F. M. Kyte Dies Suddenly
 Francis M. Kyte, one of Clarke
 county's best known citizens died very
 suddenly at his home in this city Tues-
 day evening about 10 o'clock. He had
 been in failing health for more than a
 year but at times felt fairly well. He
 had been up town yesterday and was
 feeling as well as usual, and was sick
 but five hours, death resulting from
 heart disease.
 Mr. Kyte was born in Indiana March
 4, 1839, and was one of a large family of
 children, eight sons and three daughters.
 His father died in 1851 and the next
 year the widowed mother, with her
 children, some of whom were grown,
 came to Clarke county where he has
 ever since resided. In July, 1861, he
 enlisted in defense of his country and
 served thru the war in Co. F, Sixth
 Iowa Inf., being promoted to the po-
 sition of first lieutenant in the latter
 part of the war serving as such until
 mustered out in July of 1865. He was

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Tornado in Northern Iowa

Charles City Ia., June 7.—Special: A tornado struck Charles City at 5 o'clock this afternoon, killed one man and injured scores, wrecked 200 dwellings and barns, demolished a bridge across the river, and left a path of desolation.

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The path of the storm was about ten rods wide and ten miles long.

The tornado started three miles south- east of town, tearing down farm houses and barns and killing many head of stock. It struck the southwest part of Charles City, plowing a path through to the northeast side and spent itself a few miles from town.

Many had warnings of the approach- ing tornado and about 3,000 persons sought safety in cyclone cellars. No business buildings were destroyed, though the tornado just missed the Charles City College.

Eclipse of Sun Due June 28.

On the 28th of this month will occur an eclipse of the sun, which will be visi- ble to a greater or less extent through- out the entire United States. Prof. Blair says: "The fraction of the diame- ter of the sun covered by the moon will vary from one-tenth in Washington, to the annual phase, in Florida, where the moon will be seen projected on the disc of the sun as a background. Its appar- ent size will, however, not be quite as great as that of the sun, hence a thin ring or annulus of the sun's surface will remain uncovered. The ring will be ex- ceedingly narrow, its width being only 1/50 of the solar diameter." At Osceola the eclipse will be seen at
