When Le Mars was in its swaddling clothes in 1870 there arrived one bright spring day a youth from Denmark bearing the name of Andrew M. Duus. Honored in Le Mars, the states of Iowa and South Dakota over a period covering sixty-four years, Hon. A. M. Duus passed away at his home in this city Friday morning after an illness of five weeks.

Suffering a violent attack of heart trouble at that time, waning strength and rigors of old age precluded recov-

ory. He was in an unconscious state for the last few days of his life. Strong physically and mentally up to the time of his illness he was one of

The father died some years ago and she married Calvin Deviney, of Le Mars, who also survives. She lived in Paullina during the years 1922-24, then returning to Le Mars. Mrs. Deviney has been a member of the Methodist church for many years and desired to be buried from the church of her choice.

#### Clerked in Pioneer Store

Shortly after his arrival in Le Mars the youth of twenty years obtained a position in the grocery store of John Gordon in April, 1870. The place, a general merchandise store, known as "Gordon's Corners" was located where the Veale Lumber yards now stands, and handled all sorts of supplies and goods.

Qualified with a fair education and the command of two or three European languages, Duus, little versed in English, soon acquired the language and made himself generally useful. While clerking in the store he engaged in the insurance business and followed that line all his life, in addition to real estate, mercantile and political activities. He was the oldest insurance agent in Iowa in point of service, representing old line established companies. He was agent of the Great American of New York for sixty-one years and agent for other well known companies for fifty and forty years.

#### In Business At Hospers

Branching out in business for himself two years later, in company with John Stronck, another early settler, he went to the new town of Hospers where they opened the first general merchandise store.

grasshopper plague and with no crops and no money many business concerns failed to weather the financial crisis and were forced to succumb to the inevitable and among them the Le Mars young men met with reversal of fortune and were compelled to close out their venture.

While residing in Hospers Mr. Duus was united in marriage with Miss Grace Wynia, member of Sioux county pioneer family.

### Comes Back to Le Mars

Returning to Le Mars in 1875 Mr. Duus obtained a position as bookkeeper for the implement and hardware firm of H. W. VanSickel. With his brother, J. M. Duus, he embarked in the hardware and implement business in 1876 and at the same time conducted an insurance business. While in business both in the grocery and implement lines Mr. Duus carried many customers and incurred many obligations in so doing. Many were unable or neglected to pay him and obligations incurred on their account due eastern firms and others, were scrupulously met by Mr. Duus, although it took him years of self denial and hard work before he gained a substantial footing and comfortable circumstances.

### Served in Public Capacity

A. M. Duus was elected county auditor in the fall of 1878 and served in that capacity and was an obliging official and extremely popular. On relinquishing office in 1886 he took over the entire management of the insurance business founded by himself and his brother.

Mr. Duus was elected representative for Plymouth county in 1887 on the Democratic ticket and served one term in the Iowa legislature. He declined a renomination in order to devote his time to his long established business.

For some years Mr. Duus was associated in the insurance business with the late A. A. Alline, another notable figure in Le Mars history, and later became associated in business with R. J. Koehler.

With a number of energetic business men he founded the Le Mars Mutual Insurance company about thirty-five years ago. He was president of the company at the time of

The Farmers Savings bank at Struble, which has operated under Senate File 111 since March, 1933, has been released under a depositors agreement and will this Tuesday resume operations on an unrestricted basis. This will release about \$60,000 in that community as the bank had about \$120,000 in deposits when placed under Senate File 111.

This was the last bank in Plymouth county operating under restrictions. There are eleven banks in the county now unrestricted and six whose affairs are being closed up by receivers.

In early days Mr. Duus, due in a measure to his personality and to his position as town clerk and assessor in the village of Le Mars in the seventies, was brought in contact with the rush of emigrants which poured in from Europe in the late seventies and early eighties. His knowledge of different languages, of men and manners, stood him in good stead and he acted in an advisory capacity to many of the new settlers, welcomed them to their new surroundings and went out of his way to assist them in their plans for settlement on the prairie. Hundreds of residents in Plymouth county testify to the worth of his advice, his probity, honesty, square dealing and kindness. To have met and associated with a man like A. M. Duus is an honor and one of the pleasures life affords.

Mr. Duus during his life was a member of the Masonic fraternity, the Elks, the Eagles and the Modern Woodmen. He was brought up in the Lutheran church. In later years the family attended the Presbyterian church.

