Life Work of the Editor of the Times Ended at 10 o'clock Yesterday Mora-

> ning-The Death of Miss Whitta D.

At his home on First avenue at 10 o'clock yesterday morning after a long and lingering illness, occurred the death of Dr. F. McClelland, one of the most prominent and well-known residents of Cedar Rapids and Linn county, at the age of 66 years. The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from his late home, Rev. R. A. Vander Las officiating. The interment will be in Oak Hill cemetery.

No man in Linn county was more universally loved than Dr. McClelland, and the news of his death came to a large majority of his friends, for all who knew him were his friends, like a thunderbolt from a clear sky, as few realized his condition. Those who realized his condition. knew him best, however, have known for some time that he was not long for this earth. For several months he has been in failing health and last fall immediately after election, soserious was his condition, that he was prevailed upon to go to his old home in Pennsylyania where he remained until the legislature convened. When he went to Des Moines it was against the carnest protestations of his friends who realized his condition was not such as to permit of the worry and hurry and bustle of a session of the legislature. He insisted he was feeling much stronger than he had been and that he would be able to discharge his duties. Last week he gave up and returned home, as he supposed, for a few days rest. Instead he steadily grew worse and passed peacefully away yesterday, never at any time suffering any pain. Dr. McCleiland in a larger measure,

Dr. McClelland in a larger measure, perhaps, than any other resident of the county, commanded the esteem and respect of his fellow citizens. He has lived here for more than a third of a century and has always been identified with everything that ten 'ed toward the advancement of the city and its varied interests. Honest, upright, public spirited, of genial nature, courteous and obliging, surely the city and county has lost a good citizen. As editor of the Cedar Rapids Times,

As editor of the Cedar Rapids Times, which position he filled with great credit since the close of the war, he became known in the four corners of the state and has long been recognized as a most able writer. For a number of years he has been a member of the visiting committee to the insane asylum at Independence. 

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

Biographical Sketch.

Dr. F. McClelland, editor of the Cedar Rapids Times, was a native of Westborn Nov. 28, 1830. His parents, William and Mary Craig McClelland were also natives of the Keystone state, and by occupation the father was a miller. He continued to follow that calling until his death which occurred in 1834. His widow survived him eleven years, dying in 1844.

After the death of his parents Mr. McClelland was compelled to do for himself. He first sought employment on a farm, but subsequently secured a clerkship in a store in the village of Madison. Here he remained two years. At the end of his service there he went to Peru, Ind., where he found employment in a general mercantile store. While there his ambition to secure ap education led him to great diligence in his application to his books, during the spare moments secured from his labors in the store. By this means he secured a good practical education. When nineteen years of age he returned to Kittanning; Pa., where he attended Kittanning academy for two sessions. In 1852 he began the study of medicine with Dr. Walter A. Burleigh, of the same place, and graduated from the Jefferson Medical college of Philadelphia in the spring of 1855. After practicing his profession for a short time at Kittanning he returned to Peru, where he had a very successful practice until his failing health induced him to try another climate. In company with two friends, with a four horse team and six month's provisions, he started for the gold fields of Pike's Peak. . The little party arrived at Denver July 4, 1860, where they remained until the following October, when they returned to the states and Dr. McClelland finding a desirable location in Cedar Rapids decided to locate here.

In August of the year 1864 Dr. Mc-Clelland was commissioned assistant surgeon by Gov. Kirkwood, of the Six-teenth Iowa infantry. He joined his regiment near Black River Ridge, Mis-sissippi, and did faithful service for the following year. His regiment was with Sherman on his march to the sea. After returning home, owing to physical prostration, he was unable to further practice his profession. He accept. ed a position as editor of the Cedar Valley Times for one-year. At the close of this engagement his brief ex-At the field perience in the journalistic created a desire on his part to continue in the howspaper business. He added to his dutien as editor those of financial manager. He first interested him-self in the raper by purchasing a onethird interest, having as a co-partner L. M. Ayers, the firm name being Ayers & McClelland. In 1868 the name of the paper was changed to the Cedar Rapids Times.

