## A. LIMBACK IS DEAD

PROMINENT RESIDENT OF THE  
COUNTY PASSES AWAY.

Was Pioneer Citizen and Business Man  
of Dyersville and Former  
Member of the State  
Legislature.

The many friends of the family in this city will regret to learn of the death at his home in Dyersville of Hon. A. Limback, one of that city's pioneer and prominent citizens and business men. He passed away at 6 o'clock on Thursday evening after suffering several days from pneumonia. He was about 75 years of age and is survived by several children, among whom is John Limback, who is the high treasurer of the Catholic Order of Foresters of America.

Mr. Limback has been very prominent in the welfare of Dyersville's business interests since the town's infancy, having been one of its foremost merchants for over a quarter of a century and up to six years ago was a member of the firm of A. Limback & Co. He had served in many town and township offices and for one term was a member of the state legislature from this county. The members of the family were present at his bedside at the time of his death.

### LIMBACK FUNERAL MONDAY

Last Rites Over Pioneer Citizen of  
Dyersville Will Be Conducted  
at St. Francis Church.

Dyersville, Ia., Sept. 21.—The fune-  
ral of the late Hon. Anthony Limback  
will be held Monday morning from St.  
Francis church, this city. The de-  
ceased was born May 18, 1834, in  
Wheeling, W. Va., and came west with  
his parents in 1856, locating near Dy-  
ersville on a farm. He went into the  
general merchandise business in this  
city in 1861 and retired in September,  
1899. When the town was incorporat-  
ed in 1873 he served as one of the first  
aldermen and in 1874 he was the town  
treasurer. He represented Dubuque  
county in the twenty-second general  
assembly. He was connected with the  
late B. E. Linehan in the banking bus-  
iness in Dubuque and was also a pro-  
moter and friend of the Dubuque &  
Sioux City railroad. He was married  
to Miss Mary Josephine Botsford April  
28, 1862, and is survived by his wife  
and four children, John A. of Cedar  
Rapids, Joseph B. of St. Paul, Harry  
H. and Mrs. C. May of Dyersville, and  
a brother, Joseph H. Limback of Dyers-
