Clarke County Boys in Overseas Casualty List.

Messages this week announcing the names of two Clarke county boys as being among the "Over-Sea" casualty list. Private Clarence Thornton of Osceola, killed in action September 26th and Charles E. Furrer was wounded in action, degree not known, September 15th.

The official telegrams are as follows:

Regret to inform you that Private Clarence Thornton is officially reported as killed in action, September twenty-sixth.

Deeply regret to inform you that it is officially reported that Private Charles E. Furrer, infantry, was wounded in action, degree undetermined, September 15th. Department has no further information.

The arrangements that were being made to hold a public meeting in honor of our boys who have made the supreme sacrifice have been postponed on account of the quarantine to prevent the spreading of Spanish Influenza.

September Report of Farm Bureau.

The regular work on projects was carried on which included labor, exchange bureau and wheat campaign; also the extra projects as labor survey, seed corn, pork campaign and final thresher reports.

Starting with the labor project we have calls for help as follows: Single men 25, married men 18. Have been able to place 3. Had many calls for help in filling silos and cutting corn, but unable to get the help.

In the labor survey we sent out 1500 cards, one to be filled out by each farmer in the county. These cards are returning slowly—660 have been returned showing only 247 have made preparations for 1919. Women worked on 216 farms in 1918.

152 out of 650 have boys over 14 years. Taking the amount of crop acres per man, with labor as it now stands, we find that each man must farm 40 acres of corn, 20 acres of oats, 20 acres of wheat, 20 acres of hay, besides doing his chores and caring for 60 to 75 head of cattle, hogs and sheep.

On the seed corn project we sent out 1500 circulars to the farmers asking them to pick their seed corn during seed corn week as set aside by Governor Harding—September 16th to 28th inclusive. They were urged to gather two years' supply and to store it in a good place, the final report to be returned by the district co-operators by October 15th. This report blank also included the final report of the acreage of fall wheat sown.

On the farm bureau exchange work, we have had ten men from outside the county looking for stock hogs and feeding cattle. Prices of stock-hogs were too high to warrant their purchase. We have listed on the bulletin board in the office horses, cattle, sheep and breeding hogs—mostly pure breeds in cattle, sheep and hogs. THE WEEK'S MORTUARY

Well Known Clarke County Citizens Called by the Angel of Death—Golden Shelves Gathered in by the Grim Reaper.

Joseph Samuel Morris.

Joseph Samuel Morris was born in Harrison county, West Virginia, March 31, 1839, and died at his home three miles east of Liberty, Iowa, October 8, 1918, aged 79 years, 6 months and 7 days. He was the oldest of three children of Calvert Lincoln and Margaret Jane Morris. With his parents and sister, Nancy Harriett, and brother, Adam T., he came to Clarke county, Iowa, in April 1865. He brought the first tidings to Liberty township of the assassination of President Lincoln. He three times offered his services to the government during the Civil War, but was rejected on account of temporary illness.

He was married March 14, 1867, to Susan Amanda Stacy. They were the parents of nine children: Walter C., Gertrude M., Mary Esther (deceased), Margaret Jane, Harriett Julia, Olive Blanche, Robert Allen (deceased), Joseph Alvin and Austin Hadley (deceased). By his death nineteen grandchildren and one great grandchild are bereft of one of the cheerful and companionable grandparents that children have ever been blessed with.

Quoting his own words, he was left by the death of his wife February 8, 1903, to wander lonesomely on through life. His sister, Mrs. Ely Weathers, died at Williams, Iowa, April 15, 1916. His brother, Adam T. Morris, lives at Waltersville, Oregon.

Joseph Morris was a strong man, physically, morally and mentally. For fifty-three years the people of Clarke county have benefited and lifted up by the influence of this benevolent and intellectual man. No person ever conversed with or heard him speak in public that was not benefited by it. Mr. Morris was a fine orator and being exceptionally well informed on all subjects, he was sought after for addresses at all types of public gatherings. He took a great interest in politics. He did a great interest in politics and he was elected on the republican ticket to represent Clarke county in the twenty-fifth General Assembly where he served with distinction. Thereafter he remained interested in politics but did not make politics a profession. He was an office seeker. The political work he did was for the good of the country. He loved and respected all humanity. No man ever heard him speak an ill or disrespectful word of any person. His political addresses were so instructive and delivered in such gentlemanly and courteous manner that it won him the admiration even of his opponents. His brother, Adam T. Morris, told me that in his school days Joseph was known as the best debator of the community, and he has always been known as one of the best political debaters. He believed that the government of the United States was the best government in the world, and he was proud and glad to give 53 years of the best of his life to help make Iowa the great and glorious commonwealth she now is.

We shall miss him.

Funeral services were held at the M. E. church at Liberty October 10, 1918.

