DEATH OF DR. DORON.

One of Iowa's Pioneer Physicians and an Ex-Legislator.

Word came by telephone last night that Dr. J. Doron, of Mt. Vernon, was dead. This sad and startling news informs us that another landmark has been removed.

Dr. Doron had lived in Iowa since 1846. His first Iowa residence was in Rockville, where, just forty-five years ago, he began the practice of his profession. Ten years later he removed to Delhi. In 1863 he removed to Mt. Vernon where the rest of his days were spent. The Doctor was in his time a physician of great repute and large practice. Of late he had not been actively engaged in the practice of his profession. The Doctor was a staunch republican and a firm opposer of saloonism. In 1847 he was elected a representative for Linn county in the state legislature, and though a slight deafness interfered somewhat with the performance of his duties, he was a keen observer and had a way of voting right on all questions in which a principle was involved. He was born in Fayette county, Pa., in 1819, and was 72 years old. He leaves a widow, also, four adult children, Mrs. W. F. Barclay, of Waterloo, W. Scott Doron, of Mt. Vernon, Walter A. Doron, principal of schools at Monticello, and Carl Doron, a drygoods salesman formerly of Cedar Rapids.

Doctor Doron had held several positions of honor and trust and was held in high esteem. He was a prominent Odd Fellow and a well known figure in medical and political conventions. He was not a member of any church but was a man of high principle and was unflinching in his devotion to duty.

Doctor Curtis, professor of Greek in the college at Mt. Pleasant, conducted chapel exercises Friday morning.

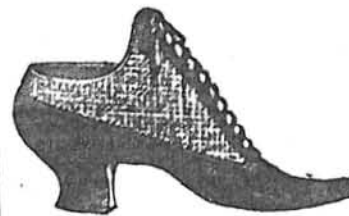
Miss Mabel Barber, now assistant cashier in a bank at Denison, will spend Sunday with her old schoolmates.
