UNCLE JOHN BURIED BY MASONIC LODGE THERE

Daughter Was Mrs. Graves and Her
Body Brought Here.—Mr. Smith
Prominent Here in Prime.

Many old Kossuth friends were saddened last Thursday to learn of the death the day before of John G. Smith, brother of Lewis H. Smith, at his home at Santa Monica, Calif. Mr. Smith was familiarly known here for many years as "Uncle John," just as his brother is now known as "Uncle Lew."

Mr. Smith's death came after a last illness of ten days. He was 86 years old, five years younger than Lewis H., and had been failing for nearly a year.

A sad coincidence was the fact that Uncle John's daughter, Mrs. O. L. Graves, widow of a former Leeward druggist, followed her father in death just six hours later, also at Santa Monica. Mr. Smith died at 6:30 last week Wednesday evening, and Mrs. Graves' at 12:15 the following morning, of cancer.

A double funeral service for Mr. Smith and Mrs. Graves was conducted at the Leslie funeral home at Santa Monica Friday by the Rev. W. H. Cornett, of a Santa Monica Presbyterian church. The body of Mrs. Graves was brought to Algona for burial beside that of her husband, who died last August, and was buried in Riverview cemetery Tuesday. Mr. Smith was buried yesterday at Santa Monica, with ritualistic services at the grave conducted by the Santa Monica Masonic lodge, of which he was a member.

Board Chairman Many Years.

Mr. Smith was an active and
widely known man in the early his-
tory of Kossuth county. For 22
years he served as express agent
here. He was elected mayor of Ab-
gona twice, serving in 1883 and
again in 1884. He had previously
served a term as trustee, in 1876. In
1891 he represented the county in
the general assembly. For a good
many years he was a member and
chairman of the board of supervi-
ors, retiring some 20 years ago.

Mr. Smith was a Mason and a
Knight Templar. It was his wish
that he be buried with Masonic
honors at Santa Monica, where he
had lived 15 years.

Mr. Smith was born at Arlington,
Mass., in 1840, the son of Mr. and
Mrs. Edward Smith. He received a
liberal education, and for some time
conducted a garden near Boston. In
1866 he left the East, and came to
Kossuth, where his brother Lewis
had already located. The brothers
then formed a partnership, and
opened a general merchandise store,
which they managed successfully.
In 1869 F. C. Rist, father of H. B.
Rist, bought into the store, and
three years later Lewis H. with-
drew. Mr. Rist died in 1872.

Buried at Santa Monica.

In 1868 Mr. Smith was married to
Miss Lucinda T. Smith, and five
children were born to them: Mrs.
C. E. Jones, Alden; Mrs. L. W.
Harris and Howland S., of Santa
Monica; Mrs. H. W. Harris, of Ke-
attle; and C. B. Moore Smith, of Des
Moines. Mrs. Smith died in Febru-
ary, 1898, and in March, 1905, Mr.
Smith was married to Mrs. Laura
A. Hunt, who survives.

A note from Mrs. Nellie G. Dow-

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Atlanta. He was mustered out in December, 1864, at Louisville, Ky. In 1866 he was married at Oconomowoc, Wis., to Elizabeth Annis. They have two children—Mary and Jessie. In 1866 he went into mercantile business at Monterey, Wis. In 1872 he came to Algona, where he has since been engaged in mercantile trade. In politics he is a republican, has been councilman for six years, and in 1882 was elected mayor of the city. He is an ardent supporter of the temperance cause.

Thomas Earley, one of the young, enterprising merchants in this line, carries a fine stock of clothing, boots and shoes, and furnishing goods, besides dry goods. He instituted his present business in April, 1876. In June, 1883, he removed to his present fine store, which is twenty-five feet wide by 100 long. Here, displayed upon counter and shelf, he shows the largest stock of goods in the county.

Thomas Earley is a native of Grafton Co., Wis., and was born April 6, 1849. His parents, Patrick and Anna (Burn) Earley, were natives of Ireland, and came about 1843 to Wisconsin. In 1851 the family removed to Winnebago Co., Wis., where Thomas was reared and educated. In 1867 he enlisted in the United States army, serving in company G, 35th regiment, which regiment afterwards formed a part of the 4th regiment, Mr. Earley then being in company H. He was located during most of the time of service at Fort Russell and Fort Steele, Wyoming territory. After serving in the army three years he returned home, and in 1872 engaged in business at Winneconne, Wis., residing there four years. In 1876 he came to Algona and engaged in the cloth-

ing, dry goods and boot and shoe business. Mr. Earley has been very successful in business, having worked up gradually from a small store, until now he has the largest and best equipped store in the county, and is doing an extensive business. He was married Sept. 11, 1874, to Sarah Taylor, a native of New York. Mr. and Mrs. Earley have two children—Nettie and Jessie. Mr. Earley is a member of the city council. He is a member of Algona Lodge, No. 236, I. O. O. F.