Personal advancement is in these fields naturally associated with the achievement of great public objects, and neither end can be secured except through the success of a political party to which they are at-tached. The strife thus engendered develops into a general battle in which each side feels that it cannot allow any odds to the other. If any one seeks to turn to its advantage the patronage of municipal office, the other must carry the contest into the same sphere. It is certain that the temptation will be withstood by neither. It then becomes the direct interest of the foremost men of the nation to constantly keep their forces in hostile array, and these must be led by, among other ways, the patronage to be secured by the control of local affairs. * *

Next to this small number of leading men there is a large class who, though not dishonest or devoid of public spirit, are led by habit and temperament to take a wholly partisan view of city affairs. Their enjoyment of party struggle, their devotion to those who share with them the triumphs and defeats of the political game, are so intense that they gradually lose sight of the object for which parties exist or ought to exist, and considerable proportions of them in their devotion to politics suffer themselves to be driven from the walks, of regular industry, and at last be-come dependent for their livelihood on the patronage in the hands of their chiefs. Mingled with them is nearly as large a number to whom politics is simply a work of making a livelihood or a fortune, and who take part in political contests without enthusiasm and often without the pretense of an interest in the public welfare, and devote themselves openly to the organization of the vicious elements of society in combinations strong enough to hold the balance in a closely con-tested election, overcome the political leaders, and secure a fair share of the municipal patronage, or else extort immunity from the officers of the law. * . The rest of the commnity, em-

bracing a large majority of the more thrifty classes, averse to engaging in what they deem the 'low business' of politics, or hopeless of accomplishing any substantial good in the, face of such powerful opposing interests, for the most part content themselves with acting in accordance with their re-spective parties. * * It is through the agency of the great political parties, organized and operating as above described, that our municipal officers are and have been long selected. It can scarcely be a matter of wonder then that the present condition of municipal affairs should present an aspect so desperate."



MCCLELLAND, DR. F., was born in Westmoreland Co., Penn., on the banks of the Layalhannah. Nov. 28, 1830; his father, who was a miller by occupation, died when the subject of this sketch was but three years old. and his mother when he was fourteen; left an orphan at this early age, and east upon his own resources for a livelihood, his boyhood days were a continuous struggle; he found employment for a time with farmers; at the age of 15, he went into a store, in the village of Madison, where he remained two years, gaining considerable business knowledge, and acquiring a practical knowledge of the German language from his intercourse with the many Germans who came to the store

to trade. At the age of 17 he went to Peru, Ind., where he found employment in a store of general merchandise; his education being limited to that obtained in a country school, attended at irregular intervals, he set himself diligently to work to improve his mind, occupying such time as he could catch from business hours, the time usually being from ten o'clock, after the store was closed, until twelve o'clock at night, and from five to seven o'clock in the morning, his employer prohibiting any books about the store during business hours; one year was spent in this way, at the close of which he left the store to take private instruction under his brother, Rev. A. Craig McClelland, Pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Peru; here he remained for about six months, studying hard and making some progress in Latin and other branches; at the end of six months, the little money he had saved while in the store being exhausted, he returned to the same store, where he remained another year, saving all his earnings and studying as before; at the end of the year he returned to Kittanning, Penn., where he lived with his brother William, and for a time received private instruction from the Rev. J. N. Dick, Pastor of the U. P. Church of that city; he also attended two sessions at the Kittanning Academy; in 1852, he commenced the study of medicine with Dr. Walter A. Burleigh, in Kittanning, and graduated at Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, in the Spring of 1855; after practicing for a time in partnership with his preceptor, he returned to Peru, Ind., where he engaged in the practice of his profession, in which he was very successful; his health being much impaired by frequent attacks of ague, and being moved by a spirit of adventure, as well as a hope of bettering both his health and fortune, he, in company with two friends, with a four-horse team and six months' provisions, joined the army of "pilgrims" for the then fabled recions of Pike's Peak; arriving at Denver July 4, he remained in the vicinity until Octber, 1860, when he returned to the States and settled down in the practice of his profession in Cedar Rapids, in April 1861. In August, 1864, he was

