HON MATT EWART DIES

Stalwart Builder of Empire Passes
To the Great Be-
yond.

WAS A PIONEER OF MA-
TERIAL AND MORAL PROGRESS

Had Served His Day and Generation
Well And Helped Lay Strong
Foundation.

Hon. Matt Ewart has completed his
service to the world and passed away
yesterday morning at St. Francis hos-
pital after many years of constantly
growing weakness, until his formerly
active life had become a burden to
himself, and he became a helpless in-
valid. There was a time when Matt
Ewart would have been pronounced
one of the foremost men in Poweshiek
county. But age and steadily grow-
ing infirmities placed him on the re-
tired list and constant changes have
brought many people to the county
who are unfamiliar with his worth
and usefulness.

Matt Ewart was born in Morrow
county, Ohio, in 1839. He came to
Poweshiek county in 1866, and with
his brother, Robert, he owned nearly
five sections of Iowa soil in Pleasant
township. The Ewart Brothers at
one time were the largest stock rais-
ers and feeders in the county, and the
building of the G. & M. railway was
a great help to them and all Pleasant
township in the shipping of cattle
and produce. The Ewarts gave lib-
erally to secure the branch because
they knew the opportunities it would
bring, and with their neighbors they
profited by it.

Matt Ewart was an active man, a
reader and a thinker, a student of
politics and early gave his attention
to the advancement of the farmers al-
liance and the greenback cause, be-
lieving that more money would in-
crease the value of farm produce and
so directly help the western farmer to
improve his condition.

Mr. Ewart was a prohibitionist in
practice and in principle and when the
prohibition amendment was under
consideration in 1882 he not only fav-
ored it, but addressed meetings in the
county supporting its passage. He
was also greatly interested in pol-
itics and his advice was always sought
by members of his own party and fol-
lowed because they had confidence in
his judgment.

In 1889 Mr. Ewart was elected as
representative to the legislature from
this county. He defeated Henry Red-
man, an active politician, and a for-
mer speaker of the house. The legis-
lature was close, and at first it was
believed that a legislature had been
elected which would repeal our tem-
perance laws. But the exultation was
short-lived for Mr. Ewart soon made it
clear that he would sooner lose his
right arm than vote against the cause
of temperance. He held a command-

Dr. W. Whitfield Hansell of Ot-
tumwa Is Addition to Grinnell
Clinic.

WILL BE THE SUR-
GEON FOR CLINIC

Comes August 15th — He Is Unusually
Well Fitted to Occupy the
Position.

On the 15th of August an important
addition to the personnel of The Grin-
nell Clinic will be made when Dr. W.
Whitfield Hansell, of Ottumwa, takes
charge of the Department of Surgery.
This department has reached a stage
of such importance that it will be
necessary for Dr. Hansell to devote
his entire time to the practice of sur-
gery and surgical consultations.

This Clinic is constantly looking for-
ward to improved service in the dif-
ferent departments of medicine and
the announcement that their surgeon
will devote his attention to this branch

ure. Dr. Hansell is unusually well

We learned to know him well, quiet, earnest, modest in his personal contact with men, but withal aggressive when following a principle, and as true to his purpose as a polar needle. He was a good man, a leader, a builder, one of the men whose name will be held in honor as long as the county lives, a central figure in its development, a lover of schools, a student of high ideals, and a man of true worth.

Mr. Ewart never married. The nearest relatives surviving to mourn his loss are his nieces, Mrs. Mark Sturgeon of Grinnell, Mrs. Fred Rayburn of Oskaloosa, Mrs. Mattie Bruce of Mt. Gilead, O., and his nephew, James S. Ewart, of Grinnell.

The body was taken to the home of Mrs. Mark Sturgeon yesterday. Tomorrow, after a prayer at the home, the body will be taken to the church at Ewart where the funeral service will be conducted at 11:00 o'clock by Rev. E. W. Cross.
