will not be acceptable.

Approximately 7,000 returns were filed from Scott county last year, but improved conditions will result in a 10 per cent increase here, it is expected. In other parts of the state where 1935 improvement was more marked, from three to four times as many returns are expected.

All single persons with a net income of \$600 or over and all married persons, living with their wife or husband, who have a net income of \$1100 or over are required to file returns. These provisions are the same as last year.

A new point in the law, however, requires that interest on all state and municipal bonds, issued in Iowa or other states, is taxable income.

All corporations will receive blanks whether or not they have previously filed returns. Partnerships and fiduciaries, will receive the gray blanks if they filed last year; otherwise they must apply for the white blanks.

Death Claims Chris Marti, 90, Ex-Supervisor



Chris Marti (above), former mayor of Long Grove and a former county supervisor, died at his home in Long Grove at 9:20 a. m. Sunday after an illness of one week. He was 90 years of age. Mr. Marti was county supervisor for three terms, serving from 1916 to 1926. He was a member of the Independent school board for 40 years and was mayor for two terms and retired from that capacity in 1935 because of ill health.

He was born in Switzerland, May 27, 1845. He came to the United States with his parents when seven years old, and came directly to Scott county. He received his education in the schools here and was married to Miss Ellen Madden Dec. 12, 1866, in Davenport. He was engaged as a farmer near Long Grove for 23 years until he retired 23 years ago. His wife preceded him in death Dec. 5, 1888. In 1890 he was married to Mrs. Hugh Annie Neil at Long Grove. She died Nov. 8, 1928. He was a member of the Long Grove church, where he was an emritua elder.

Surviving are four sons, George Buffalo; Howard, Long Grove; Delbert G. Donahue, and John S. Long Grove; two sisters, Mrs. O. W. Porter, Davenport, and Mrs. Andrew Zogg, Long Grove; two stepdaughters, Mrs. D. G. Clapp, Eldridge, and Mrs. J. S. Marti, Long Grove; 18 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. Funeral services will be held at 1 p. m. Tuesday at the home and at 1:30 at the Long Grove church. Burial will be in Long Grove cemetery.

Harry C. Lusk, Brokerage Firm Head, Dies at



Harry Chester Lusk, (a president of the H. C. Lusk Sons Co., died at 5:45 a. m. day at his home, 2204 Iowa, after a three months illness. He was 77 years of age at the time of his death. He resided in Davenport for past 42 years. He was born in Albany, Ill., on Oct. 29, 1858, where he received his education. Later he attended Northwestern university and after his graduation he became associated with the Diamond Joe steamboat in Rock Island. In 1894 he founded the Earl food brokerage pany and reorganized it as H. C. Lusk and Sons Co.

He was married to Miss Ann Evans in Topeka, Kan. 1889. He was a member of the Methodist church.

Surviving are his wife and daughter, Mrs. Roy Paulsen; two sons, Harold I. Allen E., Davenport; one son, Frank Lusk, and one sister, N. Washburn, both of New City, and eight grandchildren. A sister, Mrs. Josephine Frederick died last week in York City and was buried, Louis Sunday. A brother, preceded him in death in December, 1935.

The body was taken to Horizan Funeral Home and it will remain until early day when it will be taken to Albany for services at 10:30 in the Albany Methodist church. Burial will be in the Albany cemetery.