commissioned Assistant Surgeon of the 16th Iowa V. I., by Gov. Kirkwood, and joined the regiment near Black River Bridge, Miss.; he remained with his regiment one year, being with Sherman in his march to the sea as far as Atlanta, Ga., where failing health compelled him to resign and return home. During the time he was in the army he corresponded for the Cedar Valley Times, writing a series of racy letters descriptive of everyday army life. Owing to physical prostration contracted in the army, he was unable to successfully follow his profession, and the office of the Cedar Valley Times having been purchased by Ayers Bros. & Dawley, practical printers, he accepted the position of editor for a year, with the hope that at the end of that time his health would be so good as to warrant his again following his profession; there being but little change in this respect at the end of the year, and his year's experience creating a desire to continue in the newspaper business, he added to his duties as editor those of financial manager, which position he has continued to fill ever since. Various changes in proprietorship have taken place since the subject of this sketch became connected with the paper, his first proprietary interest being one-third, un-der the firm name of Ayers Bros. & Co.. and finally a half interest with L. M. Avers, under the firm name of Avers & McClelland. The name of the paper was changed from the Cedar Valley Times to the Cedar Rapids Times in the year 1868. The career of the Times under the editorial management of Dr. McClelland has been eminently prosperous; it has become one of the leading and strongest political weekly papers of the State; the Doctor being a man of strong convictions of right, with a plain, practical, pungent way of putting his ideas before the public, he has gained for himself and the Times a wide and important influence; strictly conscientious in all that pertains to his influence with the public, he has, during his editorial career, built up a reputation for political honesty and moral integrity which gives his opinions and teachings a value possessed by too few journalists of the day. The life of the subject of

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He 'Oad, 7 for politeness marked his intercourse with all. He was an intelligent, lovable old man, a most beautiful character. He frequently called at the State Historical rooms and the state library where it was his especial delight to pore over works of genealogy. He had interested himself in tracing out the genealogy of the great Newman family, and the discoveries he had made in regard to his own ancestry were many and most interesting. Dr. Newman was a man of every pleasing quality; a man whom it was ever a delight and pleasure to honor—one who loved those about him as he was beloved by them and whose every word and a ct were characterized by kindness.

DR. FREEMAN MoCLELLAND, a member of the present Legislature from Linn County, died at his home in Cedar Rapids on the 13th of February. He was born November 28, 1830, in Westmoreland county Pennsylvania. He graduated from a medical college in Philadelphia in 1855. In 1862 he came to Iowa, settling at Cedar Rapids. In 1864 he was appointed assistant surgeon of the Sixteenth Iowa Infantry, and served until the close of the war. He soon after became the editor of *The Times* at Cedar Rapids, finally purchased an interest in the establishment and made journalism his chief occupation for the remainder of his life. In 1895 he was elected on the Republican ticket to a seat in the House of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly. His health was not good at the opening of the session, and on the 9th of February he went home to die. The end came very soon, and our State lost one of its most useful and honored citizens.

CHRISTIAN CONRAD, of Delaware county, died at his home in Coffin's Grove, on the 5th of March at the great age of one hundred and sixteen years. "He was the oldest man in the United States. He was born in Pennsylvania in September, 1780, and was thirty-two years old and living on a homestead when the war of 1812 broke out. He enlisted in the war and saw Colonel Miller's charge on Queenstown Heights. He was in the battle of Fort Erie and saw Commodore Perry's victory on the lake. After the war he operated boats on the Erie canal till 1845, when he removed to McHenry county, Illinois. In 1860 he removed to his present farm, where he has lived in a two-room log house ever since. His wife aged eighty, is left after sixty years of married life. She had eleven children."

COL. RICHARD B. WYCKOFF, a member from Jackson county of the first Constitutional Convention, which assembled at Iowa City, Oct. 7, 1844, more than fifty-two years ago, died in Lyons, on the 25th of January. He was an influential member of the Convention, serving on the Committee on county organization. He was born in Delaware county, New York, in 1816. He removed to Michigan in 1836, and when Iowa Territory was organized in 1838, he came further west, settling in Jackson county. After his service in the Constitutional Convention of 1844, he was elected a member of the Third General Assembly—1850-51. He held various county offices, during his residence in Jackson county, among which were recorder, treasurer and probate judge. In 1872 he removed to Lyons which was his home up to the time of his death.

MARTHA ANN KELLEY, of Sioux City, died at her home on the 28th of February. She was the oldest daughter of Colonel S. G. Hill of Muscatine, who was killed while gallantly leading a brigade at the battle of Nashville, December 15, 1864. Martha A. Hill was for several

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




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
