### CHAIRMAN LINDSAY IS OFF FOR CONFERENCE

Special Dispatch to the Standard.

Helena, April 29.—William Lindsay, chairman of the republican state central committee, has left for Los Angeles, Cal., where he will attend the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church as a lay delegate from Montana. Mr. Lindsay arrived in Helena Thursday and remained over night, before proceeding on his way to the coast.

Montana will be represented in the conference by two delegates, one lay and one ministerial. The ministerial delegate is the Rev. W. W. Van Orsdel of Great Falls.

Mr. Lindsay reports the ranges in Eastern Montana as being in excellent condition and states that a good season is in prospect.

### Death of an Old-Timer.

Billings, April 29.—H. Ross of the Crow agency died at the hospital at 8 o'clock this morning. He had been here about five weeks. He was one of the oldest and best-known residents of the eastern part of the state. His wife, two daughters and one son were with him when he died. Mr. Ross was miller at the Crow agency several years. The body will be taken to the Crow agency to-morrow and services will be held there. Burial will be in the national cemetery. Mr. Ross was an old soldier.

### First Case Reported.

Red Lodge, April 29.—Clarke Fork valley of Carbon county comes to the front with the first reported case of spotted fever, being ahead of Bluff Reot in this unenviable distinction. Dr. L. A. #### Improving Montana Railroad.

Helena, May 7.—The work of renewing the track and roadbed of the Montana railroad from Lombard to Lewistown is now going on and will be continued until the road is put in first-class shape. Vice President R. A. Harlow has spent considerable time at Lombard during the past month personally supervising operations. "We have begun the work of renewal on a large scale," said Mr. Harlow. "Fifty per cent. of the ties on the first 50 miles of track from Lombard out are being laid now. This takes the road almost to Dorsey. Everything possible is being done at present to make the road smoother."

# HON. HECTOR ROSS

Died in Hospital near Crow Agency, Montana, April 29, 1904.

Word was received here Tuesday—second handed—but reliable, that Hon. Hector Ross died on Friday, April 29th 1904, while in a hospital near Crow Agency, Montana. It was learned some time ago by some of his friends, that he was critically ill, suffering from dropsy, and was not expected to live but a short time, consequently his death was not entirely a surprise.

Mr. Ross was for many years one of our most popular and well known citizens, having been head miller at the old Bossuth flour mill and afterwards head miller at the roller mill here.

He served one term as a member of the General Assembly of Iowa, from this county as a democrat, with honor to himself and a credit to his constituency. He was an active member of the A. F. & A. M. Fraternity, and served as its secretary for several terms. He was past Post Commander of Scappard Post No. 157 G. A. R. and was one of its strongest adherents.

He leaves a wife and six children, three daughters and three sons: Anna, of Minneapolis, Minn.; Ida Davey, of Mt. Union; Mary, Robert, who is married and lives at Crow Agency, Jesse and Clifford, who live at home, with host of friends to mourn his death.

PASSED AWAY

Reproduced from the Forsyth, Montana, Times, of May 5, 1904:

Friday morning the community was thrown into a state of profound sorrow at the news of the death of Hector Ross, which occurred in the Billings hospital. Mr. Ross had been very ill at the hospital for several weeks, but his condition of late had been such as to indicate a recovery, and the news of his death was a sad surprise to his relatives and friends here.

BIOGRAPHICAL

Hector Ross was born in Brantford, Ontario, September 27, 1843. Although just eighteen years of age, he was one of the first to respond to president Lincoln's call for volunteers at the outbreak of the civil war. He enlisted at Chicago in Company E, 57th Illinois regiment. At the expiration of his term of enlistment, he re-enlisted and served through the war, retiring as a commissioned officer. He also served as an officer in the Fenian excitement in Canada in 1866. In 1871 Mr. Ross was married to Miss Mary S. Davy, a native of Ohio. They made their home in Iowa until 1896 when, receiving the appointment as miller at the flour mill here, he and his family came to Crow Agency. In November, 1893, he was elected a member of the Iowa state legislature, which position he ably filled for two years. Mr. Ross was the father of six children, all of whom, with their mother, are living. The children are Mrs. Ida Ross Davey of Mt. Union, Iowa; Miss Anna Ross, who is a stenographer at Mankato, Minn.; B. P. Ross, Jesse Ross, Miss Marie Ross and Clifford Ross, who make their home at Crow Agency. Marie Ross and Charles Ross, who make their home at Crow Agency. They were all at home at the time of their father's death. The funeral, which was one of the largest ever witnessed in Crow Agency, was held from the home Sunday afternoon at one o'clock. Many beautiful floral offerings gave evidence of the numerous friends Mr. Ross had made while a resident of Crow Agency. Rev. Schermerhorn of Billings, took charge of the services. A choir composed of Mrs. Ketosh, Miss Doxtator, Miss Blackburn, Messrs. John Gonin, Earnest Woolston, Jack Cornwell and John F. Ross rendered the hymn "Good Night" after which Rev. Burgess offered prayer, imploring divine help for those thus bereaved. The choir sang "Sometime We'll Understand." Rev. Schermerhorn delivered a beautiful funeral sermon, wherein he offered words of consolation to the loved ones who are left. He spoke of Mr. Ross' service to his country, his loving kindness to his family and his good example to his fellow men, and admonished his children to follow in the footsteps of their departed father. The choir then sang "Nearer My God to Thee," after which the funeral procession wended its way to the Custer Battlefield cemetery where interment took place. Members of the G. A. R. from Sheridan, Wyo., took charge of the services there, which were conducted in a manner befitting one who spent so many years in the service of his country. In the death of Mr. Ross the community has lost one of its noblest men, and we feel that it would be useless to add words of praise or commendation, for all who knew him cherish kind memories of his life, that can never die, and in the words of the poet Longfellow, "The light he leaves behind shines upon the paths of men." We know that words of consolation are but poor expressions of our sympathy, but to the bereaved widow and children we say, "May the Master who doeth all things well comfort and sustain you in this hour of trial."

LEWIS WAGNER came from Franklin township in 1891 and bought the Forrest farm on the west side of town, which he greatly improved, building a fine residence. Later he bought the Silas Bridges farm on the north, and the C. P. Johnson farm south of the road on his front, so that he owns all the land within the incorporated limits of Mediapolis lying west of the Wapello road. He has been a successful stock dealer for years, and continues in the business. His wife was Melinda Buhrmaster of Franklin township; they have five daughters, Annie, wife of Mark McCray; Pearl, Jessie, Ada and Circie.

HECTOR ROSS was a miller in Kossuth in the '70s, and on down to the removal of the mill. He then came to Mediapolis and is still living here. After quitting the mill he served a term in the Iowa Legislature, as a representative in the Twenty-fifth session of that body. His army service was in the 57th Ill. infantry. He is now, (1896) engaged in government service, inspecting mills on Indian reservations in the west. He married Miss Mary Davy at New London, before he came to Kossuth. Their children are Anna, Ida, Robert, Marie, Jesse and Clifford.

GEO. RIDDLE moved from Montrose to Mediapolis in 1895; has employment in the lumber yard. His family at home are William, manager of the Rand lumber yard, and Maggie.

FRED SWYGARD was an early settler on the border, living close to the north line. He served in the 30th, and is always on hand when Co. C is out, He bought property and moved to Mediapolis in 1893

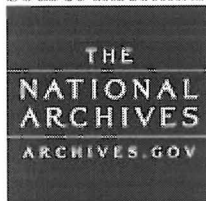
