NORTHERN IOWA AGAIN BLOCKED BY SNOW DRIFTS

Section Fight to Restore Highway and Rail Traffic—Rain, Wet Snow Hampers Highway Traffic Over Rest of State.

DES MOINES, Feb. 28—(AP)—Northwest Iowa fought to restore highway and railroad traffic through a new blockade of snow drifts today.

The drifts, built yesterday and last night out of a heavy wet snow by a wind that ranged 40 and more miles an hour in velocity extended from Mason City west and from the Lincoln highway north.

Highways Slippery.

Icy highways throughout the rest of the state, resulting from wet snow and rain frozen by lowered temperatures, hampered traffic.

In southeast Iowa local floods resulting from ice jams along the Des Moines river, but freezing weather was slowing up the runoff and lessening the danger.

Temperatures in the northwest fell below zero early today, Sioux City reporting one degree below, Spirit Lake three degrees below.

The rest of the state measured minimums ranging from zero up to 16 above, temperatures losing their severity the farther southeast the reading.

Little Hope of Better Weather.

There was a little hope of better weather in the weatherman's forecast.

"It will warm up some today," he said, "but temperatures probably will sink back to five below in northeast Iowa early tomorrow, to zero in the northwest, and to 10 above in the southern half of the state. Temperatures will rise tomorrow, but snow is in prospect.

TO BOTTOM OF DEEP CANYON

Passenger Car Ripped from Rear of Train, Toppled into Debris-Strewn Canyon—Three Persons Are Known to Be Dead.

WALLACE, Idaho, Feb. 27—Four persons buried by avalanche today, the second in five days in this section, were taken alive from the debris in Bur canyon. Three were killed when the first slide last night engulfed a Northern Pacific passenger train.

First reports had indicated possible loss of three lives in today's slide. Workers dug into the debris with feverish haste, however, and rescued all four persons caught in the avalanche which demolished five houses.

Dug Out of Debris.

Five-year-old Donald Stalwin caught as he played near his home was the first to be found. He was taken to a hospital suffering from shock and exposure.

Mr. and Mrs. Ole Erickson and their small son, Edwin, were dug out after more than two hours. The rescue crews from near mines. Mr. and Mrs. Erickson were suffering from bruises, shock and exposure, but the son did not seem to be hurt.

WALLACE, Idaho, Feb. 27 (AP)—Four missing persons were believed dead today, buried under tons of snow that roared down Coeur D'Alene mountain and swept a railroad passenger coach to the bottom of a debris-littered canyon.

The avalanche came down the steep mountain at dusk yesterday and ripped the coach from the rear of a two-car branch line train.

Find Two Injured.

The tragedy occurred about 2 miles east of Shoshone Pass, the Cascades where three persons were killed in a snowslide Sunday.

A rescue crew of 25 found two injured passengers in the wreckage. The survivors were taken to a hospital. Lookout Summit station reported four persons were killed.

Rail Service Cancelled.

The Illinois Central railroad cancelled all service west of Waterloo until snow plows could open up the drifts. Other roads did likewise. It still was snowing and blowing.

"Winter weather in north Iowa today," reported Mason City. "All rail and highway transportation blocked by drifts."

All Highways Closed.
At Sioux City virtually all highways were closed and train service halted, but railroads expected to "get going" by this afternoon. Charles City reported highway 14 blockaded, but other highways open. Train service there was halted.

Like reports came from Ida Grove, Rockwell City, Spirit Lake, Emmetsburg and a number of other northwest Iowa points.

Near Eddyville, just above Ottumwa in southeast Iowa, an ice jam several miles long choked the Des Moines river, which rose nine feet behind the jam in a few hours. Several highways in that vicinity were flooded.

Motorists Stranded.
The new blockade in northwest Iowa caught literally hundreds of motorists out on the highways and stranded them.

Near Sioux City, a highway commission snow plow crew fought this morning to reach ten men forced to seek shelter in a service station on highway 20.

The operator reported by telephone that there was little food in the station and that his fuel supply was running low.

Leader in Community.
The death of Judge Craig removes one of the most active and efficient leaders of not only this city but of the county and state. In the public eye for more than a half century, Judge Craig was one of the most familiar and beloved figures of the community. Welcomed wherever he went, respected by all persons in every walk of life, a friendly, kindly man has been taken and his place will be hard to fill. His devotion to his wife was ideal and it was this

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21. (AP) Secretary Morgenthau announced today the treasury's March 15 financing will aggregate \$1,800,000,000, of which \$800,000,000 will be new cash borrowed to meet government costs.

In cash, the treasury will ask \$1,250,000,000. This will supply the \$800,000,000 of new money and \$450,000,000 to pay off in cash that amount of debt maturing March 15.

The remainder of the financing, \$1,000,000,000, will be in the form of bonds, involving \$550,000,000 of notes which mature April 15,

Funeral on Saturday.

Funeral services are to be held Saturday afternoon from the Westminster Presbyterian church at 2 o'clock, and will be in charge of Dr. William Robert Hodgson of Moline, former pastor of the church here.

