



SPEARS, SAMUEL, farmer, P. O. Red Oak; section 9; is the possessor of one hundred and sixty acres of land in a high state of cultivation, with a young orchard of eighty trees. Was born in Henderson county, Illinois, August 22, 1851, and grew to manhood in that county. He moved to Montgomery county in March, 1880. Was married, November, 1877, to Harriet F. Baird of Henderson county, Illinois. She was born August, 1854, in Perry county, Ohio. They have one child, Clara J. He and his wife are both members of the U. P. Church of Red Oak. Mr. Spears is of Scotch descent; his grandfather came from Scotland and settled near Pittsburg, Pennsylvania. Mr. Spear's father was born in Pennsylvania, in 1811, and died at the age of sixty-two years. Mr. Spears is a breeder and raiser of fine horses; has some fine brood mares of the

)h and Clydesdale stock. He also has one fine mare noted for her peed, and a colt that won the ribbons at the colt show of the county. He also makes a specialty of Poland-China hogs. Mr. Spears keeps no stock except the very best, and he stands to-day one of the best stockraisers in Montgomery county. His farm is located $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles south of Red Oak.

WILLIAMS, JAMES W., P. O. Red Oak; born in Saint Louis, Mo., April 4th, 1831; removed from Saint Louis in 1844 with his parents to Wisconsin; from Wisconsin he moved to Clinton county, Iowa, in 1851, and in 1871 came to Montgomery county, engaged in farming, and in October in 1880, took charge of the poor farm, and will continue until 1882. The county bought the farm in 1876. Mr. Williams was married in 1857 to Mary J. Dickey; she was born in 1832. They have seven children, all living: Robert L., Harry B., Katie, William, Lyda A., Maud E., and Eddie. Mr. Williams is a member of the order of Odd Fellows of Red Oak; enlisted in the army in 1862, served three years, was Forage Master; was mustered out June, 1865.

WEIDMAN, THOMAS, lives on section 20, P. O. Red Oak; owns 500 acres of land, all fenced and utilized for farming purposes; was born in Warren county, New York, August 30th, 1838, and came to Iowa from Luzerne county, Pennsylvania in fall of 1856, and took the first homestead ever taken in Montgomery county. Was married July 4th, 1861, to Betsy Chenoweth, of Montgomery county. Theyhave nine living children and one dead: Eva P., Alice Y., Gertrude, Richard, Eddie, Frank, Clark, Joseph and Philip H., one dead, Leah. Mr. Weidman first located mont county, but being unfortunate there, came to Montgomery they and took a homestead, planting his orchard the first year; he has dealt largely in fruit trees all through this section of country. Mr. and Mrs. Weidman are both members of the Methodist Episcopal church.

Coburg; was born in Henry county, Indiana, August 27, 1834, and lived there until about twenty-six years of age; moved to Clarke county, Iowa, in 1860, living there until the spring of 877, when he moved to Montgomery county, Mr. Wickersham's father was a North Carolinian; was born Iowa. January 8, 1804, and died July 26, 1878, at the age of seventy-four years, five months and twenty-eight days. Mr. Wickersham was married September 5, 1858, to Miss E. B. Stanley, of Henry county, Indiana. They have six children living: Edgar E., Orin F., Leborn S., Horace M., Mary A. and Louisa. One dead: Loudora A. Mr. Wickersham and family are members of the Friends or Quaker Church. Edgar E. has attended the Penn College, of Oskaloosa, Iowa, and has made a good record; his grades are-deportment, one hundred, and his average in all other branches being over ninety-three per cent. Mr. Wickersham and his son, Edgar E., are engaged in butchering, at Coburg, Iowa, and are doing a thriving business.

WOOD, T. J., farmer, section 7, P. O. Red Oak; was born in Edmonson county, Kentucky, April 9, 1848; there grew to manhood, and at the age of twenty-eight moved to Montgomery county, Iowa, in the spring of 1876. Has followed farming all his life. He enlisted in the army in 1863, in company H, Seventeenth Kentucky mounted infantry; served but a short time, as he was not an able-bodied man. Mr. Wood was married in Edmonson county, Kentucky, in 1868, to Mary E. Raymer, of that county. They have six children living: Philip H., Willis M., Viola, Siotha, James A., Mary H., and one dead. Mr. Wood's father (Harvey Wood) was born in Jackson county, Tennessee, in the year 1818; there were ten in the family: T. J., C. M., Elizabeth, R. B., Emily, Jane, S. C., C. A., and two dead: John W. and Mary A.