J. G. Smith is another of Algona's merchants that still continues to deal in merchandise. This business was established in October, 1866, by John G. and Lewis H. Smith, under the name and style of Smith Brothers. In 1868 Francis C. Rist gave up his stage and mail business on account of ill health, and was admitted as a partner. Lewis H. Smith withdrew from the firm in May, 1870, but the firm was still continued under the old name. Mr. Rist dying in 1872, John G. Smith has continued to run the business alone.

In October, 1866, they were appointed agents for the American Express Company, but on the withdrawal of that company from this line of railroad, in 1869, this agency ceased. In July, 1872, J. G. Smith was appointed agent for the United States Express Company, a position he holds yet.

J. G. Smith, general merchant, was born in Middlesex Co., Mass., March 10, 1840, being there reared and educated. In 1866 he came to Algona and engaged in general merchandise business, being now the oldest merchant doing business at this point. Mr. Smith was for many years agent of the Northwestern Stage

Company. He was married in June, 1868, to Lucinda T. Smith, a native of St. Lawrence Co., N. Y. They have five children—Maude A., Kate N., Gracie B., Lou R. and Howland S. Mr. Smith has been a member of the city board of aldermen and school trustee of this district, and is now mayor of Algona, being elected in March, 1883. He belongs to the Masonic fraternity and is a Knight Templar.

Only one house handles clothing and its accompaniment exclusively, that of George Solomon, who began business here September, 1881, in a store one door north of the Bongey House. Here he remained until July, 1882, when he moved next door west of G. L. Galbraith's store on State street, only to remove to his present commodious quarters May 1, 1883. Mr. Solomon, although many of the stores carry lines of the goods he handles, does a large and lucrative business.

George Solomon is a native of Germany, born Aug. 23, 1854. In 1872 he emigrated to the United States, settling in Chicago, Ill., being engaged in the wholesale house of B. Ginsburg as clerk for five years. In 1877 he went to Tama City, Iowa, clerking for his brother at that place until 1881, when he engaged in the clothing trade in Algona, carrying a stock of clothing, boots and shoes, etc. Mr. Solomon was married July 30, 1882, to Sarah Sime, a native of Germany. They have one child—Ida. Mr. Solomon is a member of the I. O. O. F. of Algona, and of V. A. S. Fraternity of Algona Coligium.

The first drug store was established by Durant brothers in 1866. At a later date

Dr. L. A. Sheetz became a partner. In the fall of 1873 this firm dissolved and the stock was divided. The business is at the present in the hands of Durant Brothers, L. A. Sheetz and B. G. Forbush.

Durant Brothers carry, in addition to their stock of drugs, medicines and such goods, a large line of fancy goods, stationery, etc.

L. A. Sheetz, in the Palace drug store, has a place of business that would do credit to a metropolitan city, and does an extensive business.

B. G. Forbush, the proprietor of the Good Samaritan drug store on east State street, does a nice business and holds good the name that ornaments his sign.

The first to embark in the grocery business exclusively was Samuel Hessler, who, in 1869, opened a store devoted to that line. This pioneer grocery store is still in existence, under the proprietorship of O. H. Marvin, who was his immediate successor.

The present dealers in groceries exclusively are the following named: Crose & Brunson, Orville Minkler, J. C. Heckart, Booth & Buell, C. A. Hurd & Co., O. H. Marvin, H. S. Langdon, D. W. C. Ackley and the Grange store.

Crose & Brunson instituted their business in September, 1881. They carry a stock of \$4,000 worth of first-class groceries, and keep everything in the neatest possible manner.

A. A. Brunson was born May 29, 1840, in Grand Isle Co., Vt., and there grew to manhood. In August, 1862, he enlisted in company H, 106th New York Volunteer Infantry, and was rendezvoused at Camp Wheeler, Ogdensburg, from there

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Robert J. Stewart was reared and educated in Iowa, attending the district schools, and remained with his parents until he was of age. After attaining his majority he rented a farm, which he operated for seven years, after which he bought eighty acres in Riverdale township, upon which he lived for four years. He then sold his eighty acre tract and purchased one hundred and sixty acres in Cresco township which he operated for three years. He then sold that property and purchased another one hundred and sixty acre farm where he now resides. This farm he has finely improved and has operated it since it became his property.