Surviving Judge Craig are his wife and his son, M. Coulter Craig of Pittsburgh, Pa., and two grandchildren, Fane Coulter and Sallie Wetherill. Mrs. Craig was to arrive here this noon, having been summoned as the condition of the judge grew serious. Two cousins, Miss Bertha Craig of this city, and Reid Craig of Dallas, Texas, survive and a nephew, John S. Sprowls of Superior, Wis., who read law in Judge Craig's office here, will arrive for the services. There are other cousins, nephews and nieces, but these are the ones who are best known here in connection with Judge Craig and his family.

Judge's Term Begins in 1919.

Judge Craig has served as judge of the district court of the First Judicial district, since 1919. He has often said that he was the oldest member of the Keokuk bar, having been associated with the practice of law in Keokuk since 1878. He served as mayor of the city of Keokuk for four terms, having been first elected in 1889, and three times thereafter, the last time in 1921.

Drama in Court Room.

Judge Craig, kindly and sincere, refused the request until he could question the sister. He then asked her if she knew the meaning of anarchy. connection with Judge Craig and his family.

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In 1886 he was sent to Des Moines as a member of the state legislature and was again a member of that body in 1888. His ability was recognized over the state to the extent that he was prominently considered as a candidate for governor of Iowa in 1889, but refused to allow his name to go before the state convention then held at Sioux City.

For eleven years he was a member of the board of education of the city. In 1896 he was elected county attorney and served four years. In 1902 and 1904 he was candidate for congress from the district and in 1919 was a candidate for judge of the supreme court.

Library Connection Outstanding.

One of the outstanding activities in his busy public life was his connection with the Keokuk Public Library. At his death he was president of the board of trustees and had served continuously as such since 1895, forty-one years. The public library practically owes its existence to Judge Craig. He was the first to suggest the formation of such an institution in Keokuk. He was named to the board in 1894 and became chairman of the finance committee, by the appointment by Henry Hunkamp, then the president. Told that his duties were to secure sufficient funds to operate the library for the year, Judge Craig replied that he was no reason why a free public library should not be established here and that he was unwilling to go out and beg the money as had been the custom.

His suggestion prevailed, and the new library association was formed and he was named president of the board selected after the people of Keokuk in April 1894, had voted to establish the free library.

Administration Progressive.

A sewer system was built then, and it was by his tenure that the Keokuk street car system was established. A street car system also was inaugurated in the city.

Administration Progressive.
It was during Mayor Craig's first administration that street paving was inaugurated in Keokuk, with Main street from Second to Eighth being paved. A sewer system was built then, and it was in his regime that the Keokuk Union Depot was built. Establishment of a street car system also was accomplished in his administration, so that he became known for many foremost acts of progression and good citizenship.

During the time that he was in the state legislature, he took a prominent part in the leadership of the democratic party, which he has always espoused.

Came Here in 1878.
Judge Craig came to Keokuk May 1, 1878, and became a law student in the office of his uncle, the Hon. John H. Craig. A few years ago when his picture was unveiled as part of the series of pictures being presented to the Lee county court by the local bar, Judge Craig spoke of the early training given by his uncle and recalled many of the happenings of the early bar association. He was admitted to practice in 1879 and became associated with the firm of Craig, Collier and Craig. He ascended the district court bench in 1910, succeeding the late Judge Henry Bank, Jr.

As an attorney and jurist as well Judge Craig has been noted for the thoroughness with which he goes into cases, and for the analytical mind he has displayed in the consideration of these cases. His devotion to his profession and the high standards which he has maintained has made him one of the best known figures in the legal world both locally and in a wider sphere throughout the county and state.

Humanness as Judge.
His humanness as a judge, and his ability to see both sides of the question have marked his career on the bench.

During his long service as judge, the custom of special programs on naturalization days has grown considerably and he himself has taken the lead in making these programs mean something to those who are being admitted to citizenship and to those citizens who are taking part in them. He has always offered wise words of counsel and help to the new citizen. It is recalled that during one of these hearings a most dramatic incident occurred. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias, the Royal Arcanum, and belonged to the Keokuk club and the Keokuk Country club. He was a member of the Alpha Gamma fraternity in college.

Native of Pennsylvania.
A native of Pennsylvania, John Enster Craig was born in Claysville, Washington county, March 14, 1853. He was the son of Alexander K. and Sarah McLain Craig. His father was prominent in Pennsylvania affairs and for two years served in congress. Judge Craig was educated as a boy in the public schools of his native county and later entered Washington and Jefferson college, becoming one of its alumni in 1877. He was recently honored by his Alma Mater, which presented him with a certificate for his service of fifty years or more and his loyalty to his college. When Dr. Gilmore of Iowa, was installed as president of this university, Washington and Jefferson sent Judge Craig his cap and gown and asked him to represent that college in the services, which he did with becoming dignity.
Judge Craig was at one time president of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of this city and occupied the chair of Medical Jurisprudence in the college.