Just how effective this will be as a means of preventing the spread of the disease will depend largely upon the parents upon whom the duty of keeping the children at home as much as possible will devolve.

RESOLUTION.

Be it resolved by the Board of Health of the City of Osceola, Iowa, that owing to the general prevalence of the Spanish Influenza in the State of Iowa, all picture shows, churches, lodges, clubs, and all other places of public gathering be closed until further notice. That all spitting upon the streets or in other public places be prohibited, that all cuspidors in use in public places and in stores and offices, be kept thoroughly disinfected. That all loitering or loafing in stores, offices, cafes, depot or other places be forbidden; that congregating upon the streets of the City of Osceola, and overcrowding in stores be forbidden. That all children in the City of Osceola be directed to remain at their respective homes. That all cases of sickness in said City which are of a questionable nature shall be immediately reported to the City Health Officer by the attending physician and quarantine established if ordered by said Health Officer. All to be done in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Health of the State of Iowa, and the resolutions and rules of the Board of Health of the City of Osceola, Iowa.

Mary Catherine, Rosalie and an infant daughter are deceased. In politics Mr. Harlan is a Republican. He has held various township offices, and is an efficient and faithful public servant. Mrs. Harlan is a member of the Christian church. Her father was a soldier in the war of the Rebellion, and served about fifteen months, when on account of sickness he was sent home on furlough, but died twenty-four hours after his arrival.

JOSEPH S. MORRIS, one of the representative citizens of Liberty Township, residing on section 3, was born in Harrison County, West Virginia, March 31, 1829, a son of C. L. and Jane (Bumgardner) Morris, the father being born in the same house as our subject, July 29, 1803, and the mother a native of Augusta County, West Virginia, born December 31, 1806, of German ancestry. The parents of our subject had a family of four children, Joseph S. being the eldest. Mary E., died aged eighteen months; Mrs. Nancy H. Withers, lives in Osceola, Iowa, and Adam T., of Sheridan County, Nebraska, who enlisted in the Eleventh West Virginia Volunteers at the age of sixteen years, in 1863, and proved a gallant and efficient soldier. He served under Sheridan in the closing scenes of the war, culminating with the surrender of Lee at Appomattox. The family, with the exception of Adam T., came to Clarke County, Iowa, from West Virginia, in April, 1865, the father making his home at first in Fremont Township. The mother died at Medora, Warren County, Iowa, April 5, 1882, the father still living, a resident of Medora. In early life he worked at the carpenter's trade, which is also the trade of our subject, and while superintending the erection of a Baptist church at New Virginia, in the fall of 1874,

he was very badly injured by falling from a ladder, from the effects of which he has never fully recovered. Both parents were members of the Baptist denomination. Joseph S. Morris, our subject, received a good education in his youth, and at the age of eighteen years began teaching school in his native State. He followed that profession for many terms, teaching several winter terms in his present neighborhood. At the election upon the ordinance of secession, he was clerk at Big Bend, Calhoun County, Virginia, and cast one of the sixteen votes against the ordinance, and several of the sixteen patriots were murdered by guerrillas within a few days. Mr. Morris was rejected upon offering himself as a soldier, but was of great service to the Union as courier, guide and pilot, and all that lay in his power to help the cause of the Union he did. Mr. Morris settled on his present farm in 1867, where he owns a valuable farm of ninety acres, beside which he is the owner of property in the village of Medora, Warren County. March 14, 1867, he was married to Susan A. Stacy, who was born in Washington County, Ohio, July 9, 1840, a daughter of A. W. Stacy, a native of Ohio, who located in Liberty Township, Clarke County, with his family in 1854, living there till his death in April, 1881. He was an ardent Republican in politics. In religious belief a Universalist. His wife was also a native of Ohio. She died on the homestead in Liberty Township, February 7, 1874. Mr. and Mrs. Morris have nine children all living at home—Walter C., Gertrude M., Mary E., Margaret J. and Harriet J. (twins), Olive B., Robert A., Joseph A. and Austin H. Mr. Morris is an active worker in the interests of the Republican party in Clarke County, and is one of the leading speakers in this part of the State. Mrs. Morris was the eldest of her father's family, her brothers and sisters being as follows: William

H. of Warren County; Charlotte M., wife of Adam Morris, of Sheridan County, Nebraska; Mrs. Harriet J. Stacy, of Warren County; Caius M., of Liberty village; Samuel Austin, living in Nebraska; Osmer Miles, of Ord, Nebraska; Mrs. Effie E. Twombly, of Liberty Township; Mrs. Vesta A. Smith, of Fremont Township; Joel D., died aged seventeen years, and Alvin Luke, living in the village of Liberty. The ancestors of the subject of this sketch came to America long before the Revolutionary war, and several of them are favorably mentioned in the history of the country, Thomas Morris (United States Senator from Ohio) being his great-uncle.


