# CORONER ACTS IN MATTESON CASE TONIGHT

## Skelley to Question Witnesses About Contractor's Death.

More than a dozen witnesses have been ordered to appear in the courtroom in the city hall at 7:30 tonight when Coroner W. F. Skelley will open an inquest into the death of Jacob Matteson, 72, 222 West Pleasant street, contractor, who died early Saturday morning in a cell at police headquarters.

His brother, Frank Matteson, 2614 McKinley avenue, who has undertaken an investigation with a view of bringing a possible claim against the city for the manner in which his brother was treated, announced he has retained counsel to represent him.

Jacob Matteson was found lying on the street in front of his home at 11:25 p. m. Friday. He was picked up by police, taken to the city jail, placed in a cell and died there prior to 3:25 a. m., when an officer entered the cell and found him dead. A postmortem examination made Saturday night showed a skull fracture and intercranial hemorrhage caused death.

## Dredge Too Big For Canal, Yard; Need New Dock

Possibility of a new boat yard in the Rock Island engineering district is heightened by the statement that the big half a million dollar dredge to be built for the district will not be able to enter the Hennepin canal or dock at the Milan yard. The Keokuk docks are large enough to handle the big boat but when the new lock is built at Keokuk it will take in the site of the present boatyard and a new one will have to be constructed. ## D. Harvey Snoke, Lawyer, Banker, Dies At Age 72



D. Harvey Snoke, (above), prominent Davenport attorney and former vice president of the People's Trust and Savings bank, died at 2:45 a. m. Sunday in St. Luke's hospital after a brief illness. He was 72 years of age.

Mr. Snoke was born Nov. 5, 1863 in Mowersville, Pa., and received his early education in the schools there. Later he attended Illinois Wesleyan university, Lebanon Valley college and the University of Iowa. He was awarded a Ph. B. degree at Illinois Wesleyan, and was a member of the Philkorean society at Lebanon.

Mr. Snoke had been a resident of Davenport since 1910 and made his home at 2316 Adams street. He was former mayor of Durant and served in the 25th Iowa general assembly. Besides his position with the former People's Trust & Savings bank here, he was affiliated with banks in Durant, Bennett, Walcott, and Grover, Ia., and Vero Beach, Fla., and was very active in the Liberty Loan drives during the World war.

He was a member of the Scott County Bar association, B. P. O. E., W. O. W., Modern Woodmen and Knights of Pythias. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Lottie Pearl Snoke; two sons, Ralph W. Snoke, Detroit, and Kenneth E. Snoke, Hollywood, Calif.; one daughter, Mrs. Bonnie R. Taylor, Hollywood; four sisters, Mrs. Mae Keyer, Chicago, Mrs. Grace Miller, Mrs. Anna Stillman and Miss Gail Snoke, all of Glendale, Calif.



FRANCIS MARION HUNTER was born in a log cabin on a farm between

 wa Cemetery. His parents were Joe and Mary (Trebilcock) Hunter. He

 sauqua, also the Bloomfield Academy, and was graduated from the Law  
 Department of the State University of Iowa in 1882. He went the same  
 year to the law office of Leslie M. Shaw at Denison, but later in 1882  
 he located in Council Bluffs as a clerk of the Federal Court, and as  
 United States Commissioer. He also served on the school board while  
 living in Council Bluffs. In 1892 he removed to Ottumwa and engaged  
 in the practice of law, being for several years in partnership with H.  
 C. Jaques. In 1910 he was elected judge of the Second Judicial District