Mr. Stewart was married December 9, 1891, to Miss Viola M. Jones, a daughter of Andrew J. and Martha (Smith) Jones, the father being a native of Maryland while the mother was born in Pennsylvania. The former came to Kossuth county at a very early day at the age of fifteen years, with his father, who entered government land. When the family was established in Iowa the state was in a very primitive condition and in fact the Indians were numerous at that early day. When the father attained manhood's estate he went into the farming business on his own account, purchasing land which he operated until 1897, when he retired and removed to Algona, where he is now living at the age of seventy-one years. His wife also survives and has reached the age of sixty-eight years. Unto Mr. and Mrs. Stewart was born one son, George Jackson, whose birth occurred February 27, 1894.

In his political views Mr. Stewart is a democrat. The family affiliate with the Presbyterian church, rendering material assistance to that denomination. Mr. Stewart is one of the well known and successful farmers of his county. He has always given his attention strictly to business affairs, spending very little time with other matters, and as a result he has acquired a comfortable fortune, owning a splendidly improved farm which is in an excellent state of tillage. He has long been one of the most respected citizens of his community and among his friends and neighbors is held in high esteem.

JOHN G. SMITH.

Although John G. Smith is now living with his family in Santa Monica, California, his active business experience in Algona and community made him so well known here that no historical work of Kossuth county would be complete without mention of him. He was born in Boston, Massachusetts, on the 10th of March, 1840, his parents being Edward and Abigail (Richardson) Smith, more extended mention of whom is made on another page of this volume in connection with the sketch of Lewis H. Smith, a brother of our subject.

John G. Smith received a liberal education in the schools of Massachusetts and early in his business career was well known as proprietor of a garden near Boston. In 1866, being convinced that the great west held out

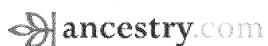
opportunities excelling those of the east, he left his native city and state, settling in Algona, where his brother, the Hon. Lewis H. Smith, had preceded him, being then in the land business. Upon the arrival of John G. Smith in Algona, he and his brother formed the copartnership of Smith Brothers, engaging in the general mercantile business, which they followed successfully for many years. In 1868 Francis C. Rist became a member of the firm of Smith Brothers, which name continued to designate the concern despite the entry of Mr. Rist and the withdrawal, in May, 1870, of Lewis H. Smith and the death of Mr. Rist in 1872. John G. Smith was for a long time agent for the Northwestern Stage Company of Iowa.

In June, 1868, Mr. Smith was united in marriage to Miss Lucinda T. Smith, a native of St. Lawrence county, New York. To them were born five children: Maude A., Kate N., Grace B., Lon R. and Howland S. Mr. Smith was active in civic, educational and social affairs of Algona, having at various times been a member of the city board of aldermen, mayor of Algona, to which office he was elected in March, 1883, and a school trustee of this district. He was also a member of the board of county supervisors for six years. He is a worthy exemplar of the Masonic fraternity and has attained the Knights Templar degree. His active business life in the east and in Algona, together with his excellent business ability, bore fruitage in material things to such an extent that he is now passing his declining years in retirement and comfort in California. His long period of residence in Algona served to endear him to the hearts of large numbers of the people of this community, and John G. Smith and his family will not soon be forgotten in Kossuth county.

JOHN W. CURTIS.

The residence of John W. Curtis in Kossuth county covers a period of about thirty-six years, during the greater portion of which time he has followed the carpenter's trade in Algona, but he is now engaged in farming a mile and a quarter southwest of this city. He was born in Columbia county, New York, on the 18th of August, 1839, and is a son of William and Clara (Langdon) Curtis, likewise natives of the Empire state. After farming in the state of New York for about thirty years, the father removed to Massachusetts and there continued his agricultural pursuits until his death in 1892. The mother died three days before her husband's demise and both were buried on the same day.

John W. Curtis was reared and educated in New York and Massachusetts, remaining at home until he attained the age of eighteen years. In 1857, he left the old New England farm, where his parents lived, and came to Kenosha county, Wisconsin, which was then termed the far west. As he had not learned a trade at that time and was not familiar with any line of work save that of agriculture, he sought and obtained employment as a farm hand, continuing to follow this occupation for twelve years. At the expiration of that time he learned the carpenter's trade, which he followed

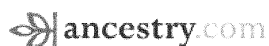
