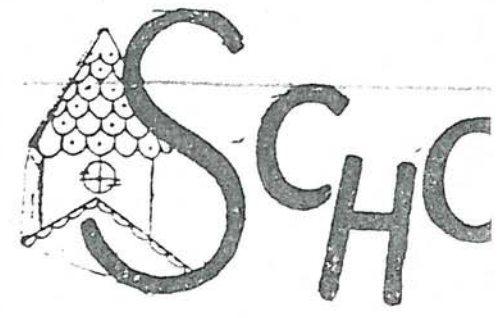

Compulsory thrift has never been a success.

ness you are really "sold" on the necessities and advantages of thrift you will never practice it in the truest sense. This is a point to be borne in mind by all who, though actuated by the most splendid motives, may be endeavoring to compel habits of economy among those under their guidance.

At various times efforts have been made under one circumstance or another to develop practices of thrift by compulsion.

But thrift is fundamentally a matter of mental attitude.

The saving of money, the elimination of idleness, the development of efficiency are all matters which primarily must depend for their success on the state of mind of the individual.

Before a man practices thrift he must have an understanding of all that it involves. He must have an appreciation of its benefits compared with the sacrifices it sometimes involves. He must be aware of all that it means in the development of his career. He must have a correct perspective of present economics as related to future benefits. He must know thrift. He must desire to be thrifty.

Until such a condition has been reached every effort to compel him to follow these practices will only arouse his antagonism.

It is true, of course, that an employer can compel those who work under him to save a certain portion of their earnings. In some isolated cases individuals may, through this method, be strated on the right road. But, broadly speaking, such practices will arouse much discontentment, resentment and prejudice upon the part of employees that infinitely more harm than good will be done. Moreover, the chief benefit of thrift, namely, the development of personal discipline, will have been lost.

Teach thrift. Preach thrift. Encourage thrift. Inspire thrift. But do not try to compel it



Durin' warm weather the game fish swim fer deep water and lie almost dormant near the bottom of the lake. A surface lure does not bring very good results when the fish are layin' deep 'cause they cannot see yer offering unless the waters are very clear and not too deep.

The best method to use when the bass are in deep water is a fure of the under-water type. A June-bug spinner baited with a piece of pork strip will awaken the sulkin' old bronze backs if ye let it settle rather deep before reelin' in. Cast the bait close ter the weed beds when fishin' in the evenin' and yer will most likely hook into a pickeral or northern pike that is huntin' fer a stray frog or water-

In Memoriam

Capt. Geo. W. Wyckoff

Capt. George W. Wyckoff was born near Peoria, Ill., Mar. 4th, 18-38 and died at his home near Cincinnati, Iowa at eight o'clock on the morning of Aug. 28th, 1925, aged 57 years, 5 months and 24 days.

His family came to Iowa when he was about one year old and he has been a resident of Iowa ever since.

In his early manhood he went over of the Santa Fe trail to New Mexico. Soon after his return the civil war broke out and he helped to organize and was elected Captain of Co. D. 18th Missouri Volunteer Infantry.

He was a courageous Captain and soldier throughout the civil war and has lived on the same farm from that date until his death, meeting civil life with the same courage the same fine spirit and manliness that had characterized him as a great soldier.

He was one of the pioneer law makers having served in the 21-22 & 24th general assembly of Iowa state Legislature.

Mr. Wyckoff was a fine father as well as a citizen and revered and loved by all of his children, six of whom survive his death.

During the early part of the war he was married to Josephine Stanton with whom he lived until about six months ago when she passed on.

To this union were born nine children. The twin daughters Grace and Gertrude died in early childhood fifty years ago and Clarence died in 1918. The surviving children are H. B. of Los Angeles, John E. of Cincinnati, Mrs. A. R. Danial of Bonaparte, Ia., C. D. and Harlen of College Springs, Ia., and Fletcher of Stanley N. Dakota.

All of the children except Herbert and Fletcher were with him during his last illness and death.

Capt. Wyckoff was the last of four brothers of which he was the oldest and is survived by four sisters from a family of eleven children.

He was a charter member of the Henry Jaquiss post of the G. A. R., and its first commander, and remained a member as long as the organization could continue.