#### Long Wedded Life

A. M. Duus was born at Föhl, Schleswig-Holstein, Denmark, October 24, 1849. He attended school in his native land and assisted his father in a grocery warehouse. He was united in marriage with Miss Grace Wynia at Hospers October 8 1873, and they celebrated their sixtieth wedding anniversary here last autumn. Deep sorrow entered their lives in their earlier years when six of their children died when young, four of them within a few weeks by a scourge of diphtheria which visited Le Mars in the early eighties. One son, William, attained man's estate, dying in 1905. With his wife, three daughters are left to mourn his passing, Mrs. Grace Van Nimwegen, Mrs. Clara Mieras and Mrs. R. D. Sherman, and five grandchildren.

**Masonic Rites Conducted

A. M. Duus, one of the oldest citizens of Le Mars, and a well known veteran insurance agent, passed away at his home here Friday morning at 10 o'clock after suffering the past five weeks with heart trouble, and other complications which were due to his advanced years.

Mr. Duus was born in Denmark on October 24, 1849, and at the time of his death was 84 years, 10 months, and 7 days old.

In 1870, he came to America and directly to Le Mars, where he found a position clerking for John Gordon, who operated the first general store in this city. After working in Le Mars two years, Mr. Duus opened his own general store in Hospers and also conducted an insurance agency in that place.

He was united in marriage, there, on October 9, 1873, to Grace Wynia and last fall the elderly couple had the privilege of celebrating the sixtieth anniversary of their marriage.

### Good Language

Everything is also written up in almost faultless English, a remarkable performance in the eyes of the present staff of the paper, among whom the spelling of anything longer than four-letter words usually presents baffling difficulties.

Original essays by all of the graduates, comprising about ten columns of handset type, are prominently featured.

On the editorial page of this edition are found several fearless editorials by the then editor, Math Wurth, pioneer Le Mars newspaper man. One of the editorials has to do with the American Cup auto races. The writer deploras the concessions made by the British designer toward the American cutter type.

Another editorial deals with a supreme court case soon to be heard regarding the right of a man to take his bicycle into his office with him. The editorial runs:

"The bicycle is such a new machine that its legal status is naturally questioned. It has been declared a vehicle, possessing all the rights of a vehicle on public roads, and the right to carry it into a building may be abridged by such claim to recognition. If the question is decided in the common sense way, the bicycle will be allowed to be taken into office buildings, provided it does not interfere with or cause damage to any of the other occupants of the building. The idea that it can not be thus disposed of simply because horses and horse-drawn vehicles are not put in offices is a little absurd. Horses can not be housed in office buildings very well. It requires too much knocking out of doors, windows and partitions."

In 1876, he and his brother engaged in the implement business and at the same time conducted an insurance agency until the fall of 1879 when Mr. Duus was elected county auditor. He held this position for ten years. In January, 1886, he took over the insurance business conducted by his brother until the fall of 1887 when he was elected representative of this county on the democratic ticket. He served in this capacity for one term, declining a renomination.

Mr. Duus was associated for a number of years with the late A. A. Aline in the insurance business. In 1902 in conjunction with R. J. Kochler and others, the Le Mars Mutual Insurance company was formed, with Mr. Duus as general manager. He was later made vice president and on the death of Dr. Richey four years ago, he became president of the association. Mr. Duus was very active in his work up until his sickness five weeks ago, and came to the office regularly to conduct his part of the business.

Mr. Duus was a member of the Masonic order, the Elks lodge and the Modern Woodmen. He was baptized in the Lutheran faith and since moving to Le Mars attended the Presbyterian church. He was a devoted husband and father and one of the honored citizens of Le Mars and vicinity. He has always taken an active part in civic enterprises, church work and various activities benefitting the community in general. Mr. Duus was the oldest insurance agent in the state, both in age and the number of years he had served.

Masonic rites were conducted yesterday afternoon from the First Presbyterian church with Rev. F. P. Pfaltzgraff officiating and the following serving as pallbearers: Geo. V. Pew, Frank Smith, T. A. Bray, Frank Hentges, S. Hansen, and Jacob G. Koenig. Interment was made in the City cemetery with body in charge of funeral arrangements.

Ernest Miller, arrested with Loy, is a paroled convict from the federal penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga., and has served two terms in the Ohio penitentiary, he told officers. He said, according to police, that he and Loy planned to rob the street car barn at Davenport Wednesday and Thursday nights, but that on each occasion he influenced Loy not to go through with it.

Miller will be arraigned and charged with carrying concealed weapons, police said.
