## Former Editor Dies Suddenly

**Had Made Home in Des Moines Many Years: to Be Buried Here**

A. H. Davison, one of the best known citizens of Rock Rapids, years ago, died at the family home in Des Moines Tuesday. The remains will be brought to Rock Rapids Saturday morning and the funeral will be held from the Lockwood & Pflitz parlors at 11:30 o'clock. Interment will be in Riverview cemetery, where the remains will rest between Mr. Davison's two wives, the first of whom passed away many years ago, and the last, but a month since. There will be no services here, but Masonic pallbearers will carry the body of their late brother to the grave.

No particulars of Mr. Davison's death are obtainable at this time, as the message was from a Des Moines undertaker, who requested that Lockwood & Pflitz make the local arrangements, and which set the time for the service.

Mr. Davison was well known and served the citizens of Rock Rapids and Lyon county in a public capacity on more than one occasion. He was for some years superintendent of the Rock Rapids public schools, and following his service in that capacity, became publisher of the Rock Rapids Reporter which he edited for several years, and was then elected to the state legislature from this district, serving through the 25th General assembly. Later he removed to Des Moines, where he was connected with the state executive council, as secretary of that body for several years, and it was said of him that he was the first secretary of that organization to put it on a real business footing.

For several years past Mr. Davison has been living in practical retirement, and has devoted his time and attention to compiling a genealogy of the Davison family, a work that he had just completed and made ready for the press.

Mr. Davison was a native of Pennsylvania, and was about 75 years of age. He is survived by two daughters and two sons, and a brother, C. E. Davison, sheriff of Miner county, South Dakota. He was a member of the Masonic lodge in all its branches, and of the Methodist church. He was a man of strong likes and dislikes, a firm friend and a good hater, and was highly regarded by those who knew him best.