He was a faithful and consistent member of the Masonic Fraternity for more than 60 years and was a charter member of the A. F. & A. M. lodge of Cincinnati, Ia.

Thus ends a long and useful life in his country community and home.

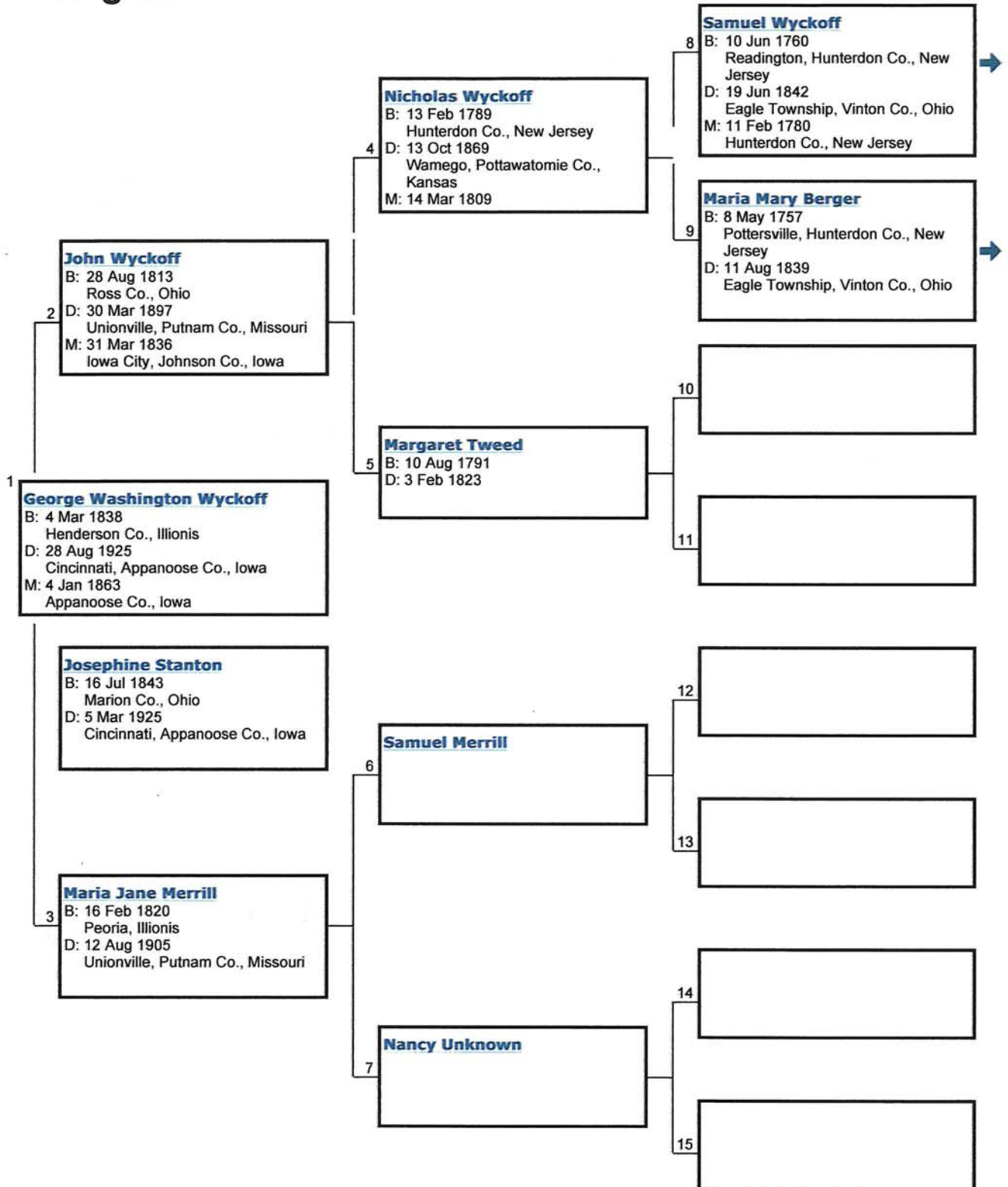
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Pedigree Chart



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