WHITE, SHEM, lives on section 27, P. O. Red Oak. Mr. White is a native of Indiana county, Pennsylvania, and was born May 20, 1821. Made a trip west in 1849, with the intention of going to California, stopping at St. Louis and there engaged in wood boating, then in the fall returned home and followed lumbering on the Susquehanna river. June 13, 1850, he was married to Miss Parcilla White, of Perry county, Pennsylvania. She was born November 8, 1829. They are the parents of five children: Henry E., born August 8, 1851, died May 5, 1856, Mary E., born October 13, 1853, James C., born March 6, 1857, died September 46, 1865, William N., born November 28, 1859, Lewis W., born February 12, 1863. Mr. White enlisted in company F, Two Hundred and Sixth Pennsylvania volunteer infantry, August 26, 1864, and served until June 26, 1865. Was mustered out at Richmond, and arrived at home July 2,

ANNALS OF IOWA

DANIEL HAMPTON BOWEN was born in Green County, Wisconsin, September 6, 1850, and died at Waukon, Iowa, August 27, 1921. He was the son of Jared Ingersoll and Lacy Ann Bowen. He grew to manhood on his father's farm and attended common school. He then spent three years in the office of Dr. Russell Broughton, of Broadhead, Wisconsin, following that by entering Rush Medical College, and was graduated from it in 1876 with the degree of M. D. Soon thereafter he located at Rossville, Allamakee County, Iowa, for the practice of medicine. In 1880 he removed to Waukon and formed a partnership with Dr. J. B. Mattoon. He served as president of the Alumni Association of Rush Medical College, as president of the Allamakee County Medical Society, as a member of the Waukon City Council, as mayor of Waukon, and as a member of the Waukon Board of Education. In 1878 he was elected coroner of Allamakee County and served two terms. In 1895 he was elected representative and was re-elected in 1897 and 1899, serving in the Twenty-sixth, Twenty-sixth extra, Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth general assemblies. He was speaker of the House in the Twenty-eighth, having been chosen over Willard L. Eaton by a vote of 43 to 38 in a notable contest in which the re-election of Senator John H. Gear was contested by Albert B. Cummins, Dr. Bowen being identified with Gear's friends. Dr. Bowen was deservedly popular as a physician and as a public man.

THEODORE BOLIVAR PERRY was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, April 1, 1832, and died at Albia, Iowa, May 14, 1921. He came with his parents, Lewis Franklin and Margaret Nixon Perry, on their removal to Burlington, Iowa, in 1850. In the following few years he taught school in Wapello, Polk, Warren, Madison and Monroe counties. He made his home in Albia from May 14, 1853. He studied law with Judge John S. Townsend, with whom he was later associated as a partner. He was admitted to the bar in 1854. In 1858 he was elected a member of the Iowa Board of Education and served for four years. In 1891 he was elected senator and served in the Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth general assemblies, and proved to be a useful legislator. He was a perminent lawyer, a successful business man and a useful citizen.

THOMAS WEIDMAN was born at Columbia, New Jersey, August 30, 1838, and died at Red Oak, Iowa, July 3, 1921. With his parents' family he removed to Waverly, Pennsylvania, in 1851 and to Fremont County, Iowa, in 1856. He removed to Montgomery County in 1861. He engaged in farming and became an extensive land owner. In 1887 he was elected senator and served in the Twenty-second and Twentythird general assemblies. Later he was for a time special agent of the government land office in New Mexico, but resigned and returned to Montgomery County.

Huldah Brookins, a native of Berkshire county, Massachusetts, and a daughter of of Stephen Brookins, a native of Massachusetts. Stephen Brookins was a soldier in the Revolutionary war, as was also his wife's father, Michael Taylor. The Ensign family were among the early settlers in Madison county, New York. Captain Ensign died there, aged eighty eight, and his wife, ninetysix.

In 1856 William and Huldah Ensign removed from Madison county, New York, to Fond du Lac county, Wisconsin, where they remained until 1866, when they came to Adams county, Iowa. They reared a family of five children, four of whom are living. Here the mother died in 1873, and the father passed away at the age of seventy-five years. The latter was a Whig and subsequently a Republican; was an earnest Christian man, first a Baptist, afterward a Methodist, and at the time of his death a member of the United Brethren Church. The names of the children born to them are as follows: Polly Noise, of Bates county, Missouri; W. H., whose name heads this sketch; O. S., of Douglas township, Adams county; Stephen B., deceased, and Eunice Jenette Wright, of Bates county, Missouri.

Stephen B. Ensign was born in Madison county, New York, and was reared there and in Wisconsin. He was married in Adams county, Iowa, to Mrs. Mary E. Erskins, nee Spargur. She was born and reared in Highland county, Ohio, daughter of Caleb W., and Lydia Spargur. Her first husband, Michael Erskins, died in Highland county, Ohio, leaving her with one son, M. G. Erskins, who now resides with W. H. Ensign. Stephen B. Ensign and wife both died about the same time, some twelve years ago, leaving a daughter, Anna Belle Ensign, who also resides with her uncle, W. H. Ensign.