LEMON BENNETT, residing on section 25, Madison Township, Clarke County, Iowa, was born in Putney, Vermont, April 8, 1822, a son of Samuel Bennett, a native of the same town, now deceased, and a grandson of Samuel, a native of Rhode Island, of English descent, his ancestors being among the early settlers of Rhode Island. His grandfather, with three of his brothers, served in the Revolutionary war, Samuel Bennett, Sr. being the only one to return alive. Soon after the war closed he settled in Putney, Vermont. He had a family of twelve children, his son, Samuel Bennett, having been a soldier in the war of 1812. Our subject was reared on a farm, and received good educational advantages, attending the academy in Townsend, and the Waterville College (now Colby University), and later went to Dartmouth College, at Hanover, from which institution he graduated in 1848. He then read medicine for one year, and attended lectures at Woodstock, Vermont. He went to Tennessee in 1849, and was engaged in teaching in Fall Branch Seminary in Washington County, for twenty-one

terms of five months each. He taught one term in Chattanooga, and was teaching the Rutherford Academy, at Kingsport, Tennessee, when the war broke out, and being of Union sentiments he was obliged to leave the South at a sacrifice of \$4,500. He located in Warren County, Iowa, in July, 1861, and the following winter taught school at Indianola. He then went to Des Moines, where he taught school for one year, remaining there till 1867, when he came to Clarke County. On coming to Clarke County he settled on his present farm, which he had entered in 1852. He has followed the teacher's profession in Clarke County for four terms, and also followed carpentering for four years. He is now devoting his attention to farming, stock-raising and dairying, and is now the owner of a good farm containing 160 acres of well-improved land. Mr. Bennett was married in July, 1852, to Eleanor J. Wright, daughter of James Wright, deceased. They have had seven children, six are still living—James S., Lemon, John F., Frances M., Mary J. and Ella M., all being married but James and Lemon. Mr. Bennett is a member of the Baptist church.

JOHN W. STIFFLER, deputy postmaster at Murray, was born in Guernsey County, Ohio, the date of his birth being October 5, 1859, the eldest son of Wesley and Rachel (Neel) Stiffler, of whom the mother is deceased. John W., our subject, was reared principally on a farm, receiving a fair common-school education. After leaving school he taught for three terms, beginning in the fall of 1881. His principal occupation has been farming, which he followed till January, 1886, when he was appointed to his present position. He has been a resident of Clarke County since 1888, coming with his parents in the spring of

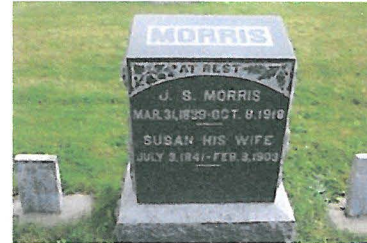

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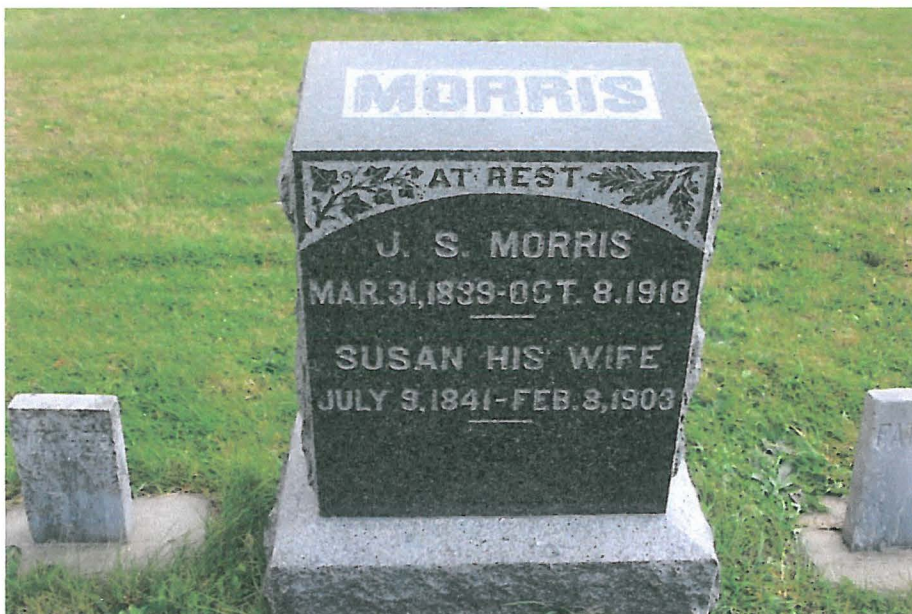
