IOWA CITY MAN CALLED BEYOND

William Felkner Dies at His Home After Long Illness Last Night

William J. Felkner, a resident of Cedar and Johnson counties all his life, died at his home, 810 Kirkwood Avenue, at 6:45 o'clock last night, after having been in failing health for several months.

Mr. Felkner was born in Iowa City, July 18, 1852, and lived in Iowa City and Downey all his life. During his residence in Iowa City, he took an active part in local and state affairs, having been a member of the school board for several years, a representative from Cedar County for two terms.

He leaves a widow, Mrs. Jessie Felkner and five children. These are Mrs. H. C. Coffeen of Chicago; Miss Wilma F. Felkner of New York City; and Mrs. Anne F. Hall, Margaret Felkner and William Felkner Jr., all of Iowa City. Three sisters and one brother also survive him. They are: Elizabeth Felkner and Rachel Felkner of Iowa City, Mrs. E. C. Haynes of Centerville and Clinton B. Felkner of Eldorado, Kansas.

Short funeral services will be held at the home on Kirkwood Avenue, Monday morning at nine o'clock, with Rev. Ellis in charge. Services will also be held in the Methodist church in Downey at one o'clock in the afternoon, followed by interment in the Downey cemetery.