The subject of our sketch was reared on a farm in Madison county, New York, where he was born August 18, 1835. He received his education in the common schools of his native State, and was twenty years old when the family moved to Fond du Lac county, Wisconsin. February 9, 1864, he enlisted in Company I, Thirty-fifth Wisconsin Infantry, Volunteers; served on the Mississippi river, most of the time doing provost and guard duty, and was honorably discharged at Madison, Wisconsin, May 12, 1865. In 1866 he came to Adams county, Iowa, with his parents and older sister, making the journey with teams and camping out at night. He settled on his present farm in 1870. It was then wild land, and under his judicious management it has been developed into a fine farm. The two-story residence is built on the southern style and is located somewhat back from the road. Mr. Ensign has given much attention to stock. He owns one horse, now twenty-six years old, that he brought with him from Wisconsin.

A jovial bachelor, honorable and upright in all his business dealings, and frank and cordial at all times, Mr. Ensign is a favorite among his many friends. He is a Republican and a member of the Meyerhoff Post.

ON. THOMAS WEIDMAN, present State Senator, is a son of Phillip Weidman, who was born in Northhampton county, Pennsylvania, in 1800. The grandfather was Henry Weidman, also a native of Pennsylvania; but his father, who was also named Phillip, was a native of Germany and emigrated to America and settled at Philadelphia long before the war of the Revolution. He was a Quaker and as there was much disturbance in the colonies, he re-

moved to Canada, where he settled and died. The grandfather of our subject did not go with his father, but settled in Pennsylvania.

The mother of Thomas Weidman was Susanna Rymond, also of an early Pennsylvania family. Her father was Jacob Rymond, a native of Germany. The father was the eldest of eight sons and there were also two daughters; all grew to mature years. Phillip Weidman was a shoemaker by trade; he and his wife had six children who grew to maturity, two sons and four daughters, all still living. The father came to Fremont county, Iowa, in 1857, where he settled on a farm on which he lived until his death in 1862; the mother survived for ten years; she lived with her son Thomas the last years of her life.

Mr. Weidman was born August 30, 1838, being about nineteen when he came to this State. In 1861 he came to this county and married at that time Miss Betsy Chenoweth, the daughter of Joseph and Anna (Skidmore) Chenoweth. She was born in Ohio. They have had eleven children, seven sons and four daughters. The eldest daughter married Ezra Ruffner and died about three and a half years after marriage; Frances Alice and Gertrude, both married and live in this county; Richard, Edward, Frank, Clark, Joseph, Phillip and Le Roy. Our subject has been engaged in farming in Grant township where he took a homestead; he has 445 acres in a body. He was for sixteen years Justice of the Peace; was a member of the county Board and was very popular; was elected in the fall of 1888 to the State Senate by a majority of 300 against the Hon. W. W. Merritt. He took a prominent part in the organization of the Senate, discharged his obligations to that body and to his constituency with fidelity and ability that was as admirable as rare; moved to the town of Red Oak in May, 1890, where he has a pleasant home. He is a member of the Protestant Methodist Episcopal church. He has been a hard worker; has never taken a drop of liquor nor ever used tobacco; is an upright, moral man and a citizen of whom any community might be proud.

AMES T. FIFE, a farmer and stockraiser of section 24, Jasper township, was born in Allegheny county, Pennsylvania, March 3, 1829, a son of William Fife, who was a descendant of John Fife, of Fifeshire, Scotland. John Fife was born in 1721, and removed to county Tyrone, Ireland; in 1756 he came to Winchester, Virginia, and in 1766 to Upper St. Clair, Pennsylvania, where he purchased 1,000 acres of land of the Indians and there he died November 19, 1800, and this land still belongs to his descendants. William Fife, the grandfather of our subject, a son of John Fife, Jr., was born in 1751, and died July 25, 1818, and served as a soldier during the Revolutionary war. His wife was Margaret Boyd. The father of our subject was reared on the old Fife homestead, and married Mary Thomas, of Nodaway township Washington county, Pennsylvania. The maternal ancestors of our subject were among the first settlers of Washington county, and were of Welsh descent. In 1835 William Fife sold his interest in the old homestead and removed to Washington county, Pennsylvania, where he died when our subject was fourteen years of age, leaving his widow and twelve children but limited means.

It became necessary for those that were able to do anything to go to work; our subject commenced work on a farm at \$4 per month and never received more-than \$7. In
