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HELD A RALLY

CIVIC FEDERATION MEETING
REPLETE WITH ORATORY.

Sentiment Was Strong That the Elec-
tion of Dr. Patterson Is
Assured.

The Civic Federation held a rally in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium last evening. It was liberally attended, but many of those present were attracted by curiosity, not being affiliated with the Federation in any way. There were enough of the advocates of Federation principles on hand however to make noise and they whooped and cheered the speakers of the evening to an echo. The members of the Federation would make valuable additions to Manager Egan's rooters' club, so vociferously do they express their feelings.

Mr. J. M. Storrar presided at the meeting and made a number of clever speeches. Dr. Baughmann, Rev. Arthur Long, J. W. Topping, Rev. T. G. Harper, Rev. Tenant, Dr. Patterson and S. O. Thomas delivered addresses in which they commended the platform of the Federation and united in the declaration that Dr. Patterson would be the next mayor of Burlington. The oratory was of the typical fervid Federation order. It appeared to please the audience, and in this way was effective enough. The Hawkeye, which has been trying to shape the Federation policies and keep itself right with the republican party was liberally touched up, while the Gazette did not escape critical reference. The meeting adjourned at a late hour with everybody feeling good.
