#### Is Fourth State to Ratify Amendment to Constitution.

Bismarck, N. D., Jan. 29.—The senate, with only two dissenting votes, concurred in the house resolution ratifying the federal prohibition amendment, negated by but twelve members of the two houses. North Dakota is the fourth state to approve the amendment.

The alien enemy registration takes place beginning February 4th at 6 a. m. and closing February 9th at 8 p. m., and to continue during that week, on each day from 6 a. m. to 8 p. m.

First—All male German alien enemies over the age of fourteen years must register, either at the Post office or at the City Hall.

Second—Each applicant for registration must come equipped with four photographs, 3x3 inches in size, to place upon the different blanks and affidavits to be filled out. The photograph must be on thin paper with light background, so they can be pasted on the forms.

It is very important that all male German alien enemies over fourteen years of age register. At the expiration of the registration time, February 9th, those who have not complied with these requirements will be subject to be taken into custody by the United States Marshall's office in Ottumwa.
