Hon. J. M. Slosson died at his home in Kensett township at about noon yesterday, March 28th. Though he has been somewhat feeble fine everal years his last illness was of but a few hours duration, and the announcement of his death, coming as it did without warning, was a great shock to this community, where Mr. Slosson was held in highest esteem. With all his old ambitions and his honors he was ever a modest, unobtrusive man, so we were not surprised, on turning to the History of Worth County, to find this brief sketch:

John M. Slosson settled on section 29, Northwood township, in 1857; moved to his present home, on section 16, Kensett township, in 1869. He was born in New York, March 29, 1835; married April 6, 1859, to Jennie R. Finch, a native of New York, born May 19, 1840. He has a splendid farm of 600 acres. They have five children -Charles E., Mary, Frank A., J. M. Jr., and Roy. He is engaged in raising stock and grain of all kinds. He is an enterprising, thrifty farmer.

Mr. Slosson was one of Worth's earliest citizens as well as one of its best. As will be seen from the above sketch he would have been 65 years of age had he lived one more day. Though peculiar in his mental make-up, he was a man of spotless integrity, one who dealt justly with every one and wished all men well. With all his unassuming, home-loving ways he was a publicspirited citizen who won the full confidence and liking of all who really knew him. In 1887, in recognition of his integrity and native worth, he was elected as an independent, and by a large majority, to represent the county in the lower house of the state legislature. He served his constituents with faith- wedding. The hall will contain booth fulness and integrity, but was not a candidate for renomination. 
On the 5th of October, 1893, Dr. Hewitt was united in marriage to Miss Frances Hazelton, a daughter of William and Martha (Brigham) Hazelton and a native of Albert Lea, Minnesota. Her father was born in Massachusetts and her mother in Vermont and they were married in Columbus, Wisconsin, where Mr. Hazelton engaged in merchandising. Later he removed westward to Minnesota and became a merchant of Albert Lea but spent his last days in Northwood, Iowa, where he passed away in 1913. His widow survived for about two years and died in 1915. To Dr. and Mrs. Hewitt have been born three children: Leland H., who is at West Point with the rank of second lieutenant; Martha, who died in infancy; and Kent W.

In his fraternal relations Dr. Hewitt is connected with the Modern Woodmen and the Knights of Pythias. His political endorsement is given to the republican party and his religious faith is that of the Methodist Episcopal church. His activities touch the general interests of society, and his aid and support are always given on the side of progress and improvement.

HON. JOHN M. SLOSSON, SR.

Hon. John M. Slosson, Sr., was one of the valued pioneer settlers of Worth county. He was born in the village of Maine, Broome county, New York, March 29, 1835, and in the year 1856 removed west to Fillmore county, Minnesota, settling a year later, or in 1857, on land adjoining Northwood. A part of the original farm has recently been platted and added to the town of Northwood.

In the spring of 1859 Mr. Slosson returned to New York and was married to Jennie R. Finch, bringing his bride across the almost trackless prairies to the settlement at Northwood. The nearest railroad then was at Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin, a distance of one hundred and twenty-five miles. Five children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Slosson: Charles E., who has passed away; Mary; Frank A.; John M.; and Roy, who is also deceased. Together Mr. and Mrs. Slosson endured the privations and hardships of pioneer days, witnessing the trackless wilderness being transformed and made to blossom into a beautiful, wealthy farming country. The bride of that spring of 1859, after assisting in many ways, for forty years and more, to make Worth county what it is today, is rounding out a good and useful life in a rose-embowered cottage at Monrovia, in southern California.



HON. JOHN M. SLOSSON, SR.


In 1865 Mr. Slosson removed with his family to Kensett township, purchasing six hundred acres of land on sections 15 and 16, and thereafter he was known as one of the leading and prominent agriculturists of that section of the county. In 1879, when the Worth County Agricultural Society was organized, he was elected vice president and took an active part in helping to make the first agricultural fair of the county a notable success. He was also prominent in connection with political interests and was elected one of the trustees at the first election held in Kensett township. He was also chosen to represent his district in the twenty-second general assembly of Iowa and in that body was a close student of legislation and was accounted a helpful member.

Mr. Slosson passed away upon the home farm in Kensett township, March 28, 1900. He was a man of tried integrity and worth, loved and respected by his neighbors far and near, as is shown by the numerous positions of honor and respect to which he was called, and his life record may well serve as a source of inspiration and encouragement to others, showing what may be attained through individual effort intelligently directed and honorably guided.

JAMES G. CASEY.

Commercial enterprises in Osage find a worthy representative in James G. Casey, who was born in Floyd county, Iowa, March 6, 1880, a son of P. F. and Kitty (Doyle) Casey, both of whom were natives of Wisconsin. The father was born in Portage, that state, and came to Iowa in 1877. He devoted his life to the occupation of farming and thus provided a comfortable living for his family. He was an active politician and was a candidate for the office of state representative at one time. He was a supporter of the Catholic church and was interested in all that pertained to the material, political, social and moral welfare of the community. He died in 1893. His widow survives him and is living in Mason City. They were the parents of five children: Phillip, who has passed away; James G.; Mrs. Rebecca Kelley, living in Mason City: John V., whose home is at Strawberry Point, Iowa; and William, living in Mason City.

James G. Casey pursued his education in the schools of Floyd county and Dubuque, supplemented by a commercial course in Charles City. He completed his study in a business college by graduation with the class of 1899 and made his initial step in the business world by entering the employ of the James A. Smith Lumber Company, with which he remained for two years. On the expiration of that period he began farming upon the old homestead and devoted eight years of his life to the further cultivation and development of that place. In 1910 he took up his abode in Osage, establishing the implement business that is now conducted under the firm style of Casey & Company. They carry a large line of farm implements and heavy farm machinery, and are conducting a business of gratifying and growing proportions. Mr. Casey has an interest in the home farm but concentrates his attention largely upon his implement business. The firm of Casey & Company have established branches, opening a store at New Haven in the spring of 1909 and one in Floyd, Iowa, in the spring of 1912. Their


