

#### Rev. John Dolph.

Rev. John Dolph, for several years editor and publisher of the Wayland News, died at his home Sunday morning, April 5, aged 85 years and 26 days. He was born in New York state March 9, 1829.

Rev. Dolph was a soldier, having served with distinction in Company B, 13th Vermont Infantry and at the battle of Gettysburg was so severely wounded that he was never able to serve again, although he had been appointed chaplain of the 17th Vermont.

For years he was a newspaper publisher and for eight years served as postmaster at Brighton, Iowa.

His wife, to whom he was married in 1852, survives him.

Retiring from the publishing of the News in 1912, his son-in-law, J. E. Cowgill took charge of that paper.

The funeral services were held this Wednesday and the body was taken to Richland for burial.

The Free Press always, considered Rev. Dolph a fine neighbor as a newspaper man and he paid this paper many compliments which we hope were partially deserved. Wayland, la., April 6 .- John Dolph was born in Essex county, New York, March 9, 1829, the son of Rev. Leonard Dolph, a minister of the M. E. church. At the age of seventeen he began teaching school and for twelve years thereafter he was continuously in school either as student or teacher. He was a graduate of the seminary at Plattsburg, N. Y. During that period he lived part of the time in Vermont. He served two terms in the Vermont legislature and for about five years was justice of the peace in St. Lawrence county, N. Y., and was twice elected county superintendent of schools. .

Mr. Dolph was a soldier in the war for the union, being a corporal of Company B. Thirteenth Vermont volunteers. He was detailed to act as color guard, a very exposed position, and was severely wounded at the battle of Gettysburg. Later he was appointed chaplain of the Seventeenth Vermont, but because of his wound and resultant disabilities he was unable to join the re-

Mr. Dolph entered the ministry of the M. E. church in 1858 and served several charges in the New York conference, but in 1874 was transferred to the Upper Iowa conference, of which he remained a member until his death. He served the churches at Cresco, Postville, Irving, Ackley, Albion and Eldora, giving in all twenty-seven years to the effective work of the ministry. After his retirement from the active work of the ministry he purchased the Eldora Ledger and while publishing that paper he was twice elected to the Richland, Iowa, April 10, 1893; Her-

Iowa legislature from Hardin county. He published the Lodger for several years and later the Richland Clarion, Brighton News, Fairfield Journal and Wayland News. At the time of his retirement from the Wayland News, October 12, 1912, he was the oldest editor in Iowa in years, although not in term of service. While publishing the Brighton News he was appointed postmaster at that place, serving in all eight years.

Mr. Dolph was always a sufferer from the wound he received at Gettysburg and the resultant disabilities, but continued in active work of one kind or another until the spring of 1912, when his health gave way and he was a confirmed invalid and a great sufferer from that time until the hour of his release. During his long sickness he was in full possession of his mental faculties most of the time and retained a keen interest in business, civil and religious affairs. When, because of physical suffering and defective eyesight he was debarred from reading, he spent much time in repeating chapters of scripture and hymns, especially those with which he was familiar in his early years. He was a patient and uncomplaining sufferer and made a most gallant and heroic fight for life until the end. He lived the life and died the death of the Christian. His last hours were without pain. Mr. Dolph was married in Crown Point, New York, to Miss Olive Cecil Beers, June 24, 1852, who survives him. From this union four children were born: Guerdion, who died at

Rev. John Dolph, well known and highly esteemed veteran editor and minister of the Methodist church, dled Sunday April 5th at his home in Wayland Iowa, at the age of eighty-five, after a long period of ill health and suffering.

Mr. Dolph was editor and publisher of the Wayland News for a number of years, and at the time of his retirement from active work, in October, 1912, he was the oldest editor in Iowa, in years, not in term of

He was born in Essex county, New York. He served in the civil war as corporal for Company B. 13th Vermont Volunteers. He was severely wounded in the Battle of Gettysburg, and always suffered from the effects of the wound. He entered the Methodist ministry in 1858 and served a number of charges in New York conference and Upper Iowa Conference, giving 27 years of effective service. He later entered the newspaper field, publishing in turn the Eldora Ledger, Richland Clarion, Brighton News, Fairfield Journal and Wayland News.

During Mr. Dolph's long illness he retained a keen interest in business, civil and religious affairs. He is survived by his wife and two oaughters, Mary D., wife of J. Hwing Cowgill the present editor of the Wayland News, and Susie D., wife of Frank Briston, of Brighton.
