FELL DEAD WHILE STACKING.

William P. Drewry, A Pioneer Settler and Honored Citizen, Expired on His Farm in Douglas Township, Monday.

William P. Drewry, one of the early settlers of Sac county and one of the county's best known and most useful citizens, is dead. To him the end came suddenly and most unexpectedly. He was stacking grain on his farm, his son Clair pitching the bundles to him. He had remarked in the morning that he was feeling well and had been jovial as usual during the day. His son pitched him a bundle. He put his fork into it and sat down with a strange expression on his face. The sons, Clair and Ray, hastened to the stack, but he expired almost immediately. A physician, hastily summoned, of course was able to do nothing to help him. His death was due to heart disease.

The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon, Rev. Walter Torbet, pastor of the Sac City Methodist Episcopal church, conducting services at the residence and Sac City Lodge No. 323, I. O. O. F., having charge at Oakland cemetery, where the interment was made. S. L. Watt, Alex. Galbraith, F. E. Gordon, D. M. Lamoreux, L. P. Lowry and Mr. Thompson (of Newell) served as pall bearers.

William Pepper Drewry was born in Newtonville, Ontario, Canada, September 8, 1839. He moved with his father's family to Wisconsin in 1846, and there grew to manhood in Plymouth, Sheboygan county. He was married in 1863 to Miss Sarah Rounsevell, and moved to Sac county, Iowa, in 1865, settling in Douglas township on the farm where he died. To Mr. and Mrs. Drewry were born six children, five of whom are living, one girl dying in early childhood. The surviving children are May, wife of B. E. Drewry, of Sac City; Willis B., of Windom, Minnesota; Clair, who resides on the home farm; Edward O., of Amo, Minnesota; and Ray F., who also resides at home. Mrs. Drewry, who has been in poor health for several years, also survives her husband.

She was sitting in the front of the Bauer hardware store when the street sprinkler passed. When the driver turned on the hose and some of it struck the front of the horse, which started to run, first the street crossing and then the alley crossing. Miss Howard was thrown out and a buggy wheel passed over her. She was severely bruised and a cut in her forehead over one of her eyes necessitating two stitches with a fine needle. It is hoped that the wound will not prove serious, though painful.

D. Walker, well known in Sac City as a student of Sac City Institute, and lately a visitor in this city and in the surrounding township, has just been elected by the Republicans of Douglas county, South Dakota, for the office of county judge. Mr. Walker is engaged in the practice of law at Armour. His brother, Mr. Gurley, has been nominated by the Democrats for county attorney. Mr. Walker usually goes Republican in all matters, and Mr. Walker's election is confidently expected by his friends. The office of county judge pays \$1,000 a year. The judge has jurisdiction in all probate matters and in certain civil and criminal matters, and this does not prevent him from practicing law generally any more than does the office of county attorney.

County Superintendent Horace C. Coe has secured the number of teachers' certificates in force in the county. Prior to the opening of the institute of this year there were 27 first class certificates in force, and 10 have since been issued. From a total of 37 certificates issued since the institute, 10 have been secured by the institute, affording them better positions than that only 25 to 26 of them remain in the county. Since the institute certificates have been issued as follows: Second grade 56, third grade 17, fourth grade 15, fifth grade 14, sixth grade 13, seventh grade 12, eighth grade 11, ninth grade 10, tenth grade 9, eleventh grade 8, twelfth grade 7, thirteenth grade 6, fourteenth grade 5, fifteenth grade 4. Having no money, he was obliged to go slowly about making improvements, and it was not until he had lived several years on his homestead that he was able to afford a floor for his log house. He was chosen teacher of the public school in the village of Sac City, and taught successfully a number of terms. He also taught during the winter months in various rural schools, with the money thus derived making improvements on his home place. In the earlier years of his residence here he served one term as county superintendent. By hard work and good management he was able to acquire sufficient property to start his children under more favorable auspices than he began, and he had a residue that would class him among the well-to-do.

Mr. Drawry was a kind neighbor and a good citizen in the best sense of the expression. He affiliated with the Advent Christian church and was a believer in its teachings. He also in recent years entered heartily into the fellowship of the Odd Fellows. Besides the official position mentioned in connection with his work as a teacher, he served a number of terms as township trustee. He was a loyal worker in the Republican party and in 1891 was honored with the nomination for representative in the 24th general assembly of Iowa. He was elected and served very acceptably for one term. The precedent of two terms for that office had not yet been established and he was not renominated. He was active in the affairs of the Sac County Agricultural society and also in the farmers' institute, in which his abounding good humor and ready wit made him popular. He was elected president for the current year.
